But he thinks he should be neglecting a sacred and important duty, if he hesitated to notify his Excellency that if the above mentioned measure be sanctioned by the Congress, and carried into effeet, the Treaty between Great Britain and Colombia will be instantly ipso facto annulled by that act, and the functions of the undersigned as British Enevoy to the Republics must immediately cease.
