My Dear Lieutenant-Governor,

The times and conditions are far from suitable for making yet another appeal to the generosity of the people of Canada, but nevertheless I am hopeful that there are many who will be willing to contribute to the Restoration Fund for Westminster Abbey, for which money is urgently needed.

I could not, of course, in the space of a letter, attempt to remind you of all that the Abbey stands for and means, but the question of a casual visitor when being shown round the Abbey gives perhaps an indication of what at once occurs to our minds when we speak of Westminster Abbey. "Can any sacred building in the British Empire compare with Westminster Abbey?" "Is it not the most unique and priceless treasure of the English-speaking race?"

Harold, the last of the Saxon Kings, was probably the first monarch to be crowned in the Abbey and on the same

spot every Sovereign from William the Conqueror to George V. has been crowned and anointed, but the Abbey has never witnessed in all the wonderful story of nine centuries and a half a more striking ceremony than that when on Armistice Day "The Unknown Warrior"—perhaps a Canadian—was laid to rest and the King placed a wreath on the coffin with the inscription:

"In proud memory of those warriors who died unknown in the Great War, unknown and yet well known; as dying, and behold they live."

Many Canadians will also recall that the Abbey was the home of their Battalion colors during the war, and alike to them and future generations the Abbey will always have a very special significance.

I need say no more beyond repeating that the necessity is very real.

An organized collection for funds is not required, but if you would be willing to make the nature of the appeal known to the public through the kindness of the press or in other ways that occur to you, I am confident that there are many who would be glad to avail themselves of the opportunity to assist in the preservation of the most splendid and historic of all British Monuments.

I shall be glad to forward to the Dean of Westminster any contributions which you may be good enough to send me.
