CANADA—DOMINIONS No. 322

My Lord Duke:

With reference to my despatch Dominions No. 241, of the 31st March, I have the honour to request Your Excellency to inform your Ministers that attention has been called to a case in which confusion has arisen from the similarity of the code words "Photogenic" (meaning £25 or 25 pounds) and "Phylogenetic" (meaning £56 or 56 pounds) in the Government Telegraphic Code.

2. In the circumstances it is suggested that the use of both words should be avoided if possible.

CANADA—DOMINIONS No. 261.

My Lord Duke:

With reference to my despatch Dominions No. 198, of 17th March, I have the honour to state, for the information of Your Excellency's Ministers, that the Regulations for Salutes for British Anniversaries and those for Royal and personal Salutes which have been in abeyance since the year 1915, will be resumed as from 31st March, 1919, and instructions have been

issued accordingly by the Army Council to all Commands abroad having saluting stations, as laid down in paragraph 1897 of the King's Regulations.

2. A further despatch will be sent to you later with regard to the firing of International Salutes.

3. I have to request that the intimation of His Majesty's wishes contained in my despatch under reference with regard to the ceremonial observance of his Birthday on 3rd June next may be modified accordingly.

The Honourable Clifford W. Robinson reports for the information of the Committee of the Executive Council:

That under Chapter 52 of the Consolidated Statutes, of New Brunswick, 1903, Section 1, respecting the education of deaf and deaf mute persons, it is provided as follows:

"The Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council may arrange for the reception and education of deaf or deaf mute persons under the provisions of this Chapter with the institution for the deaf and dumb at Halifax, or with any other school for the education of the deaf and dumb approved of by the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council, and may from time to time, by Order-in-
