They had walked several miles, and were returning to their boat, when, about four o'clock, a number of young wild ducks appeared in the creek they were then passing, and they tried to send a Newfoundland dog belonging to the Captain in after them; but as the dog did not see the ducks, Captain D. waded in to induce him to follow, requesting Mr. W. to go lower down and prevent their escape in that direction. In a little time the first Lieutenant saw that the water was much deeper than they had anticipated, and called to Cap. D. to take care of his watch which he apparently attended to. Soon after this the first lieutenant saw him swimming, and directly made for a ford, at some distance below to meet him on the other side. Almost immediately afterwards he heard the Captain call out something which he could not distinctly understand, and he hastened across the ford. The ground here was so rugged that it was impossible for Mr. W. to sing, and although only about half a minute had passed, when he again looked for him, he disappeared. - tions and appointments. - viz.
