

**RETREAT FARM, WINDSOR.**—Thomas King, Esq. has planted this spring, 60 acres with grain, and 20 with potatoes and turnips; 70 acres of his fine farm are laid down in grass, and 100 more are used as pasture.—*Id.*

**NAVAL BALL.**—On Thursday, the 18th inst., the Officers of His Majesty's Ship Hussar, gave a Ball and Supper, on board the ship, to a very large party, embracing much of the beauty and fashion of Halifax and its Garrison. A correspondent has furnished us with a description of the scene, but as it extends to some eight pages of foolscap, our limits have compelled us to withhold it. We shall, however, avail ourselves of a few of its details, and leave it to the imaginations of our readers to supply the rest. The party went on board about half past eight, in covered Boats, the Rifle Band playing some fine airs during the brief passage. The Ladies having retired to the Admiral's cabin, to arrange their dresses, entered at once on a scene of great beauty and magnificence. The deck of the ship was fitted up as a Ball Room, at one extremity was a fine transparency, representing the charge of the Guards, under Sir Peregrine Maitland, at the memorable battle of Waterloo, of which event the 18th was the anniversary—the space from the stern to the mizen mast was fitted up as an Egyptian tent—that between the mizen and main as a Turkish tent, and cottages, grottos, pagodas, and fortune-tellers, were scattered over the scene, offering a very pleasing variety on which the eyes of the company might rest, and into the mysteries of which their spirits might enquire during the brief intervals afforded by the Quadrille. Our correspondent has furnished us with the replies of the Oracle to some of her loveliest visitors, but we have the fear of the old Lady's wrath before our eyes, and dare not venture to reveal them. About half past twelve the company, more than 320 persons, repaired to the supper tables, which were spread upon the main deck, and to which every variety of rare and delicate viands appeared to invite them. The party left the ship at a late hour, delighted with the hospitality and taste of their gallant entertainers; when the Ball-Room and Supper Tables were taken possession of by the Jacks, who danced and regaled till day light, if not with as much elegance, certainly with as much lightness of heart, as the more refined groups by which they had been preceded.—*Id.*

*Pictou, N. S., June 17.*

A direct ship was drifting in the ice near the Magdalen Islands all winter; the inhabitants boarded her on the ice, and plundered her of all her rigging, stores, and part of her cargo, consisting of deals and staves—the word "Quebec" was seen on her stern, but the ship's name was under the ice—the Islanders have divided the booty among them.

A brig supposed the Joseph of Whitehaven, from Liverpool or London, bound to Quebec or Montreal, went ashore, and was abandoned on the Bird Islands, early in May last. She had a full cargo of assorted Goods, which, together with the materials of the ship, have been plundered by sailing vessels and others belonging to the Magdalen Islands, Chatecamp, in Cape Breton, St. Peters, Miquelon, &c., &c. Some of the property has been sold for the benefit of all concerned; but the largest part has been converted to private use by the salvors.

**PIRATES.**—The following is an extract of a letter from Havana:—We have at last caught some of the pirates, and find them to be citizens of Havana! They will be hanged. One of them, in prison, requested the jailor to send four segars, from himself, as a present. The singular circumstance of a prisoner's sending presents abroad, excited suspicion; and the segars were opened. Tell
