Workmen's Compensation Act be ap-proved, the same to come into effect Jan-lary 1st, 1933; thereby repealing all previous regulations:

REGULATIONS Regulation 1.

For the purpose mentioned in Sub-sec (1) and (2) of Section 46 of the Act, the classes mentioned in that section are hereby arranged and all industries within the scope of the Act shall be divided into

the scope of the Act and the following classes: CLASS 1-Mining coal, including strip-ping operation; glass products or glass-ware and potterles; quarrying lime stone; ware including: plaster manufacturcrushing; burning; plaster manufactur-ing; mining other than coal; manufacture of brick; tile, sewerpipe, coment. concrete blocks; quarrying stone, sand. shale, clay or gravel pits; stone dressing; marble works or monument business; boring and drilling oil or gas wells including sinking of artesian wells as a business; diamond drilling as a business; manufacture of oil from shale.

CLASS 3.—Artificial limbs; woodcutters; pup rattan work; wooden artcles; bed springs; boat building not over 25 feeet; manufacture of canoes; coffins; cooperage, hand work, joiner or cabinet work (shop only); furniture manufacture, including assem-bling; installation of pipe organs; mat-tress making; upholstering; organs and planos; ploture framing; planing and moulding mills; sash and door factories; including lumber yards and delivery in connection with same; commercial lumber yards; creeseting of railray ties and tim-ber; brush and broom making; saw works, skate manufacturing; axe, spring and axle manufacturing; axe, spring and axie manufacturing; manufacture of stoves, furnaces, hot water bollers, radiators; pump manufacturing; shovel manufactur-ing; shot works; wire fencing and orna-mental iron works; implements, agricul-tural machinery; tool makers not other-wise specified; lead pipe; car building; engine manufacturing; iron and steel foun-dries; machine shops; electric welding; dries; machine shops; electric welding; boiler making; boiler and general metal repairs; machinery; repairs, including work outside of shop, erection of steel tanks for storage purposes; repair shops, includ-ng repair of storage batteries; vulcaniz-ing; automobile assembling plant, service stations; making, repairing and painting automobiles, waggons, carriages, stations; sleighs or vehicles; blacksmith shops connected therewith; blacksmith shops when separate industry; installation and handling of machinery, including boilers, engines; elevators, digesters, iron stairs or ornamental iron work on buildings; reor ornamental iron work on buildings; re-frigerating machinery and repairs; manu-facture of bolts, nuts, nails, or screws, and wire; steel shipbuilding and repair-ing; manufacture of tin ware, including cuttng, shaping, pressing, or stamping; manufacture of sheet metal; metal roof-ing; corrugated metal for building pur-poses; manufacture of oxygen and dis-solved acetylene gas; bakeres; manufac-ture of biscuits, confectionery; chocolates and cocooa, including delivery; cutting and storing of natural ice, including hand-ling and delivery; coal and wood yards, including delivery and teaming of all kinds, including livery and transportation by auincluding livery and transportation by automobile; canning and preparation of fruit, vegetables, fish and food stuffs, including can manufacture connected therewith; packing and preparing fish for mar-ket; manufacture of oil from fish; recovery of waste oil; packing houses including abattoir; manufacture of paint, color, varnish, oils; japans; turpentine, manufac-ture of non-hazardous chemicals, dyes, medicines, drugs, extracts; pharmaceut-cal toilet preparations; candles; per-fumes and other toilet preparations; bak-ing powder and yeast; manufacture of chemicals not otherwise specified; manufacture of soap and glue; manufacture of tar; tarred, pitched, or asphalted papers; distilling coal tar and refinng products obtained theefrom; manufacture of bev-erages of all kinds, also vinegar and the like; flour mills; manufacture of cereals or cattle feed; starch manufacturing;

manufacture, storage, and sale of ferti-lizers; manufacture of dairy products, choose, condensed milk or cream; paschoese, condensed milk or cream; pas-tourizaton, including delivery; manufac-ture of tobacco, cigars, cigarettes or to-bacco products; spices or condiments; tea or coffee blending; sugar refineries; man-ufacture of asphalt material or paving material not otherwise classified; manu-facture of boots and shoes; leather goods or products; balling; saddlary; barness; or products; belting; saddlery; harness; trunks; vallees; rubber goods and repairs; manufacture of cotton, cotton waste, rugs, mat patterns, textiles or fabrics; spin-ning; knitting; weaving, flax mills; man-ufacture of varm thread hostics; selation hing; knitting; weaving, has hinry, cloth blankets, underwear, carpets, bags, felt hats; manufacture of clothing, whitewear, shrts, collars, corsets, hats other than shris, inabucacture of clothing, whitewear, shris, collars, corsets, hats other than feit, furs, fur robes, neckties or other special aticles not otherwise specified; oil clothing; sall making; awnings, tents; power hundries, dyeng, cleaning or bleaching; tannerles, wool pulling; pre-paration of hides; manufacture of ex-tracts from back; printing approximation paration of hides; manufacture of ex-tracts from bark; printing, engraving, lithographing, embossing; book-bnding; newspaper publishing; manufacture of or plating gold or silverware, including watch making and repairs; lens manufacturing; manufacture of boxes, cardboard and paper; hospitals, hotels, theatres, moving picture houses, film exchanges; golflinks, janitors, caretakers; wholesale and re-tail stores, general warehouses; cold stor-

