PROCLAMATION

BY HIS HONOUR WILLIAM PUGSLEY,
D. C. L., K. C., P. C., LIEUTENANT GOV-
ERNOR OF THE PROVINCE OF NEW
BRUNSWICK.

WILLIAM PUGSLEY.

WHEREAS, the Legislative Assembly of this Province, convened on Thursday, the Seventh day of March last, and continued its sittings until this day, being the twenty-sixth day of April instant, I have thought fit to further prorogue the said Legislative Assembly, and the same is hereby prorogued accordingly, to Thursday, the sixth day of June next. Give under my hand and seal at Fredericton, the twenty-sixth day of April, in the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and eighteen, and in the eighth year of His Majesty's reign.

Copy of telegram from the Secretary of State for the Colonies to the Governor General:—

London, April 20th, 1918.

Your telegram 27th March arrangement now made with Wayland Company to carry out programme flaxseed cultivation. Present situation Russia and greatly increased national demand for aeroplane fabric made it essential that every effort should be made to increase cultivation of flax within British Empire. Great importance attached by War Office to success of Wayland's efforts to secure that cultivation of flaxseed Canada receives all possible skill and care from farmers concerned. In present circumstances production of flaxseed ranks as of equal importance with that of wheat or any cereal. War Office would be grateful if intimation to this effect may be conveyed to Canadian farmers by all possible channels of publicity.

Sir:—I have the honour to enclose to you a copy of a despatch which has been received by His Excellency the Governor General from the Colonial Secretary, upon the necessity of increasing the cultivation of flax and stating that the production of flaxseed ranks as of equal importance with that of wheat, and to ask that every possible publicity be given to this intimation by your Government.
