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of trade in Ireland deprived them of the means of supporting their large families, and induced them to emigrate to these Provinces, their passage money having been paid, as mentioned above, by public subscription.

Such was the story of these poor Emigrants, who were thus cast perfectly destitute upon our shores. Owing to the unprecedented influx of Settlers this season, no hope of employment on the Public works in this and the Upper Province was to be entertained, the number of hands being fully employed; and the Superintendent was exceedingly at a loss to point out any method of relief to these industrious strangers. It having been reported, however, that a security of laboring hands, to work at the harvest, and on the new roads, was most advantageous to direct their steps to that section of the country. By the very great kindness and liberality of Mr. Shaw and Mr. Ryan, Agents to the Steam Boat Companies, who promptly granted a free passage to each place on the River as the Emigrants might select for landing, Mr. Buchanan was finally enabled to direct them to situations, where he had good ground for thinking, if they followed his advice, that they would find employment, and a portion of them in the avocations to which they had been accustomed.

It is to be hoped that the above occurrence, as well as the fact of such a number of Pauper Emigrants having been sent out without means, and in a manner every way so careless and improvident, will draw public attention to an evil which may become in time of serious consequence. We have reason to believe the matter will not escape notice in the highest quarter here, being fully convinced that His Majesty's Government will never sanction the unrestricted introduction of an unlimited number of paupers into these Colonies, without being certain that proper arrangements have been made, and proper precautions taken to prevent their becoming a burthen instead of a benefit to a rising Province. When, some time ago, we spoke favorably of the plan adopted by the Pauper Emigrants in England, of sending out their superabundant families in England, we did so under the impression that sufficient means were to be secured to them on arrival, to enable them to commence an immediate and active career of industry and utility. Under proper authority, and intelligent management, this might easily be done. But against such steps on the part of the parishes as were taken by the Magistrates of Kildare, we strongly protest on the ground of justice and common humanity. Most undoubtedly a very wide field for the industrious laborer as presented in this flourishing Colony; and it cannot be denied that the effect of the liberal grants of the Provincial Legislature, for the improvement of internal communications, has during the last two years, been most beneficially felt, and has mainly tended to afford means of employment and support to a very considerable number of the laboring and Emigrant population. —*Quebec Official Gaz.* 19th of August.

The Halifax mail has furnished us with English dates to the 24th July received at that place by the Albion from Aberdeen. The most prominent articles of intelligence are the Funeral of our lamented Sovereign George the Fourth—the prorogation of the Imperial Parliament by His Majesty in person;—and the Fall of Algiers. Having pointed in detail the most important articles, we are obliged notwithstanding to omit several extracts already in Type. The stipulations offered to the Dey of Algiers by the French General of an unconditional surrender of the City and the Marine, were such as might have been expected from the conquest. By this bold and successful expedition, the French Army has acquired considerable renown and must have exceeded the expectation of the French Government; whilst it affords subject matter of exultation to the christian world to see oppression and tyranny laid low in the dust. We may now fondly anticipate

the happy era, when light and knowledge will overspread the delightful gardens of Egypt, and when the countries which have hitherto been the scourge and terror of mankind, will be added to the list of civilized nations.

We refer our readers to the following Summary:—

LONDON, July 19.

It is confidently rumoured that changes are about to take place in composition of the Ministry—this we think extremely probable. We have looked to the junction of Mr. Huskisson and Lord Palmerston and Mr. Charles Grant. It is said that Lord Lansdowne is also about to enter the ministry. We know not on what authority the rumour rests.

His Majesty has commended the discontinuance of mountachies in the army, excepting in the Hussars, of whose costume it properly forms a part.—*Court Journal.*

The appointments in the Household are fast filling up. The Duke of Montrose has resigned the office of Lord Chamberlain, which is filled by the Earl of Jersey; and the Duke of Buckingham is appointed Lord Stewart, vice the marquis of Conyngham, who, with his family has left Windsor Castle.

HOUSE OF COMMONS.—*Canadas.*—Mr. LeBouché hoped the Colonial Secretary would pledge himself to forward the Canada question, with a view to its settlement next session.

Sir G. Murray said, that he certainly should bring the question forward at an early period next session.

JULY 21.

The monitor of Friday announces the appointment of General Bourmont to be a marshal of France, and Admiral Duperre to the Peerage.

