#### Notice of Assessment.

Notice is hereby given that under and by virtue of the powers conferred on this Board by the Workmen's Compensation Act, 1915, every employer who shall engage in any of the industries named below is and shall be assessed at the rate mentioned opposite the names of such industry, upon the amount of the payroll of such employer (or otherwise, as the case may be) to be ascertained as provided in the said Act:

CLASS I—Coal and other mining; reduction of ores and smelting; quarrying; manufacture of brick, glass, lime and cement; cutting and dressing of stone or marble; drilling and sinking of wells for gas or water.