iail stores, general warehouses; cold sold age warehouses; junk business; CLASS 4.—Erection steel buildings; window cleaning as a business; brick-laying; mason work or stone cutting not otherwise specified; building; general construction; concrete or cement work in or connected with buildings; excavat-ing for or connected with buildings; plastering; structural carpentry not oth-erwise specified; roofing; sheet metal work; metal roofing; siding, celling or the like; huidding construction (concrete); house wrecking or house moving; bill post ing and erection of bill boards; bill post-ing and erection of bill boards; laying hardwood floors when separate work; lathing; tile and marble setting; glazing or installation of plate or leaded glass; decorating or renovating; painting; elec-tric wiring of buildings; installation of lightness for the setting of the lighting fixtures; gas or steam fitting and plumbing; shipbuilding (wood); rigging; installation, erection or repairs of blast furnaces; fire escapes, windmills; lightning rods, high chmneys, stacks, elevated water tanks; stand pipes or water tow-ers; paintng high structures, elevated tanks, flag staffs, steeples, towers, bridge construction concrete arch or culvert, including approach, fills and all work incidental thereto; bridge construction not otherwise classified; construction, in-stallation, maintenance or operation of electric power lines or appliances; electric light systems; power plants; electric pail light systems; power plants; electric rail-ways; gas works, including natural gas; provincial, municipal or civic roads and streets, making and repairing diclusve of bridge construction; scavenging; street cleaning; snow or ice removal; culverts; construction not otherwise classified; concrete work or cement work not otherwise classified; sewer and water works construction; tunnelling; shaft sinking or well dig-ing; laying of mains and house connections; trenching less than six feet for gas pipes. water pipes or wire conduits; wood stave pipe insulation; maintenance and opera-ton of water works; telegraph and telephone companies, operation, maintenance, priore companies, operation, maintenance, extension of lines and making service connections; office and exchange; con-struction of dry docks, piers, wharves, breakwaters or other harbor improve-ments, including dredging, subaqueous construction or pile driving; tunnelling, rock work or blasting; rallway construc-tion; bridge construction (steel); operation of dry docks, including repair work on vessels; machine shops fabrication of steel marine railways; dam construction (concrete, wood or earth) and all work connected with same, including excavat-ing and blastng and preliminary sur-veys; painting steel or wooden bridges and high steel structures. CLASS 5.-Warehousing and handling of grain, operation of grain elevators grain; operation of grain elevators; of of grain; operation of grain elevators; distribution and handling of fuel oil for steamers; including storage; stevedoring (including loading of scows, barges, rail-way cars); freight handlers, checkers, sugar samplers; express companies, in-cluding hazard of railway transportation; fishing of all kinds; ferries, steamers (in-cluding river, and hardway caller and hardway). cluding river and harbor sailing vessels,

steam boats, tug boats, steam lighters, water boats, harbor work only; marine wreckage and salvage; operation of rail-ways, including ordinary maintenance, roadhed and all work connected with railway operation and maintenance. Regulation 2.

Where not more workmen than the number set opposite to the names of an industry mentioned in the schedules be-low are usually employed therein, such industry is hereby excluded from the scope of Part 1 of the Act, and is with-drawn from the class in Regulation 1 in which it would otherwise be included; subject, however, to any conditions at-tached to such industry or to any ccon-ditions contained in the schedules, and subject to the other regulations of the Board, so far as applicable.

Regulation 3.

The interpretation of words and phrases provided for in Section 2 of the Act shall apply to these and all other regulations of the Workmen's Compensation Board.

tion Board. Regulation 4. Whenever the word "Act" appears in any of these regulations or in any regu-lations that may be passed by the Board, it shall refer to The Workmen's Com-pensation Act, and amendments thereto or that may be hereafter made. Regulation 5.

Regulation 5.

Every employer within the scope of Part 1 of the Act, shall as directed by the Board, post up and keep posted up in conspicuous places within easy access of his workmen, such card or pamphlet of information concerning the Act, or regulations of the Board, as may be suppled to him by the Board, and a copy of the Act if so desired. Regulation 6.

Any person who contravenes any regu-lation of the Workmen's Compensation Board after it has become effective, where no other penalty is provided there-for, shall, for the contravention thereof incur a penalty not exceeding \$500,00.

Regulation 7.

Every person who contravenes any of the provisions of Section 14 of the Act, shall for every contravention, incur a penalty not exceeding \$50.00; and shall liable pay to the workman any sum which has been so deducted from his wages, or which he has been required or permitted to pay in contravention of Section 14.

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Regulation 8.

For every contravention of sub-sections 4 or 5 of Section 41 of the Act the employer shall incur a penalty not exceeding \$50.00.

Regulation 9.

Regulation 5. Any employer and every person who obstructs or hinders the making of the examinations and inquiry mentioned in Section 71, sub-section 1 and 2 of the Act. or refuses to permit it to be made shall incur a penalty not exceeding \$500. Regulation 10.

Any employer and every such person who obstructs or hinders the making of any inspection made under the authority
