

**HIS MAJESTY** having announced to Parliament the progress of a formidable disease from the eastern parts of Europe to the Ports in the Baltic, from whence much commercial intercourse is carried on with the British Dominions, has been pleased to issue His Royal commands that every necessary step be taken for preventing the importation of this disease (which is highly contagious in its nature) into this Province, whereof all Magistrates, and other Persons concerned, will take due notice, and use their utmost vigilance and exertions, in their several stations, to carry into effect His Majesty's commands, by strictly enforcing the Laws of the Province in this regard.

**By Authority.**

The following Laws are published for the information of all concerned, and will be concluded in our next.

**XXXIX GEO. III. cap. 8.**

An Act to prevent the Importation or Spreading of Infectious Distempers within the Province.

Passed the 8th February, 1799.

**WHEREAS** Infectious Distempers have lately prevailed in different parts of the United States of America: And whereas it is necessary to prevent, if possible, the importation of such desolating disorders into this Province:

I. Be it enacted, by the Lieutenant Governor, Council, and Assembly, That no Master Mariner or Passenger, whatsoever, belonging to or coming in any British vessel, or in any vessel owned in the United States of America, from any port or place where the yellow fever, putrid bilious fever, or other pestilential or contagious distempers does prevail, shall land within the limits of any county in this Province, without permission first had and obtained in writing under the hand and seal of one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for such County, under the penalty of Ten Pounds for each and every person so landing without a written permission as aforesaid.

II. And be it further enacted, That if any Master, Owner or other person whatever, having charge of any vessel or coasting craft, or any boat, skiff or other craft, do land any person whatever within the limits of the County of Charlotte, taken from on board any vessel or craft whatever, or from any of the shores of the United States of America or from Moselsland, Dudley Island, or Frederic Island, without a written permission first had and obtained as aforesaid, such offender shall, on conviction that such person so unlawfully landed has been within Thirty days of such landing at any port or place in the United States infected as aforesaid, forfeit and pay for every person so landed the sum of Ten Pounds, and on failure of such payment, shall suffer not exceeding Three months' imprisonment.

III. And be it further enacted, That all Tavern keepers and other House-keepers whatever, within the County of Charlotte, shall make immediate report to the nearest Justice of the Peace of all and every person whatsoever, coming by what route soever, from any port or place infected as aforesaid, into any or either of their families, under the penalty of Ten Pounds, for each and every person so omitted to be reported as aforesaid.

IV. And be it further enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for any of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace within the said County of Charlotte to remove forthwith, or direct to be removed, without the limits of this Province, any person or persons, not being His Majesty's subjects, who may have come into the said County from any port or place infected as aforesaid; provided such person shall not have resided thirty days within the said County; in case he suspects danger of infection from such person continuing to reside within said County.

V. And be it further enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for the Justices of the Peace in their respective Counties at their General Sessions, or at any Special Sessions to be called for the purpose, to make such further rules and regulations, in aid of the present Act, for the better preventing the importation or spreading of such infectious distempers, with such pains and penalties, not exceeding Ten Pounds for each and every offence against such rules and regulations, as to them may seem meet.

VI. And be it further enacted, That the fines and penalties in this Act mentioned, shall and may be recovered before any two of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the County where such offence shall be committed, on the Oath of one or more credible witnesses, and applied to the benefit of such County.

VII. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall not extend or be construed to extend to the City of Saint John.

**III GEO. IV. cap. 8.**

An Act to amend an Act, intitled "An Act to prevent the importation or spreading of Infectious Distempers within this Province."

Passed the 21st of March, 1822.

**WHEREAS** the provisions of an Act made and passed in the thirty ninth year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intitled "An Act to prevent the importation or spreading of Infectious Distempers within this Province," have not been found effectual:

I. Be it therefore enacted by the Lieutenant Governor, Council, and Assembly, That from and after the passing of this Act, no Master Mariner, or Passenger, whatsoever, belonging to, or coming in any vessel having on board the yellow fever, putrid bilious fever, or other pestilential or contagious distemper, shall land within the limits of any County in this Province, without permission first had and obtained in writing, under the hand and seal of one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for such County; and if any Person shall land from such vessel without such permission first had and obtained, the Master of such vessel, and every Person so landing, shall severally forfeit the sum of ten pounds, to be recovered before any two of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the County where such offence shall be committed, on the Oath of one or more credible witnesses, by any person who shall prosecute for the same, and shall be divided, one moiety to the person who shall so prosecute for the same, the other moiety to the use of the County.

