Having taken the Oath, which was printed on two large sheets of pasteboard, the Noble Lord, according to custom, went up to the Speaker, who shook him very cordially by the hand. The Noble Lord then retired behind the Chair, and was greeted in a similar manner by many Honorable Members.

MANCHESTER, May 5.

Since I sent my letter of this morning, I am sorry to say that there has been a strong muster of the mob of St. George's Road and New Cross—and they have been busy in entering the provision shops, and helping themselves to all they contained, not forgetting to take all the money they could find, and also stopping the Yorkshire coaches as they came into town. About one o'clock a strong muster of them were making for the Market-place, but they have been dispersed by the military and police. It has put a stop to all business, and most of the shops in the direction of the rioters are closed. They are very strong this afternoon in several parts of the town, and have been plundering the shops in all directions. Their plan is to go on in strong parties before the shops and houses, and give an huzza, and if the owners do not give them either bread or money, they destroy the windows.

The Magistrates are swearing in a great number of special Constables, as it is expected the mob will be very troublesome during the night. We have some fresh troops in during the day, and a number more are expected in the morning.

The Magistrates have issued a great number of bills throughout the town, desiring all the shops to be closed at eight o'clock, and all parties to keep within doors. The soldiers are parading the different parts of the town and are expected to remain out during the whole of the night.

The rioters seem to get stronger in numbers, and a great many country people are in the town.

The soldiers have taken a great number of rioters up during the day, but I believe they have not got the parties that set the factory on fire. The damage done is calculated at between £20,000 and £30,000.
