WILLIAM PUGSLEY

WHEREAS the Legislative Assembly of this Province stands prorogued to Thursday, the sixth day of June inst., I have thought fit further to prorogue the said Legislative Assembly, and the same is hereby prorogued accordingly to Thursday, the twenty-fifth day of July next.

Given under my hand and seal at Fredericton, the fifth day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and eighteen, and in the ninth year of His Majesty's Reign.

GEORGE the FIFTH, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the British Dominions Beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India.

To all to whom these presents shall come, or whom the same may in anywise concern—Greeting:

A PROCLAMATION.

W. STUART EDWARDS,

For Deputy Minister of Justice, Canada.

WHEREAS, seeing that the British Commonwealth is engaged in war in defence of rights and liberties, unjustly attacked, and to fulfil pledges solemnly given, it is fitting that the people of Canada should be enabled to make a public and solemn avowal of duty to Almighty God and of need of guidance.

Now Know Ye, that by and with the advice of Our Privy Council for Canada, we do hereby proclaim and declare by this Our Proclamation, that Sunday, the thirtieth day of June in this present year, be appointed to be throughout the Dominion of Canada a day of humble prayer and intercession to Almighty God on behalf of the cause undertaken by the British Commonwealth and the Allies, and for those who are offering their lives for it, and for a speedy and enduring peace; and we do invite all Our loving subjects throughout Canada to set apart the said day for this purpose.

Of all which Our loving subjects and all others whom these presents may concern, are hereby required to take notice and to govern themselves accordingly.

In Testimony whereof, We have caused these Our Letters to be made Patent, and the Great Seal of Canada to be hereunto affixed. Witness: Our Right Trusty and Right Entirely Beloved Cousin and Counsellor, Victor Christian William, Duke of Devonshire, Marquess of Hartington, Earl of Devonshire, Earl of Burlington, Baron Cavendish of Hardwicke, Baron Cavendish of Keighley, Knight of Our Most Noble Order of

the Garter; One of Our Most Honorable Privy Council; Knight Grand Cross of Our Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Knight Grand Cross of Our Royal Victorian Order; Governor General and Commander-in-Chief of Our Dominion of Canada.

At Our Government House, in Our City of Ottawa, this twenty-second day of May, in the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and eighteen, and in the ninth year of Our Reign.