The French papers now affirm that the treasury found in the Casbah, at Algiers, amounts to about £2,400,000 in gold. The expenses of the expedition were estimated at £4,000,000; the treasure in the vaults of the Casbah will not therefore, suffice for a pecuniary indemnity.

We are enabled to state, from the highest authority, that his Majesty's visit to Scotland, will not take place this year.—*Mercury.*

DOWNING STREET, July 19.—The King has been pleased to appoint Lieutenant General Lord Aylmer, K.C.B. to be Captain General and Governor-in-Chief of the Provinces of Lower and Upper Canada, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and the Island of Prince Edward.

The King has been pleased to appoint Major General George Mackie to be Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Island of St. Lucia.

WAR OFFICE, July 20.—*Staff.*—Brevet Lieut. Colonel William Beresford, from the staff in North America, to be Permanent Assistant Quartermaster-General, vice Brooke, appointed Deputy Quartermaster-General in Nova Scotia; Major Horatio George Brooke, Permanent Assistant Quartermaster-General, to be Deputy Quartermaster-General to the troops serving in Nova Scotia, with the rank of Lieut. Colonel in the army, vice Beresford.

79th Foot.—Brevet Lieutenant-Colonel D. McDougall, from the half pay, to be Major, vice Marshall, appointed Inspecting Field-Officer of Militia in Nova Scotia; dated July 16.

The King held a Court and Council at St. James's Palace, on Saturday. His Majesty has commanded cards of invitation, for a grand dinner party at the Castle, to be issued to upwards of sixty of the nobility and gentry. We understand, that the King has intimated his determination of mixing frequently with his people, and of walking in the Park, as was the practice of George the Third, in the early part of his reign.

His Majesty held his first Levee on the 21st July, which was attended by the different Foreign Ministers—the members of the Royal Family—a very large number of Nobility and Gentry, and of Officers of the Army and Navy, among whom we observe the names of Sir Howard Douglas, Sir Charles Ogle, and Ward Chipman Esq.

Addresses of condolence on the death of his late Majesty, and of congratulations on the accession of the present King were sending in from all parts of the Kingdom.

His Majesty has complied with the request of both Houses of Parliament, for the removal of Sir Jonah Barrington from the office of Judge of the Admiralty Court of Ireland.

The elections in France were favorable to the opposition. The Journal des Debates publishes as a result, so far as they had gone. For the opposition 242, for the ministry 127.

The Dey of Algiers has selected Leghorn as the place of his future residence, where a frigate was appointed to convey him.

Sir Sydney Smith, has been appointed Lieut. General of marines.

The King has been pleased to direct that Sir Robert Wilson shall be restored to his rank in the army. The promotion to the rank of field Marshal of General Sir Alured Clark, G.C.B. the Gen. Officer of the longest standing in the army, will appear in this day's Gazette. The General is 90 years of age.—*Sun.* 23d July.

His Majesty will hold Levees on the 28th inst. and 4th August.

The Coronation, it is said, will take place on the 21st October, the anniversary of the Battle of Trafalgar.

The conquest of Algiers is said to have cost the French 1200 men, 3500 more having been wounded. The Algerines have lost 10,000 men. 1500 pieces of artillery in bronze, 30 vessels, consisting of frigates, corsairs, armed sloops, besides munitions of war, and fifty-five millions of francs, have fallen into the hands of the French.

ALGERS, July 8.—Notice has been given to Turkish subjects to quit the territory of Algiers immediately; that those among them who possess real property had a delay of eight months to sell it, and that at the expiration of that time the property not disposed of should be sold by public auction; and that the French vessels should be conveyed by the regecy of Algiers, with an express prohibition to return.

From the New York Albion, 28th August.

It has been recently stated, and upon the best authority, that the Agent for New-Brunswick in London, Mr. Bliss, had communicated to his friends in that Province his apprehensions that the West India ports would be opened in September next. We have also in our possession private information in relation to Mr. M'Lane's negotiations, which lead us to the same conclusion. Under all these circumstances we should be wanting in duty to our Colonial friends if we did not distinctly intimate to them that the chances of this trade remaining closed are materially diminished. But most of the accounts nevertheless, concur in affirming that whatever changes may take place in the shipping trade, the general interests of the Northern Provinces will be materially benefited by Nova Scotia, New-Brunswick, &c. when taken into the West India ports from those of the United States. It is further stated that a requisition will be imposed, obliging American vessels to take away the amount of their outward-bound cargo in the produce of the utility in enabling the West Indies to carry on a barter trade, and thereby relieving themselves of much of their superfluous produce in return for articles of the first necessity.

