Don Miguel yesterday, while driving his two sisters in a sont of phæton, overset the carriage and broke his right thigh ; both the Princesses were thrown from the vehiclethe elder, Donna Izabel Maria had her forehead severely bruised and cut ; and the younger, Donna Maria d' Assumcao, received a contusion in the upper part of the left leg.-An official bulletin has been issued, stating the fracture to be a simple one, accompanied by a slight contusion.
