By the arrival of the Miramichi Courier on Sunday last, we were unexpectedly furnished with very late and important intelligence from England. We have been politely favoured with London and Liverpool papers to the 23d of April brought by the brig Britannia, 25 days from Liverpool to the Port of Miramichi.

The Reform question was last on the evening of Tuesday the 19th April by a majority of 8, there being 291 votes for the ministers, and 299 against them. It appears that the division took place on a motion of General Gascoyne's for retaining the present number of English representatives; and though the point at issue did not affect the principle of the Bill, both parties willingly closed on it as a trial of strength.

Which of the two will ultimately succeed in this mighty struggle for pre-eminence, it is not for us to predict. The result, however has been, the sudden prorogation of Parliament with a view to its immediate dissolution. Our readers will perceive from the tenor of the King's speech that the views of His Majesty are in accordance with those of his Ministers, and that His Majesty is fully determined on supporting them in their system of Reform.

In having recourse to the sense of the people, His Majesty has been influenced only by a paternal anxiety for the contentment and happiness of his subjects. During the discussion which took place previous to the arrival of the King, both Houses of Parliament presented a scene of confusion and uproar.

We are grieved to learn that the disturbances in Ireland continue to increase to an alarming extent. In the County of Clare the most sanguinary deeds have been committed. Five policemen while engaged in apprehending emissaries from the insurgents who were engaged in administering unlawful oaths, were overpowered and literally stoned to death.

Fences are broken down, fields turned up, and arms seized in the open day. Resistance seems to be out of the question. There is no law and no authority to which the least regard is paid. The accounts from Galway are of the same frightful description, and the consequences will be truly alarming, unless Government afford the necessary protection to the lives and property of the well affected part of the community.

Sailed, on Sunday morning, His Majesty's Packet Opussum, Lt. Peter, Richmond—Passengers Col. Creagh and Lady Miss Creagh, and Captain Creagh.—Royal Gazette.

We are in receipt of a private letter by the last Mail from Bermuda which states that ill health was the cause of Col. Creagh's removal—he is very much regretted both by Officers and Men—Capt. Hall assumes the command of the 81st Regt. Adjutant McDonald, and Lady embarked on board the freight Ship Woodford on the 23d April, on sick leave.

From a number of men receiving free discharges the strength of the service companies are only 330. The recruiting has been so rapid at home for the last 3 months, that the reserve companies by the Monthly returns for march are 322.

It may be proper to observe that there are 6 service companies and 4 reserve. It is confidently expected the 81st Regiment will go to England in October next.

We have further to communicate the gratifying intelligence of the continued and uninterrupted success of the Polish Army against their gigantic oppressors.—The Polish Army which now numbers 100,000 has obtained another signal victory over the Russians who are said to be in full retreat upon all points.

The following are the Official particulars:—Head Quarters at Siedlec, April 10, 9 p. m. To the National Government.—I have great satisfaction in announcing to the Government, that the Polish Army obtained a considerable victory yesterday. We have taken several cannons, and 8000 or 4000 prisoners; amongst whom are nearly 300 officers of different ranks. General Promydzynski, commanding a separate corps, covered himself with glory. The advanced hour of the evening does not permit me to give a more detailed report.

Warsaw, April 11.—Another affair has taken place at Wengrow, under General Uminksi who has passed the river Lwinski. He took 400 prisoners of Russian Guards, the choicest of the Army, and obtained possession of several valuable magazines. Samogitia and Luthania have been in a state of revolt since the 29th March. An estate which arrived last night, brings information that a revolution has also broken out in Volhynia.

CORONER'S INQUESTS.
On Friday last an inquest was held on view of the body of John M. Coldwell, by Wm. Taylor, Esquire. Verdict, accidentally drowned by the upsetting of a canoe while crossing the river.

The deceased came to this place about six years since from the Province of Nova Scotia; he had embraced religion in early life, and joined the Baptist Society there, and from his

whole outward deportment gave demonstrative proofs that he possessed that "faith that works by love and purifies the heart," ever maintaining that uniformity of conduct from day to day, that so beautifully adorns the Christian character. Since joining the Baptist Society here, he was chosen as one of their Deacons, which place he filled with so much Christian dignity, that he might justly be called a burning and a shining light, and by his very sudden death the Church has lost one of its brightest ornaments. But when we come for a moment to reflect, that he is only taken from the nursery of Grace below, and transplanted into the paradise of God above, the Church can join with his pious partner, and say,—"the Lord gave, and the Lord hath taken away and blessed be the name of the Lord."

"Mark the perfect man, and behold the upright, for the end of that man is peace."
The deceased was 32 years of age, and has left a widow and three young children.

A Coroner's Inquest was held on Saturday evening last, by Wm. Taylor Esq., on the body of Henry Donnelly, found drowned nearly opposite to the Steam Boat landing. It appeared in evidence, that the deceased had been an apprentice to Mr. James Everitt of Kingsclear, Blacksmith, and while engaged in fishing in front of his residence, he accidentally lost his life by the upsetting of a canoe.
