The motive for this enactment is explained in the preamble to have been the necessity of obviating the evils experienced in the Upper Provinces from the exercise of an exclusive control by the Legislature of Lower Canada, over Imports and Exports at the Port of Quebec. I acknowledge without reserve, that nothing but the necessity of mediating between the two Provinces could have justified such an interference by Parliament, and that if any adequate security can be devised against the recurrence of similar difficulties, the enactment ought to be repealed. The peculiar geographical position of Upper Canada, enjoying no access to the sea, except through a province wholly independant of itself on the one hand, or through a foreign state on the other, was supposed in the year 1822 to have created the necessity for enacting so peculiar a law for its protection. I should be much gratified to learn that no such necessity exists at present, or can be reasonably anticipated hereafter; for upon sufficient evidence of that fact his Majes- quire. ty's Government would at once recommend to Parliament the repeal of that part of the statute to which the Address of the House of Assembly refers. The Ministers of the Crown would even be satisfied to propose to Parliament the repeal of the enactment in question, upon proof that the Legislature of the Upper Prolatures of the two Provinces.
