# RULES AND PRACTICE OF THE LEG-ISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

THE attention of parties intending to seek legislation at the next session of the Legislative Assembly is directed to the following Rules:

## Private and Local Bills

77. A typewritten copy or printed copy of every Private Bill or Local Bill intro-duced into this House shall be filed with the Clerk of the House within ten days after the opening of the Session, and in case of failure to comply with this pro-vision, the fee on the introduction of any such Private Bill shall be double the fee provided for in Rule \$1, applicable to such Bill, and Local Bills introduced after ten days of the opening of the Session shall days of the opening of the Session shall 1037 the same fee as a Private Bill. 78 No Private Bill, or Bill making

an amendment of a like nature to a for-mer Act, shall be received by the House unless a notice specifying clearly and dis-tinctly the nature and objects thereof, has been published four successive weeks previous to the mosting of the Legisla-ture, or to the introduction of the Bill in some one of the newspapers published in the County, interested in or to hemffected by the measure, 'or in the locality where the parties affected, or the major-ity of them reside; and when no news-paper is published in such county or loality. then in some newspaper having cality, then in some newspaper having control circulation in such County or be-cality, and also in the Royal Gazette. When the City or County interested in the measure, or the locality in which the parties affected reside, is largely compos-ed of a French population, then such no-tice shall also be published in a French newspaper, if any be published in the Province. Province. 72. In any County where no newa-paper may be published, the Bill, in lieu of other local publications, may be read at any Circuit or County Court in the presence of the Grand Jury, or before the Municipal Council of the County interest-od in ar affected by the Bill, and a certifi-rate of such reading shall be indoneed thereon, or attached to the said Bill, by the Clerk of the Court, or the Town Clerk or the Secretary-Treasurer, as the case may be; verified by the Seal (if any) of the Court. Town Council or Municipal Council, as the case may be; and a pe-tition must be presented to the House
