

things, under existing circumstances, it is desirable to avoid altogether. [Cheers.]

I abandon the Veto, therefore, first, because it is no rational security, and secondly, because objections may be made to it which are not worth raising. It is better that we should not take securities which are manifestly of no efficacy. [Cheers.] It would be ridiculous, it seems to me, to appoint a commission of Roman Catholic Prelates to certify the character for loyalty of a candidate for a See in Ireland. It would give no power to the Crown, while it would impose a responsibility on the Crown. It would be infinitely fairer not to take securities of no value. So likewise as to the examination of the intercourse with the See of Rome, there is no objection existing to it, but I confess I have no desire myself to inspect it. [Hear, hear.]

#### TO CORRESPONDENTS.

"A SUBSCRIBER," and "PHILO-BIBLION" are inadmissible.

The following are the only variations in the Catholic Relief Bill from the abstract we gave last week:—

In the oath to be taken by Catholics on admission to Parliament, the former avowal of that faith, "I, A. B., do declare that I profess the Roman Catholic religion," is omitted: no Roman Catholic can be Regent of the Kingdom: the Catholic Clergy are forbid to assume the titles of the English or Irish bishops or archbishops under the penalty of 100l. By the 14th clause not only are all public and ostentatious displays of Roman Catholic ceremonies prohibited, under heavy penalties, but some of the religious orders, which are most essential to the Roman Catholic system, are discouraged or suppressed. Every Jesuit at present in the kingdom is required, under the penalty of 50l. to be registered with the clerks of the peace in the course of six months from the passing of this act. No Jesuit is afterwards permitted to enter it without rendering himself guilty of misdemeanor, and becoming liable to banishment; and no superior, or member of the order, shall admit a brother into the order or community, and administer the oath or vows necessary on the occasion, without rendering himself guilty of a misdemeanor. Banishment from the kingdom is likewise to be the punishment of any Jesuit who, after the passing of this act, takes the vows. Nothing in this act directed against the increase or calculated for the suppression of religious orders, shall affect the religious communities or establishments of females.

The bill is so constructed as not to allow of Mr. O'Connell's taking his seat unless he is re-elected: it only allows Catholics to sit in Parliament who shall be "hereafter" elected.

#### PORTUGAL.

The accounts from Portugal are most afflicting. Don Miguel has caused, of his own will and pleasure, the execution of six persons against whom the legal tribunals had passed sentence of transportation only—and more are to suffer! It is new, even in Lisbon, to see blood flow in the season of Lent. The disgust of the People is of course great. And the Pope's Nuncio is stated in a private letter to have said, "Never was the name of religion and of the altar oftener mentioned at Lisbon than since Miguel's return, and never was the altar of religion more abused, scorned, and disrespected, than by his adherents."
