PROCLAMATION



By His Honour, Major-General, The Honourable Hugh Havelock McLean, K. C., V. D., LL. D., Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of New Brunswick.

HUGH HAVELOCK McLEAN,

WHEREAS, the Legislative Assembly of this province stands prorogued to Thursday the 3rd day of December, I have thought fit to further prorogue the said Legislative Assembly, and the same is hereby prorogued accordingly to Thursday the 14th day of January next.

THE WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION BOARD. CHANGES IN REGULATIONS

ORDERED—On the recommendation of the Workmen's Compensation Board that Regulation 2 and Regulations 16, 17, and 21, being amendments to Regulation 2, be repealed and the following Regulation be substituted therefor:

REGULATION 2.

Where not more workmen than the number set opposite to the names of an industry mentioned in the schedules below are usually employed therein, such industry is hereby excluded from the scope of Part I of the Act, and is withdrawn from the class in Regulation 1 in which it would otherwise be included; subject, however, to any conditions attached to such industry or to any conditions contained in the schedules and subject to the other regulations of the Board, so far as applicable.

Fishing 50
Mining, including prospecting or developing work) 5
"Any ship, tug, dredge, boat or any

other vessel, owned, managed or controlled, in the Province of New Brunswick that is engaged in any business that takes it without the boundaries of the Province 500 men"

Provided, however, that this Regulation does not apply to any ship, tug, dredge, boat or any other vessel that may be owned, managed, or controlled by His Majesty the King as represented by the Government of the Dominion of Canada in the person of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries and under the control or management of the agent of the Department of Marine and Fisheries having jurisdiction over the Province of New Brunswick.

Hand Laundries 25
Any boat or vessel, owned, managed or controlled in the Province of New Brunswick engaged in carrying freight, cargo or passengers from one part of the Province to another part of the Province 5

Aerial flying, testing, demonstrating; carrying of passengers or freight, either by aeroplane or other means of aerial transportation, including the carrying on or work in connection with an aerodrome and all work incidental thereto 200

The Honourable The Attorney-General Reports and Recommends for the Information of the Committee of the Executive Council:

That Section 3 in Schedule 3 of Regulation 2 as adopted on the 5th day of November, 1918, be repealed and the following substituted in lieu thereof:

ORDERED, On the recommendation of the Workmen's Compensation Board, that Regulation 1, under Section 45, 45-2, of the Act be repealed and the following substituted therefor:

REGULATION 1.

For the purpose mentioned in Section 45, 45-2, of the Act, classes mentioned in that section are hereby arranged and all industries within the scope of the Act shall be divided into the following classes:

Class 1.

Mining coal, including stripping operation; glass products of glassware and potteries; quarrying lime stone; crushing; burning; plaster manufacturing; mining other than coal; manufacture of brick; tile, sewerpipe, cement, concrete blocks; quarrying stone, sand, shale, clay or gravel pits; stone dressing; marble work or monument business; boring and drilling oil or gas wells, including sinking of artesian wells as a business; diamond drilling as a business; manufacture of oil from shale.

Class 2.

Logging, cutting of timber, pulpwood, firewood, railway ties, or sleepers, river driving, rafting, booming or the transportation of logs, timber, pulpwood, firewood, railroad ties or sleepers; saw mills, shingle mills, lath mills; box, barrel and shoop mills; rolling mills; excelsior manufacture; lumber yard, including delivery of lumber carried on in connection with

saw mill; wood-cutters; pulp mills, or pulp and paper mills.

Class 3.

Artificial limbs; wicker and rattan work;

wooden articles; bed springs; boat building not over 25 feet; manufacture of canoes; coffins; cooperage, hand work, joiner or cabinet work (shop only); furniture manufacture, including assembling; installation of pipe organs; mattress making; upholstering; organs and pianos; picture framing; planing and moulding mills; sash and door factories; including lumber yards and delivery in connection with same; commercial lumber yards; creosoting of railway ties and timber; brush and broom making; saw works, skate manufacturing; axe, spring and axle manufacturing; manufacture of stoves, furnaces, hot water boilers, radiators; pump manufacturing; shovel manufacturing; shot works; wire fencing and ornamental iron works; implements, agricultural machinery; tool makers not otherwise specified; lead pipe; car building; engine manufacturing; iron and steel foundries; machine shops; electric welding; boiler making; boiler and general metal repairs; machinery; repairs, including work outside of shop, erection of steel tanks for storage purposes; repair shops, including repair of storage batteries; vulcanizing; automobile assembling plant, service stations; making, repairing, and painting automobiles, waggons, carriages, sleighs or vehicles; blacksmith shops connected therewith; blacksmith shops when separate industry; installation and handling of machinery, including boilers, engines, elevators, digesters, iron stairs or ornamental iron work on buildings; refrigerating machinery and repairs; manufacture of bolts, nuts, nails, or screws, and wire; steel shipbuilding and repairing; manufacture of tin ware, including cutting, shaping, pressing or stamping; manufacture of sheet metal; metal roofing; corrugated metal for building purposes; manufacture of oxygen and dissolved acetylene gas, bakeries; manufacture of biscuits, confectionery; chocolates and cocoa, including delivery; cutting and storing of natural ice, including handling and delivery; coal and wood yards, including delivery; teaming of all kinds, including livery and transportation by automobile; canning and preparation of fruit, vegetables, fish and food stuffs, including can manufacture connected therewith; packing and preparing fish for market; manufacture of oil from fish; recovery of waste oil; packing houses, including abattoir; manufacture of paint, color, varnish oils; japans; turpentine, manufacture of non-hazardous chemicals, dyes, medicines, drugs, extracts; pharmaceutical toilet preparations; candles; perfumes and other toilet preparations; baking powder and yeast; manufacture of soap and glue; manufacture of tar; tarred, pitched, or asphalted papers; distilling coal tar and refining products obtained therefrom; manufacture of beverages of all kinds, also vinegar and the like; flour mills; manufacture of cereals or cattle feed; starch manufacturing;
