By the Honorable WILLIAM BLACK, President and Commander in Chief of the Province of New-Brunswick, &c. &c.

A PROCLAMATION.
WHEREAS the General Assembly of this Province stands prorogued to Monday the fifth day of September next: I have thought fit further to prorogue the said General Assembly, and the same is hereby prorogued to the first Monday in December next ensuing.

Given under my Hand and Seal at Fredericton, this thirty-first day of August, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty-one, and in the second year of His Majesty's Reign.

The following Extract from the Mutiny Act, and His Majesty's Warrant in pursuance thereof, are published for the information of all concerned.

"AND WHEREAS it is expedient that provisions should be made for the enlisting and attesting of Soldiers desirous of re-enlisting, and others desirous of enlisting abroad,—Be it therefore enacted, That it shall be lawful for any person duly appointed by His Majesty by any Warrant signed by the Secretary at War in that behalf, and not being a General Officer, nor holding any Regimental Commission, to enlist and attest, out of Great Britain or Ireland, any soldiers or persons desirous of enlisting or re-enlisting into His Majesty's Service; and any person so appointed shall have the same powers in that behalf as are given to Justices in the United Kingdom, for all such purposes of enlistment and attestation—and any person so enlisted or re-enlisted shall be deemed to be an attested Soldier—and as often as any Corps shall be relieved or be disbanded, at any station beyond the seas, it shall be lawful for any Officers thereunto authorized by the Officer Commanding in Chief at such station to enlist as many of the Soldiers belonging to the Corps leaving the station as shall be willing and fit for service, for any Corps appointed to remain—and every Soldier so enlisted is hereby deemed to be discharged from his former Corps; and an attested Certificate of transfer shall be delivered to the Soldier."

WILLIAM R.

IT being expedient that the provisions contained in the 37th clause of the Act passed in the first year of our Reign, for the punishment of Mutiny and Desertion, be duly carried into effect, We do hereby authorize and appoint you to enlist and attest in our Colony at New-Brunswick, any Soldiers, or others, desirous of enlisting, or re-enlisting, into our service, and to administer such Oaths as are directed and required to be administered in that behalf by Justices of the Peace in our United Kingdom, in relation to the enlisting and re-enlisting of Soldiers; and every person so enlisted or re-enlisted, by you, shall be deemed and taken to be so enlisted, or re-enlisted, under the provision of any Act in force, in relation to the enlisting of Soldiers, and for the punishment of Mutiny and Desertion, in like manner to all intents and purposes, as if such Oath had been administered, and such attestation had been made, and such enlisting and re-enlisting had taken place before a Justice of Peace of the United Kingdom.

Given at our Court at Windsor, this 1st day of June, 1831, in the first year of our Reign.

For the Forms of Oaths to be administered, Questions to be put to the Recruit, and Certificates to be given, Magistrates are referred to the Mutiny Act above mentioned.

PUBLISHED BY AUTHORITY.

HIS MAJESTY having announced to Parliament the progress of a formidable disease from the eastern parts of Europe to the Ports in the Baltic, from whence much commercial intercourse is carried on with the British Dominions, has been pleased to issue His Royal commands that every necessary step be taken for preventing the importation of this disease (which is highly contagious in its nature) into this Province, whereof all Magistrates, and other Persons concerned, will take due notice, and use their utmost vigilance and exertions, in their several stations, to carry into effect His Majesty's commands, by strictly enforcing the Laws of the Province in this regard.
