

to be kept and shown in the books of account and the records referred to in the preceding section, or such part thereof as the Liquor Export Inspector may request, which data and information shall cover the month preceding the first day of the month aforesaid, and deliver to him all originals or verified copies of invoices, steamship and railway bills of lading, Bills, receipts, vouchers and documents in any way relating to the receipt, disposal or carriage of liquor within or out of the Province or delivered from a warehouse or other building approved as aforesaid. He shall also give the serial number and date of use of each unit Form "A" Receipt received by the purchaser or delivered by the seller to the carrier receiving liquors for export, showing the quantity, kinds, and brands of liquors covered thereby and the name and address of the carrier whose signature appears thereon.

22. Every person, firm, association, Company, partnership or corporation whose warehouse or other building is approved of under these regulations shall register with the Liquor Export Inspector within ten days after notification of such warehouse or other building is approved of, and shall give the location and a general description of such warehouse or other building from which liquor is to be exported out of the Province and his or their office address and the name and address of the person to be in charge or management of said warehouse or other building and within twenty days after approval aforesaid shall furnish the said Liquor Export Inspector with a statement, verified by Statutory declaration, showing all liquors owned by him or them or in which he or they have any property right or rights, the quantity and brands of each kind of liquor, what part is in bond and what part is out of bond, and the location of the same, and all persons having liquor for export which is kept or stored in any place within the Province where under the laws of the Province same may be held, kept, or stored shall within sixty days from the date of the passing of the Liquor Exporter's Act file with the Liquor Export Inspector the like information verified by Statutory declaration as aforesaid.

23. No action or proceeding at law or in equity shall be taken or brought against the Liquor Export Inspector or against any person appointed or delegated by the Attorney General hereunder, in respect of any act done in the performance of his duties under said Act or the regulations made thereunder unless the Attorney General first certifies that the person desiring to take such proceedings has, in his opinion, a prima facie case against such Liquor Export Inspector or officer so appointed or delegated to act.

24. If for any reason any section, paragraph, provision, clause or part of these regulations shall be found to be unconstitutional or invalid, such finding shall not effect or destroy any other section, paragraph, provision, clause or part of these regulations, that is not of itself invalid, but the remaining portion shall be in force and valid without regard to that so invalidated.

25. The word "Person" in these regulations where the context so required or admits shall include firm, association, partnership, company and corporation, and the word "purchaser" in the fifth line of section 15 of the said Act shall include the agent of any purchaser.

26. Common Carrier within the meaning of these regulations shall not include

carriage by automobile or motor vehicle of any description.

PUBLIC NOTICE is hereby given that under "The New Brunswick Companies' Act, 1916", and amending Acts, Letters Patent have been issued under the seal of the Provincial Secretary-Treasurer of the Province of New Brunswick, bearing date the Fifth day of June, A. D. 1922, incorporating F. Royal Sumner, Merchant, of the City of Moncton in the County of Westmorland, and Province of New Brunswick; Herbert M. Wood, Merchant, of Sackville in the County and Province aforesaid; and E. Albert Reilly, Barrister-at-Law, of the City of Moncton in the County and Province aforesaid, for the following purposes, namely:

To purchase, take on lease or otherwise acquire land, buildings and hereditaments in the Province of New Brunswick and elsewhere, and to hold or sell, let or alienate, mortgage, charge or otherwise deal with all or any of such lands, tenements and hereditaments.

To develop, manage and turn to account in any manner any lands or buildings acquired by, or in which the Company is interested, and in particular by laying out, planting and preparing same for building purposes, constructing, altering, pulling down, decorating, maintaining, furnishing, fitting up and improving offices, houses, shops and buildings of all kinds and by planting, draining, farming, cultivating, letting on building lease or agreement, and by entering into contracts and arrangements of all kinds with builders, contractors, tenants and others.

To construct, work and carry on, or cause to be constructed, used, worked and carried on tramway, sawmills, water works, gas works, electrical works, factories, roads, drains and undertakings of any kind upon and in connection with the lands or properties of the Company, or in which it has, has had or intends to acquire an interest.

To carry on all or any of the following businesses: house agents, architects and surveyors, builders, contractors, merchants, and dealers in stone, ballast, shingle sand, lime, bricks, timbers, hardware and other building requisites.

To construct and maintain recreation grounds, either upon the lands acquired by the Company, or upon other lands, and generally to do all things necessary to promote and maintain clubs in connection therewith.

To improve, manage, cultivate, develop, exchange, let on lease or otherwise mortgage, sell, dispose of, turn to account, grant rights and privileges in re-

spect of, or otherwise deal with all or any part of the property and rights of the Company.

To search for, get, win, work, raise, make marketable, and use, sell and dispose of coal, oil, iron, clay, precious and other metals, minerals and other substances or products on, within, or under any property of the Company.

To invest and deal with the moneys of the Company not immediately required upon such securities, and in such manner as may from time to time be determined.

To lend and advance money, or give credit to such persons and on such terms as may seem expedient, and in particular to persons undertaking to build on, or improve any property in which the Company is interested and to tenants, builders and contractors.

To enter into any arrangements with any Government or Authorities, or any corporation, companies or persons that may seem conducive to the Company's objects or any of them, and to obtain from any such Government, Authority, Corporation, Company or person any charters, contracts, decrees, rights, privileges and concessions which the Company may think desirable, and to carry out, exercise and comply with any such charters, contracts, decrees, rights, privileges and concessions.

To undertake and perform sub-contracts, and also to act in any of the businesses of the Company, through or by means of agents, brokers, sub-contractors or others.

To pay all or any expenses incurred in connection with the formation, promotion and incorporation of the Company, or to contract with any person, firm or company to pay the same.

To pay commissions to brokers and others for underwriting, placing, selling or guaranteeing the subscription of any shares, debentures, debenture stock or securities of the Company.

To support and subscribe to any charitable or public object, and any institution, society or club which may be for the benefit of the Company or its employees, or may be connected with any town or place where the Company carries on business.

To give pensions, gratuities or charitable aid to any person or persons who may have served the Company, or to the wives, children or other relatives of such persons.

To make payments towards insurance.

To form and contribute to provident and benefit funds for the benefit of any persons employed by the Company.

To sell or otherwise dispose of the whole or any part of the undertaking of the Company either together or in portions, for such consideration as the Company may think fit, and in particular for shares, debentures or securities of any Company purchasing the same.

To do all such other things as may be deemed incidental or conducive to the attainment of the above objects or any of them, by the name of "Midland Estates, Limited", with a capital stock of Five Thousand Dollars divided into Fifty shares of one hundred dollars each, with the head office at the City of Moncton, in the County of Westmorland and Province of New Brunswick.
