WHEREAS, the Legislative Assembly of this Province stands prorogued to Thursday, the twenty-sixth day of July inst., I have thought fit further to prorogue the said Legislative Assembly, and the same is hereby prorogued accordingly, to Thursday, the sixth day of September next.

WHEREAS, the Fourth Day of August, 1917, is the third anniversary of the declaration of war by Great Britain, and whereas it has been proposed by the Central Committee for National Patriotic Organizations that public meetings be held throughout the Empire on that date, at which the following resolution should be passed:

"That on this the third anniversary of the declaration of a righteous war, this meeting of the citizens of..... records its inflexible determination to continue to a victorious end the struggle in maintenance of those ideals of Liberty and Justice which are the common and sacred cause of the Allies."

And Whereas the Executive Council of this Province has passed an Order-in-Council authorizing a Proclamation to issue requiring the assembling of the people together on that day for said purpose:

We therefore hereby request and enjoin that all loyal citizens throughout the Province do meet on said 4th day of August and pass the said Resolution, and in view of the gravity of the situation and the solemnity of the occasion, the day be also observed by holding meetings of a religious and inter-cenary as well as patriotic character.

WHEREAS, John B. Hawthorne, Esquire, High Sheriff of the County of York, has made a return to the Honour-

able the Provincial Secretary-Treasurer, setting forth that an election of the ratepayers of the village of Saint Marys and Gibbon, in the Parish of Saint Marys, in the County of York, was held on the twelfth day of June, A. D. 1917, to determine whether the inhabitants thereof should be incorporated under the provisions of Chapter 144 of the Consolidated Statutes, 1903, intitled "The Towns' Incorporation Act;" that at said election there were one hundred and ninety-one votes cast for and eighty-eight votes cast against incorporation; that the boundaries of the said Town are as follows:

"Beginning at the point where the Nashwaak Stream enters the River St. John, thence up said Nashwaak Stream to William Lewis' upper line, thence along the western prolongation of said Lewis line to the lower line of Douglas Parish; thence along said Parish line to the River St. John; thence down said river to place of beginning."

And it appearing by said return that the majority of the ratepayers within said bounds had voted in favour of incorporation, I do therefore proclaim that the said Villages comprised within said bounds hereinbefore described be incorporated under and by virtue of the Towns' Incorporation Act under the name of the "Town of Devon."
