Total defeat of the Belgian Army of the Meuse. Head Quarters of the King, at Louvain,

Tuesday, 12 o'clock. Information has just been received that the whole of the Belgian Army is defeated, and in full retreat-that the King, in great haste, was compelled to quit Areschet for Louvain, and is hourly expected at Brussels. It appears that at the first charge of the Dutch army, the cavalry of Gen. Daine retreated in great disorder whole army into confusion. The rear guard ward in following their example. The whole assortment of of the army is scattered, and the greater part have taken refuge in Liege. The Dutch have possession of all their baggage, artillery and ammunition. Treason is being cried in the streets of Liege. Several Members of the Congress, with the President (M.