II. And be it further enacted, That the Justices of the General Sessions of the Peace

for the several Counties in this Province, where it may be deemed necessary, shall and may, at the time of making the annual appointment of Parish Officers, appoint so many fit and proper persons as may be deemed necessary, to act as Health Officers within such County, which Officers shall be duly sworn faithfully and diligently to carry this Act, and also the one to which this is an amendment, into effect; and such Officer, and Officers, shall have full power and authority to execute all and every matter and thing needful and necessary to be done, touching and concerning the performing of quarantine, and the carrying the several provisions contained in this Act, and the one to which this is an amendment, into full force and effect.

III. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall not extend, or be construed to extend, to the City of Saint John.

**MADAWASKA.**

As erroneous statements have got into circulation, and been introduced into some of the public prints of the Province, which have given currency to loose and unfounded reports, we have taken some pains to ascertain the true state of the case, and from what we can learn the circumstances are in substance as follows:—Some time in the month of August last, a person residing in the Madawaska Settlement by the name of Walter Powers, posted up Public Notices in the settlement, calling on the inhabitants, in the name of the State of Maine, to assemble at the house of Peter Lizotte, on the twentieth day of that month, to make choice of certain Town and Parish Officers, under the denominations of a Moderator, Select Men, Town Clerk, Constables, &c. At the time appointed, a collection of persons to the number of about forty assembled, and having been refused permission by the said Peter Lizotte to hold the meeting in his house, the said Powers adjourned to an open field, and the leading characters collected round a cart, and proceeded to business, and chose a person by the name of Barnabas Hannawell as Moderator; Jesse Wheelock, Town Clerk; Amos Mattocks, Daniel Savage, John Harford, Senior, Select Men; Randal Harford and Barnabas Hannawell, Constables; and forthwith administered an oath of office to the said Select Men. The only persons who voted consisted of about a dozen, all of American extraction. Much persuasion was made use of by them to induce the French inhabitants to join, but they one and all declined. Mr. Justice Rice, and Captain Coombes of the militia, who attended to witness what might take place, protested against the proceedings, and demanded from the said Powers to shew by what authority he acted; on which he produced a warrant, under the hand and seal of William D. Williamson, a Justice of the Peace of the State of Maine, and also read what purported to be an Act of the Legislature of the said State, incorporating the whole of the Madawaska Settlement to the northward of a west line from the Monument to the High Lands, so called, as part of the County of Penobscot. On the first day of September following, a second Town Meeting was assembled, by directions of the Moderator, Barnabas Hannawell, at the house of one Raphael Martin, for the purpose of electing a person from the said settlement to represent them in the Legislature of the State of Maine; at which Peter Lizotte, a Captain in the Militia of this Province, was chosen for that purpose, and a return made to that effect to Roscoe I. Greene, Secretary of the State for the said State of Maine. At this last meeting the said Justice Rice also appeared, and protested, in His Majesty's name, against the proceedings, and for so doing was threatened to be forcibly sent away. On this last occasion about twenty of the French Inhabitants, at the instigation and solicitation of the American party, forgetting their duty and allegiance, joined in giving their votes. It is also stated that two persons by the names of John E. Dean and Edward Kavanagh, had in the course of the month of August last, been in and through the settlement, under the pretence of taking an account of the number of the settlers, pursuant to some resolution of the Legislature of the State of Maine; who, during their intercourse with the French Inhabitants, had taken great pains to induce them to believe they had ceased to be British subjects, and were in reality citizens of Maine, and that it was their duty so to acknowledge themselves; accompanied with threats, that provided they declined to give in a true account of the number of the families, the quantity of lands by them occupied, and other particulars relating to their situations, they would be eventually deprived of their property, and if, on the contrary, they complied with what was requested of them, those who had titles already would have them confirmed free of expence, and those who held but a possession would have the same on paying only Five dollars to the Surveyor General of Maine, who would be there in the Spring to lay them off. In consequence of a report from James A. Macaulachlan, Esquire, one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the County of York, (and who had been appointed by the Governor to see that no aggressions were made on the Territory in dispute between Great Britain and the United States) of the foregoing proceedings; the Attorney General received orders from the Governor and Council to proceed with the said Mr. Justice Macaulachlan to Madawaska, and adopt such measures as might be deemed expedient to prevent further aggression, and maintain the Jurisdiction of the Government, who proceeded accordingly; and as the conduct of all the parties concerned was highly illegal and constituted an offence of an aggravated nature, warrants were issued and placed in the hands of the High Sheriff, Edward W. Miller, Esq.