We take leave of the subject now, expressing our belief that His Majesty's Ministers have acted with the best feelings towards the Colonies, and have been actuated by the paramount motive of protecting the interests of the empire at large. We do not

think that the opposition to this measure exists to the extent that it did a few months since.

SHOCKING AFFAIR.—A most wanton and inhuman attack has been made on several Cows, the property of industrious and peaceable settlers at Lancaster, in the vicinity of this City. Some of the animals were so dreadfully wounded, by having their throats cut in several places, as to be unable to rise without assistance, while others were maimed, in such a manner as to be incapable of doing more particular in the receipt of the villain whose revenge could carry him so far as to disable, and render useless to his neighbour, a harmless and inoffensive animal deserves, we think, as severe punishment as a blood-thirsty murderer or the midnight robber.—We trust the vagabond will not escape without the punishment he so justly deserves.

CORPORATION NOTES.—We understand that the Corporation intend to issue small notes, to the amount of £1000. The design of this issue, is to enable that body, to go on with several improvements now in hand, without having recourse to borrowing money, by which means interest on that amount will be saved. It is said that the income of the Corporation arising from rents of land and licences, is now nearly £4,000 per annum besides the statute labor; and as the Notes thus issued will be received in payment of rents; licences, &c. no inconvenience can arise to the public from their circulation. At the present time when nearly as much labour can be had for £100, as formerly could be had for £300. The application of funds to real improvements, will be a permanent advantage to the community.—*City Gazette.*

TRADE.—It is with pleasure we state, that notwithstanding the many complaints of the dullness of Trade, and scarcity of the circulating medium, there will be a greater number of and larger sized houses built, in this town, this year, than in any one previous.—The amount of imports and exports for the Midsummer quarter, is greater; and the amount of duties paid, during that period, both at the Customs and Treasury, far exceed the corresponding quarter of any previous year.—*St. Andrews Herald.*

MELANCHOLY OCCURRENCE.—The Rev. J. SNELLGROVE, of the Wesleyan Missionary Society, appointed to officiate in New-Brunswick, was, on the 19th inst. on his passage from London, in the Barque Hebe, 39 days out, whilst the vessel was laying to in a gale of wind, on the Banks of Newfoundland, by a sudden lurch of the ship, thrown overboard, and thus suddenly precipitated from the midst of life into eternity. His body immediately sunk and was not seen afterwards.—*Id.*

John Knapp, has been found guilty of the murder of Mr. White of Salem, and received sentence of death. The trial of Jos. Knapp, Jun. and George Crowsfield is postponed till the next term of the Court which will sit on the 9th November next. We shall furnish our readers with all the particulars that have come to our knowledge respecting this diabolical affair in our next number.

A Temperance Society has been organized in St. John, the Rules of which are in Type, but for want of room are postponed until next week.

The number of Rations required daily, will be as follows:—Saint John about Eight, and Fredericton from Five to Fifteen.

The Ration of Forage, per Diem, to consist as follows:—

HAY, --- 14 lb. (Fourteen Pounds).  
OATS, --- 10 lb. (Ten Pounds).  
STRAW, 6 lb. (Six Pounds).

The Hay to be of plump, interval, or dyked, marsh, sweet and good, either Timothy or Clover, or a mixture of both, and to have been cut at least three months previous to delivery to the Troops.

The Oats to be of a sweet, clean, and wholesome quality, and not to weigh less than Thirty-four pounds to the bushel.

The following substitutions will be allowed in the case of Sick Horses, viz:—

1 lb. of Barley, or 3 lb. of Malt, or 1-3 lb. of Oatmeal, or 1-1-3 lb. of Bran, In lieu of 1 lb. Oats

It being expressly understood that such substitution shall be limited to 11-2 lb. of Oats daily for each Sick Horse.

The Straw to be either Oaten or Barley, and of a dry and proper quality.

The Contractor will issue the Forage to the Troops from this Depot, (which is to be near the Barracks) on orders received from the Commissariat,—to the Staff, Departments, and Regiments, three days in the week, to such officers as may require it, to be issued at those periods.
