By HIS HONOUR WILLIAM PUGSLEY, D.C.L.,

A PROCLAMATION.

E. L. NEWCOMBE,

Deputy Minister of Justice, Canada.

WHEREAS, it seems to Us fitting that a day should be set apart for a Day of Intercession for the Peace Conference—

Now Therefore Know Ye that We have thought fit by and with the advice of Our Privy Council for Canada to appoint and set apart the sixteenth day of February next to be throughout the Dominion of Canada a day of humble prayer and intercession to Almighty God that His blessings may rest upon the Peace Conference, and that under His direction and guidance its deliberations and conclusions may result in the establishment of a world-wide peace on a just and permanent foundation; and We do invite all Our loving subjects throughout Canada to observe the said day as solemnly set apart and consecrated for this purpose.

Of all which Our loving subjects and all others whom these presents may concern, are hereby required to take notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

In Testimony Whereof, We have caused these Our Letters to be made Patent, and the Great Seal of Canada to be hereunto affixed. Witness: Our Right Trusty and Right Entirely Beloved Cousin and Counsellor, Victor Christian William, Duke of Devonshire, Marquess of Hartington, Earl of Devonshire, Earl of Burlington, Baron Cavendish of Hardwicke, Baron Cavendish of Keighley,

Knight of Our Most Honourable Privy Council; Knight Grand Cross of Our Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Knight Grand Cross of Our Royal Victorian Order; Governor General and Commander-in-Chief of Our Dominion of Canada.

At Our Government House, in Our City of Ottawa, this twenty-third day of January, in the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and nineteen, and in the ninth year of Our Reign.
