

Earl of Belmore, Gov. of Jamaica, have arrived out.

Lord Cochrane is said to have resigned his command in the Grecian navy.

The Theatre Royal at Glasgow was burnt down on the 8th January. At the time the fire took place the company was rehearsing a piece which was to have been played the following evening. Sir W. Curtis died on the 18th Jan. at Ramsgate, aged 77.

LONDON, JAN. 27.

We have a Turkey mail this morning with dates from Constantinople of the 26th ultimo. The letters state that the treaty of Commerce with the United States had been agreed upon by the Sultan. The Sultan was still at his camp at Ramis Tschlick, and troops from Asia continued to arrive, and were exercised by the Sultan in person. All warlike operations appear suspended. The Prussian Minister had invited the Porte to send an Ambassador to Poros, to treat of the pacification of Greece, but this had been declined. The greatest tranquility prevailed at Constantinople.

The most important rumour, and which is thought to rest upon some authority, is that an Ambassador Plenipotentiary from St Petersburg may be shortly expected here with propositions from the Emperor, regarding the basis of a Treaty with Turkey.

On the 19th of November, Mr. Dawkins, the English Minister in Greece, transmitted his credentials to the President. This is a positive recognition of the Greek Government by Great-Britain.

A letter from Navarino, dated December 27, states that the French army in the Morea was to depart in three divisions. A vessel bringing a part of the 1st division arrived at Marseilles January 16.

**New Viceroy.**—The Courier of the 20th announces, positively, the appointment of the Duke of Northumberland to the Lord Lieutenancy of Ireland. The King was coming from Windsor, for the meeting of Parliament. The Duke was to be presented to the King, for leave taking, on the 2d of February, and would take his departure for Ireland on the 4th.

**Important.**—The Russian Ambassador extraordinary has arrived at Dover, and is understood to be the bearer of very important propositions to our government, which if met with corresponding feeling by the Sultan, will put an end to the hostilities in the north of Europe.

We have also despatches and letters by express from Vienna, which mention that the Reis Effendi in an interview with the Ambassador for the Netherlands had stated that the Sultan his master was not unwilling to treat for peace if the Emperor of Russia was sincere in his desires to obtain one, and that upon a proper understanding, the Sultan would not hesitate to send an Ambassador to meet the Envoys of the other allied powers upon the subject. This may be considered as important intelligence, and we have little doubt of its accuracy.

**ARMY NEWS.**—By the death of Sir B. Spencer, his Excellency Lieut. Genl. Sir James KEMPT, G. C. B. and K. O. H. succeeds to the Colonelcy of the 40th Regiment, and Lieut. Genl. Sir William Inglis, Lieut. Governor of Kinsale, succeeds to the Government of Cork. Lieut. Genl. Sullivan to the Lieut. Governorship of Kinsale; and Major Genl. Jackson, of the Royal Staff Corps is appointed to the 81st Regiment, vice Sir James Kempt. — *Quebec Star*, March 18.

#### HALIFAX, NOTICE TO MARINERS.

Five large Spar-Buoys have been moored in the Channel, leading from the Gulf Stream, through the harbour of Key West, into the Bay of Mexico. Vessels drawing 9½ feet of water, and bound to Mobile, Pensacola, New Orleans, &c., can, by observing the following directions, pass through this Channel with perfect safety, and thus avoid the tedious and dangerous navigation of the Gulf.

They are moored in the deepest water, and can be distinctly seen from each other. The bearings are as follows:—

The first Buoy, at the entrance of the Channel, and nearly in the harbor of Key West, bears from K. W. Light-house, by compass, N. W. by W. 1 mile; second do. bears from the first Buoy, N. W. by N.; third do. bears from second N. W. ½ N.; fourth do. bears from the third N. W. ½; fifth do. on the bar, bears from the Light-house N. W. by W.

The shoalest water, at low water, is ten feet, and at high water, 12½, on the bar.

Vessels requiring pilots can obtain them at Key West, as there is a Board of Branch Pilots established.