to apprehend the offenders both American and French, to answer at the Supreme Court to be holden at Fredericton on Tuesday next; on which warrant four of the Americans to wit:—Barnabas Hannawell, the moderator, so called, Daniel Savage, one of the select men, Jesse Wheelock, the town clerk, and a person by the name of Daniel Bean, were taken into custody, and declining to give Bail for their appearance in Court, have been committed to answer to indictments to be preferred against them;—the other persons, included in the warrant, escaped into the woods to avoid arrest, the French People who were apprehended gave Bail to appear and answer, and therefore were not committed.

His Excellency Sir Archibald Campbell and Suite arrived here on Saturday last, after having visited the Madawaska and several of the principal settlements on both sides of the river. We understand His Excellency was highly gratified with his excursion.

We learn from London dated the 17th of August that the war between Holland and Belgium has been speedily brought to a conclusion. The King of Holland, says the Times, has listened to the voice of remonstrance, backed as it were by 50,000 French troops and an English fleet. The promptitude of the French and English governments has saved Europe from the impending danger of a general war which produced so much alarm a week ago, but is now happily passed away. The Dutch troops had advanced within eight miles of Brussels, while the French troops who had been lying at Waterloo entered Brussels on the 12th August, and prevented the entry of the Dutch invaders. The convention was concluded on the 14th and the Dutch troops were retiring to the frontier, followed, it is said, by a part of the French Army, which would be recalled as soon as the cause and object of the armistice was removed.

We are necessitated to omit many articles of interesting importance, now in type, which will appear in our next.

The gale which commenced last night and continued until nearly eight o'clock this morning, was extremely severe. The wind was from the southward, and blue with extraordinary violence. Much injury was done by it to Shipping, Wharves, Houses, Fences, &c. Seven Vessels were driven on the Dartmouth shore, among which was the Brig Indus, and schr. Friends, the names of the others we could not obtain. The ship Campbell broke from Fairbanks' Wharf and drifted against the Long Wharf—The Brig Albatross broke from the King's Wharf and drifted against the Market Wharf. The slating on the roof of Dalhousie College was much injured, and part of the stone Tower of the Roman Catholic Chapel was blown down—Much damage was also done to some buildings erected in the North-Western part of the Town.

His Majesty's 52d Regiment are, we understand, to embark on Friday next. A farewell Ball (under the management of Sir Robert D. Gorge, Bart. and the Hon. T. S. Jeffery, the Hon. S. C. Canard, and Andrew Belcher Esq. W. B. Allen, Esq. William Lawson, Esq. and James B. Unwin, Esq.) is to be given by the Inhabitants of the Town to this gallant Corps to-morrow Evening, in the Province Building.—*Hal. Royal Gazette.*

1. A. Col. A. W. Young, has been appointed Lieutenant-Governor of Prince Edward Island.

We have the satisfaction of announcing that the machinery for Mr. Whitney's New Steam Boat, *Henrietta*, made at the manufactory of the celebrated Messrs. Fawcett & Co. Liverpool, has arrived in the Brig Fenwick Keating. With all possible dispatch the Boat will be prepared for running.—*City Gazette.*

The Brigantine Mary-Ann, Capt. M'Kenzie, 25 tons from Barbadoes, bound to Parrabororo, N. S. came to anchor off this harbour, yesterday, being in want of men. In lat 36, long. 66, 30, 2 of the crew died, and 3 more were unable to do duty—the master and one man only, being left to work the vessel. Captain M'K. reports, that the markets were good at Barbadoes—Lumber, 30 dollars cash; shingles, high; fish as low as three dollars. When the Mary-Ann left Barbadoes, 3704 persons had been found dead in the ruins, and the Churches were full of the wounded.—*St. John Courier.*

At Sheffield on the 27th ult. Elizabeth Stuckney, widow of the late Isaac Stuckney one of the first settlers in this Province. She was eminently pious, and after a long and severe illness died in great peace, in the 92th year of her age.
