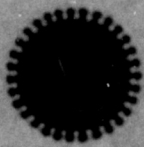

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## PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, the Legislative Assembly of this Province stands prorogued to Thursday, the twenty-fifth day of November instant, I have thought fit to further prorogue the said Legislative Assembly, and the same is hereby prorogued accordingly to Thursday, the twentieth day of January next.

Given under my hand and seal at Fredericton, the twenty-fourth day of November, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and fifteen, and in the sixth year of His Majesty's reign.

For each 100 words in excess of the first 300, an additional sum of ..... 2.00

NOTICE is hereby given of the passing of an Order-in-Council relating to enemy subjects with reference to Probates and Letters of Administration during the continuance of the war between Great Britain and Germany, Austria-Hungary, Turkey and Bulgaria.

The following is an extract of said Order-in-Council passed on December 10th, 1915, upon the recommendation of the Attorney General, which is published for general information:

"He recommends that during the war no probate of a will or Letters of Administration of the estate of any enemy subject wherever resident, shall be granted in respect of any assets in this country without the express license of the Crown; also that in all cases where Probate or Letters of Administration are granted during the war to any person entitled thereto, the grant shall be made upon the condition that no portion of the assets shall be distributed or paid during the war to any beneficiary or creditor who is a German, Austro-Hungarian, Turkish or Bulgarian subject, wherever resident, or to any one on his behalf, or to or on behalf of any person resident in Germany, Austria-Hungary, Turkey, or Bulgaria, of whatever nationality, without the express sanction of the Crown, acting through the Attorney General, and if any distribution or payment is made contrary to this condition the grant of Probate or Letters of Administration will be forthwith revoked.

He does not recommend that the condition be expressly

inserted in Letters Testamentary or of Administration, but that the terms of the condition be notified to each executor or administrator by the Judge or Registrar at the time such executor or administrator is sworn to the performance of his duties."

Large subscriptions are not required, but any small amounts sent to Miss Shaughnessy, Honorary Treasurer, at the office of the Queen Mary's Needlework Guild, Windsor Station, Montreal, will be spent in this good cause."
