THE WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION BOARD.

Notice of Assessment.

Notice is hereby given that under and by virtue of the powers conferred on this Board by the Workmen's Compensation Act, 1918, every employer who shall en-

gage in any of the industries named below is and shall be assessed at the rate mentioned opposite the name of such industry, upon the amount of the payroll of such employer (or otherwise, as the case may be) to be ascertained as provided in the said Act:

CLASS 1—Coal and other mining; reduction of ores and smelting; quarrying; manufacture of brick, glass, lime and cement; cutting and dressing of stone or marble; drilling and sinking of wells for gas or water.

CLASS 2—Sawmills; manufacture of pulp or paper; woodworking; planing mills; furniture factories; wicker and rattan work; logging; cutting of timber, pulpwood, firewood, railroad ties or sleepers; river driving; rafting; booming, or the transportation of logs, timber, pulpwood, firewood, railroad ties or sleepers; boat building; coffins; canoes; organs; pianos; artificial limbs.

CLASS 3—Manufacture of steel and iron and steel and iron products; car shops; manufacture and repair of automobiles; vehicles; steel erections; steel shipbuilding and repairing; automobile livery, etc.
