INTOXICATING LIQUOR ACT, 1927

The following Amendment and new
Regulations, which have been assented
to by the Chief Commissioner and ap-
proved by the Governor-in-Council, have
been passed by The New Brunswick Li-
quor Control Board (See Cap. 28, Sec. 8
(1) Revised Statutes, N. B.):

Amendment to Regulation No. 18.

Insert after the word "residence" in
the second line the words "of the pur-
chaser," and after the word "another" in
the second line, the words "residence of
the same purchaser"—the Regulation
then to read:

18. Liquor legally purchased under
the Act may be carried or conveyed from
one residence of the purchaser to another
residence of the same purchaser or from

any place where the same has been law-
fully purchased under the said Act; pro-
vided, however, that no such liquor shall
be consumed by any person while it is
being so conveyed or carried.

44. (1) The costs in all prosecutions
under The Intoxicating Liquor Act, 1927,
shall be the same as in The Summary
Convictions Act.

(2) The costs on appeals to a Judge
of the County Court shall be the same
as on Review in The Summary Con-
victions Act; but in no case shall they ex-
ceed fifteen dollars.

(3) The Court of Appeal, on hearing
and determining an appeal from a County
Court Judge, may, in its discretion, grant
costs to either party, such costs to be not
less than \$25.00 and not to exceed \$50.00.

45. When any vehicle, motor car,
automobile, vessel, boat, canoe or con-
veyance has been seized by the police un-
der this Act and which has not been
claimed by the owner or his representa-
tive, the said vehicle, motor car, auto-
mobile, vessel, boat, canoe or conveyance
shall, after a period of thirty days from
the date of such seizure, be forfeited to
His Majesty in the right of the Province.
This period may be extended even after
its expiration by Order of the Minister.

ing J. Emery LeBlanc, Merchant; J.
Owen LeBlanc, Merchant; and Simeon
A. Melanson, Merchant; all of College
Bridge, in the County of Westmorland
and Province of New Brunswick; for the
following purposes, namely:

To purchase, acquire and take over
as a going concern the general mercantile
business carried on by J. Emery LeBlanc,
J. Owen LeBlanc and Simeon A. Melan-
son at College Bridge in the County of
Westmorland and Province of New
Brunswick, under the firm name and
style of LeBlanc & Melanson, together
with all assets, stock-in-trade and per-
sonal property owned or used in con-
nection with the said business and the
good-will thereof, and the rights and con-
tracts now held by the said parties under
the said firm name and style LeBlanc &
Melanson, subject to the obligations, if
any, effecting same, and to carry on the
same and to pay for same in paid-up
shares of the Company when incorporat-
ed.

To carry on a general mercantile
business as wholesale and retail dealers
in groceries, hardware and dry goods, and
to buy and sell all kinds of groceries,
meats, fish, farm produce and every and
all kinds of goods, wares and merchan-
dise usually dealt in by retail and whole-
sale grocers and to buy and sell all kinds
of hardware and also to buy and sell all
goods and articles generally bought and
sold by wholesale and retail dry goods
merchants.

To carry on business as general deal-
ers both wholesale and retail in farm
produce and to act as commission agent
for farmers and wholesale and retail
grain and feed merchants.

To carry on business as wholesale and
retail dealers in farm machinery of all
kinds, to buy and sell same and to act
as Commission Agent for firms dealing
in farm machinery.

To carry on and operate a general
lumber, wood-working, manufacturing,
milling and builders' supply business in
all its branches, including the cutting,
sawing, manufacturing, buying, selling,
importing, exporting, and the dealing in
logs, timber, wood, posts, laths, shingles,
railway ties, and lumber of every kind
and description, manufactured or un-
manufactured, wholesale and retail, and
all work incidental thereto.

To manufacture, buy, sell and deal
in stone, brick, tiles, Portland and other
cements, lime, limestones, plaster, arti-
ficial stone, gravel, and all manner of
builders' supplies.

To own, buy, or build scows and
boats and operate same, and acquire, and
own gravel pits and gravel lands and
operate the same.

To buy, sell and deal in paper, paper
materials and roofing materials of every
nature.

To buy, sell and deal in coal, fire
wood and fuels of all kinds.

To buy, sell, lease or otherwise ac-
quire buildings, wharves, lands and rail-
way sidings and operate lumber yards,
railway sidings, cranes, hoisting gear and
other facilities for loading and discharg-
ing cars, vessels and scows and operating
wharves, vessels, tugs, schooners and
boats.

To carry on and operate a general
wood manufacturing and builders' sup-
ply business in all its branches, includ-
ing the purchase, manufacture and sale
of flooring, furniture of all kinds, house
furnishings and building materials of
every description and all articles made
wholly or partly of wood.

To erect, construct, and undertake
buildings of all kinds and undertake and
carry on construction work by contract
or otherwise.

To construct, own and operate ware-
house and kilndrying warehouse and to
carry on the business of warehousemen
and forwarding agents.

To draw, make accept, indorse, exe-
cute and issue promissory notes, bills of
