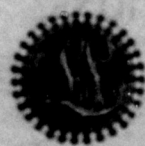

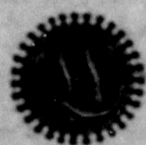

UNDER and by virtue of the provisions of the Legislative Assembly, 5 George V., Chapter 8, intituled "The Liquor License Act, 1915," and of an Order-in-Council duly passed on the 2nd day of November instant, I do hereby proclaim and declare that for the reasons set forth therein, no liquor licenses, either wholesale or retail, shall be granted in the Parish of Saint Hilaire, in the County of Madawaska, to be in force therein on or after the first day of May, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and sixteen, of which all persons will take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.

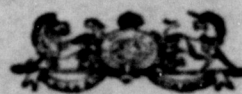
UNDER and by virtue of the provisions of the Legislative Assembly, 5 George V., Chapter 8, intituled "The Liquor License Act, 1915," and of an Order-in-Council duly passed on

the second day of November instant, I do hereby proclaim and declare that by said Order-in-Council it is made to appear that a vote was taken in the Parish of Richibucto at the regular annual civic election held on the nineteenth day of October, A. D. 1915, on the question of granting liquor licenses in said Parish under the provisions of Section 21 of said last mentioned Act, and that at said election three hundred and eighteen votes were cast in favor of granting such licenses in said Parish, and one hundred and seventy-two votes were cast against granting such licenses, thereby reversing the vote taken on the said question on the seventeenth day of October, A. D. 1911, of which all persons will take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.

Message from His Majesty the King, headed
Buckingham Palace.

TO my people at this grave moment in the struggle between my people and a highly organized enemy who has transgressed the laws of nations and changed the ordinance that binds Civilized Europe together I appeal to you. I rejoice in my Empire's effort and I feel pride in the voluntary response from my subjects all over the world who have sacrificed home, fortune and life itself in order that another may not inherit the free Empire which their ancestors and mine have built. I ask you to make good these sacrifices. The end is not in sight. More men and yet more are wanted to keep my armies in the field and through them to secure victory and enduring peace. In ancient days the darkest moment has ever produced in men of our race the sternest resolve. I ask you men of all classes to come forward voluntarily and take your share in the fight. In freely responding to my appeal you will be giving your support to our Brothers, who for long months have nobly upheld Britain's past traditions and the glory of Her Arms.
