Civil Appointment.

Cornelius Van Horne, and William Roberts, to be Tide Waters under the Treasurer, in and throughout the County of Charlotte.

The arrival of His Majesty's Packet at Halifax with the September mail has furnished us with London dates to the 11th of that month, which are only three days later than those we quoted last week. As we presume that it will be acceptable to our readers generally, we have given ample details of the magnificent and interesting ceremony of the Coronation, which is the most conspicuous and only article of news we are in possession of. The Princess Victoria, the heir presumptive of the throne, was present only as a spectator. Her mother the Duchess of Kent, was not present at all.

We are not prepared to say what might have been the cause of this omission, which has excited much surprise and conjecture, but it is probable that it has only originated in certain points of etiquette which are necessary to be preserved on such an occasion. It may be satisfactorily accounted for however, if it be correctly stated that her Royal Highness the Duchess of Kent has received a full and satisfactory explanation relative to the supposed slight which she had received in the person of the Princess Victoria. It was never intended, by Earl Grey, to exclude her Royal Highness from the ceremony; but as there was no precedent for giving to the heiress presumptive a place of particular distinction in the Coronation Ceremonial, his Lordship could not, without a breach of etiquette to the Sovereign, give precedence to the Princess Victoria over other members of the Royal Family."

The situation of things in Portugal are frightful and deplorable. The interference of England and France in behalf of suffering Poland is spoken of as likely to be effected. No recent event of consequence has taken place between the contending armies.

Arrived.—On Thursday last, Mr. Macdonell of Glengary, Upper Canada, and Daugherty, on a visit to His Excellency Sir Archibald Campbell and Family. Mr. McD. is a brother to Lady Campbell, and we understand they have not seen each other for nearly 40 years.

We have received (at a late hour) the Seventh Report of the Fredericton Temperance Society, which we are obliged to postpone until next week, with several other articles which we intended to publish.

Summary.

KING LEOPOLD.—Letters from Brussels, of Tuesday last, state that it was reported that Leopold intends to abdicate, being weary of the confusion which exists in the settlement of the peace with Holland. His close attention to business has much injured his health.

GREECE.—A letter from Argos, of the 6th July gives a miserable picture of the state of Greece, and represents the whole of Roumelia as being ready to break out in a formidable insurrection which is prevented by nothing but the extreme poverty of the people.

Pera a suburb of Constantinople has been destroyed by fire, the loss of property was immense, and sixty dead bodies had been found in the ruins.

A bloody affray occurred in Lisbon, on the night of the 21st ult. 400 men of 2 Regt. paraded the streets, singing the Constitutional Hymn, and proclaiming Dom Maria—they were attacked by Miguel's forces and after a contest of 5 hours were defeated, and having thrown down their arms were sent as prisoners on board a line of battle ship lying in the Tagus.

RUSSIA.—A new levy of troops has been ordered to the extent of four men for every 500 souls. In some of our military colonies many serious riots are said to have taken place. The foreign officers attached to these establishments have been exposed to the most atrocious outrages.

The quantity of gold obtained from the Imperial Brazilian Mines in the months of May and June last was 713 lbs.

Lieutenant Rider, R. N., late of Plymouth, and recently appointed agent of transports, has had a fortune of £50,000 left him by a relative.

Orders have been sent to the Mint to strike a handsome medal, in gold, for every member of the House of Commons. The Peers have them of course; but this is, we believe, a new Royal compliment.

London, Sept. 9.—The Agent of the French Government is at present in London, treating for the purchase of 500,000 stand of arms.

An agent of the French ministry was in London, making inquiries as to the cost, &c. of steam-engines of 200 horse power, several of which are wanted by the French Government.

General Baudrard, who has had several interviews with Lord Palmerston on the subject of Poland, has urged the British Government, in the name of the King of the French to address a remonstrance to the Emperor of Russia, in stronger terms than have yet been employed.

It is with much satisfaction we are enabled to contradict the report in the last Halifax Acadian, of another destructive gale having taken place in Barbados, on the 22d September, by which upwards of 9000 lives were stated to have been lost. The brig *William*, Captain Brown, which arrived here last week, sailed from Barbados on the 29th September, and up to that time, although the weather had been severe, no material damage had been done since the hurricane in August last.—*St. John Courier*.

NEW-BRUNSWICK COMPANY.—A Gentleman who has just arrived from Britain, states that this Company has been most successful in their undertaking. They had obtained a Charter from Government, and a gentleman of the name of Hinckley has been appointed Agent; who was to proceed to Saint John, in the brig *Norna*, chartered by the Company. Mr. McGregor, the author of a work entitled "Sketches of British North America," has been appointed Secretary to the Company. *Miramichi Gleamer*.

NEWFOUNDLAND.—A Public Meeting was held at Saint Johns, N. F. on the 4th instant, and a string of resolutions adopted, preparatory to the transmission of a further Petition to Parliament, for the grant of a local Legislature to the Island.

BERMUDA.—His Majesty's ship *Champion* sailed from Bermuda on the 29th ult. taking with her the sum of £1000, voted by the Legislature of Bermuda for the relief of the sufferers by the late hurricane at Barbados.

The advices received by our Government yesterday, from Lisbon, are of much importance. They give frightful accounts of the situation of things in that capital, and lead to an inference that the reign of Don Miguel will soon be at an end, even though Don Pedro should make no effort to put him down. The private accounts which we have seen, state that most of the troops are months in arrears of pay, and that one regiment had mutinied. One of the confidential advisers of Don Pedro has received by the last mail from Lisbon, a paper signed by more than twenty officers of the Miguelite army, expressing their readiness to join the Constitutionalists on their receiving provision of amnesty.

When the French Admiral Roussin was at Lisbon, his feelings were so much affected by the enormities which he witnessed and heard of, with respect to the imprisonment of patriotic and innocent men, that he used every effort to induce the government to set them free, and at length, despairing of success, as to all the prisoners, he actually offered to solicit permission from the French government to give up three or four of the ships which had become property by the right of conquest, if the Portuguese would consent, on such conditions, to release only three or four hundred of the state prisoners, and this was inhumanely refused.
