A Proclamation.

WHEREAS the General Assembly of this Province, stands prorogued to Tuesday the first day of June next: I have thought fit to prorogue the said General Assembly, and the same is hereby prorogued to the Tuesday in September next ensuing.

Given under my Hand and Seal at Fredericton, the thirty-first day of May, in the Year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and thirty, and in the Eleventh Year of His Majesty's Reign.
