And further take notice that every employer engaging in any of such industries is required to cause to be furnished to the Board, on or before the first day of January, 1921, or as soon thereafter as he shall engage in any of the said industries, an estimate of his probable payroll for the year, together with such other information as is required by the regulations.

And further take notice, that any employer neglecting or refusing to furnish such estimate or information is liable to a penalty not exceeding \$20.00 per day for each day of such default, and is further liable for damages, as provided by Part II of said Act, in respect of any injury to any workman in his employ during the period of such default.

CHANCERY SALE

PURSUANT to a decree of the Supreme Court, Chancery Division, issued the eighth day of September, A. D. 1920, in amended, between Amasa Coy, Plaintiff, and Weston Coy, Annie B.
