DEPT. OF HEALTH

Regulations Department of Public Health

Respecting Hotels and Embalming—In revision of incorrect copy in Royal Gazette of 26th August, last.

ORDERED: On the recommendation of the Honourable the Minister of Health, that the following additional regulations under "The Public Health Act, 1918," be approved:—

HOTELS

272. These regulations shall apply to all hotels the proprietor or keeper of which presents five beds or more for the reception of transient guests. They shall not apply to Lodging Houses. (See Lodging Houses regulations).

273. A register shall be kept in the office, or at the hotel clerk's desk in which shall be entered the name and address of each guest assigned to a room, with the number of the room so assigned, following immediately upon the reception of such guest.

274. Each room for the reception of guests shall have upon the outside of the door immediately leading thereto from the corridor or public room a number distinctly marked thereupon, which number shall be used exclusively for said room.

275. Any such room infested with lice, fleas, bed-bugs, rats, mice or other vermin, shall not be used for the reception of guests, until such vermin be exterminated.

276. Each guest room shall be provided with a secure bolt on the inner side of each door leading to said room, and in addition thereto, each door leading therefrom into the public corridor or hall or common room shall have a strong lock in good condition, with portable key, which key shall be delivered to the guest to whom the room is assigned, immediately upon assignment, and which shall be returned to the hotel by the guest upon his vacating of the room.

277. All mattresses, bed linen, blankets, coverlets, carpets, curtains and other furniture of each guest room shall be kept thoroughly clean and in a sanitary condition. No used towels, napkins or other like material shall be permitted to accumulate in said rooms, nor waste material of any kind whatever. No bed linen used by any prior guest shall be used for any succeeding guest without having been washed.

278. Each such room shall be provided with practical means of good ventilation, and shall be lighted by means of windows opening directly to the outside air. No dark room, that is to say, no room without such window or windows shall be used for the accommodation of guests. During the fly season the windows of each such room shall be provided with screens, so that the ingress of flies be prevented upon the opening of the window. All windows of each such room shall be capable of being readily opened both at top and bottom. All storm-windows shall be provided with a ventilating pane. Each such room or suite of rooms occupied by a guest shall be provided with suitable washing conveniences with an adequate supply of clean towels and with the means for the immediate disposal of used and waste water and other waste material. (Bathtubs are not hereby included in the phrase "washing conveniences").

279. Dining rooms shall be well lighted and ventilated, kept scrupulously clean and practically free from flies and free from other vermin, and the windows, doors and other openings made inaccessible to flies by means of screens or other measures. All furniture of such rooms with their appurtenances, such as cloths, napkins, tableware and the like shall be kept thoroughly clean and in sanitary condition, and all foods presented to guests shall be of good quality and properly cooked and served.

280. All kitchens or other rooms used for the preparation of food shall be kept in good order, tidy, and clean: shall be kept practically clear of flies and be screened against flies. Adequate provision for light and ventilation shall be provided and these necessities shall be maintained.

281. All hotels with ten beds or more for guests, shall have a proper gravity water-supply laid on and have an adequate number in the opinion of the District Medical Health Officer concerned, of modern and efficient water-closets, lavatories and bathtubs. Proper plumbing and drainage systems shall be introduced and maintained, and the water so supplied shall at all times be palatable and wholesome. (See Plumbing Regulations).

282. No brawling or wrangling or profane or indecent language or other unlawful action shall be permitted in hotels, and after ten o'clock in the evening all loud and unnecessary noise shall cease within the hotel and upon its premises.

283. The Proprietor or Keeper of each hotel as defined in regulation 273 shall procure a yearly license from the sub-district Board of Health of the sub-district in which the hotel is situated. Such license shall not be granted by the said Board unless and until it be reported to the Board by an officer duly appointed by the Board, that the hotel concerned has complied with these regulations. It shall be the duty of each such proprietor or keeper to make application for such license, and such license shall be as of date from the first day of May, in each year, to continue valid for one year from said date, unless sooner revoked by said Board in consequence of failure of said proprietor or keeper to maintain the hotel concerned in accordance with the foregoing regulations, or for such other cause as shall appear to the said Board adequate or expedient, and authority is hereby given to such Board to so revoke such license.

The fee for such yearly license shall be one dollar, payable by said proprietor or keeper to the secretary of said Board prior to the receipt of said license.

No one shall be permitted to keep or conduct a hotel as defined in these regulations unless in possession of said yearly license.

284. A copy of these regulations shall be kept conspicuously posted up in the office or common room of each hotel and in each guest-room.

EMBALMING

285. No person shall embalm any dead body or profess to practice the art of embalming without first applying for and receiving a license so to do as set out in these regulations. All such applications shall be made in writing accompanied by an examination and license fee of five dollars, with proof that the applicant is of good moral character and has attained the age of twenty-one years.

It is provided, however, that any person who has been actually and actively engaged in the art of embalming in New Brunswick prior to the thirty-first of December, 1922, shall be granted a license as an embalmer without examination upon production of good evidence to such fact and upon payment of the aforesaid fee.

286. For the purpose of carrying out the foregoing regulation, there shall be established by the Governor-in-Council, upon the recommendation of the Minister of Health, a Board to be styled the Embalmers Examining Board. Such Board shall consist of three members one of which shall be the Chief Medical Officer of the Province, who shall be chairman and two others, both of which shall be practical undertakers and embalmers who shall have practiced the trade and art of undertaking and embalming in New Brunswick for at least five years prior to appointment. One such member shall be recommended for appointment by the Minister of Health and the other by the New Brunswick Funeral Directors' Association. To this Board applications for license shall be made and fees paid as provided for in the foregoing regulation, and said Board shall determine to whom licenses shall issue, and shall issue such licenses.

287. Such licenses, except those provided for in Regulation 286 by reason of prior practice in the art of embalming at the passage of these regulations and to December 31, 1922, shall be issued only after due examination of the person applying for such license. Such examination shall be written or oral or practical, or a combination of all three. The Chief Medical Officer shall be the examiner upon Anatomy, causative factors of contagious disease and any additional subjects of practical medicine which he may think necessary the candidate should be acquainted with. The two other members of the Board shall examine upon the art and practice of embalming and the practical care of dead bodies, and, upon the candidate showing a fair knowledge of such subjects as are herein mentioned, he shall be granted a license as an embalmer under the signature of the Board. Such license shall be valid for one year from the date of issuance, and shall be renewable or reckoned valid from year to year upon the annual payment of the sum of two dollars to said Board.

288. All monies received by the Board in consequence of these Regulations shall be the property of the Board, and shall
