

proper cost and charges, and to the satisfaction of said Commissioner of Highways or Supervisor of Trunk Roads, and without unnecessary delay, repair and amend the said roads, streets, squares, open plots of ground and highways, pavements or sidewalks in every part where they shall be so broken up and opened as aforesaid to the condition to which they were before breaking up or opening the same. No poles or wires shall be placed in such a way as to interfere with the poles or wires of any telephone or electric light company now existing or so as to injure or impair the efficient workings of any telephone or electric light system in operation in this Province, in places where any such system may be in operation before the Company hereby incorporated established its system, it being understood, however, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to prevent the Company hereby incorporated from erecting its poles or stringing its wires, or laying the same under ground on the opposite side of any highway or street to that occupied by the poles or wires of any existing telephone or electric light system. Provided, also, that the said corporation, its agents and workmen, shall not in the execution of any of the powers herein given, do or permit any unnecessary damage nor shall they cut down or injure any fruit, shade or ornamental tree, nor in any way obstruct the entrance to any door or gateway, or place any post or pole directly opposite any window of any store, dwelling house, schoolhouse or place of divine worship, or in any ditch of any street or highway.

Any poles used in any town or village by said Company shall be straight cedar poles of a reasonable size and of sufficient length that any wires placed thereon by said Company shall be not less than eighteen feet above the ground, street or highway over which the same are placed; by the name of "The Crockett-McMillin Drug Company, Limited," with a total capital stock of five thousand dollars, divided into fifty shares of one hundred dollars each and with the head office at Dorchester, in the County of Westmorland, and Province of New Brunswick.

To acquire all and any receipts and processes for the purpose of manufacturing and the right to manufacture and deal in all medicinal preparations and patent medicines, and to carry on the manufacture and sale of any such medicines and preparations and generally to carry on the business of manufacturers, buyers and sellers of and dealers in all kinds of medicines and medicinal preparations and drugs whatsoever.

To manufacture, buy, sell and deal in mineral waters, wines, cordials, liqueurs, soups, broth and other restoratives or food especially suitable or deemed to be suitable for invalids and convalescents.

#### PUBLIC NOTICE.

Notice is hereby given that the following Additional Regulation made under Chapter 25 of the Consolidated Statutes of New Brunswick 1903 "Respecting the settlement of Crown Lands," has been passed by Order in Council 4th June, 1919.

In case any person or persons who has or have applied for Crown Lands, whether or not the application or applications of such person or persons has or have been approved and the applicant or applicants located upon land shall fail or who has or have failed to carry out any of the requirements of the Act (being Chapter 25 of the Consolidated Statutes of New Brunswick 1903) or any regulation made thereunder or who has violated or shall violate any of the conditions of the said Act or any regulation made thereunder, the Minister of Lands and Mines may treat such application or any approval or location under said Act or regulations as null and void and may receive and approve of new application or applications and locate the applicant upon such land. In all cases where land heretofore has been applied for or approved of or located to an applicant who has failed to carry out the requirements of the said Act and the Minister of Lands and Mines has received and acted upon new application for such land the new applicant therefore upon his application being approved shall have the same rights to the said land as though no previous application had been made or approved of or the land located to any previous applicant and all rights of such previous applicant to such land or any interest therein shall be deemed to be cancelled and annulled.
