FOUR POUND LOAVES, FIVE POUND LOAVES. SIX POUND LOAVES.

Each Loaf tobe distinctly marked with the figure denoting the Weight thereof, and also with the Initials of the Baker's name; and each and every Loaf of Bread which shall be found deficient in Weight, shall be seized by the Clerk of the Market, as the Law directs : And for each and every Loaf not marked as herein before directed, the Baker shall forfeit and pay the Sum of Five Shillings.

IT IS ORDERED that the price of the One Pound" Wheaten Loaf shall be three-pence half penny -and for other Loaves in proportion.
