The attention of the Public, and particularly that of the Members of the Fredericton District Committee of the Society for promoting Christian Knowledge, is solicited to the following series of Rules and Regulations, which are to be submitted to a General Meeting of the Members of this Committee, on the 3d of February next.

At a General Meeting held in the Grammar School Room, on the 6th of the present month, it was proposed to make some changes (not inconsistent with the leading principles laid down by the Parent Society) in the constitution and management of this valuable Association, with the view of offering greater inducement to the friends of the Institution, to enrol their names on the list of its Benefactors; and of removing the principal impediment to its extension and success, by lowering the amount of the subscription necessary to constitute a member. The changes then suggested were referred to a sub-committee, who were requested to take them into serious consideration, and report upon them. The sub-committee met on Saturday last, to execute the task assigned them; and, by their direction, we have been requested to publish the result of their deliberations, for the information of the members in general, who will thus gain an opportunity of fully considering beforehand the various matters, upon which, at the meeting on the 3d of February, they will have to decide.

1. That this Committee be open to all members of the Parent Society, and to all persons who subscribe not less than 11. 8d (Half a Guinea) annually, to the use of this District; and that to the persons thus qualified be intrusted the management of the concerns of the Committee: but that subscriptions or contributions to any smaller amount will be received, and will entitle the subscribers or contributors to all the privileges which will be specified in the succeeding Regulations, except a vote at the meetings of the Committee.

2. That the Lieutenant-Governor, or Officer administering the Government of the Province, be requested to accept the office of Patron of the Society.

3. That the Bishop of the Diocese be requested to accept the office of President of the Society, and the Archdeacon of the Province the office of Vice-President.

4. That at every meeting of the Committee and Sub-Committee, in the absence of the President and Vice-President, a Chairman be elected by the meeting.

5. That a Treasurer and Secretary, annually elected, be the other Officers of the Committee.

6. That for the dispatch of business, a Sub-Committee be appointed annually, consisting wholly of persons belonging to the Committee, who may be deemed the most likely, from the nature of their avocations, their comparative leisure, or their zeal in the cause, to attend meetings with regularity, and assist the Officers of the Society, in the management of such parts of the Society's business as shall be committed to them. And that the Sub-Committee do consist of such Clergymen, being members of the Committee, as of an equal number of lay-members, to be elected annually at a general meeting. The Treasurer and Secretary to be always members of the Sub-Committee *ex officio*.

7. That the Sub-Committee have power to transact all business, not expressly reserved by the following Rules to a general meeting:—that for this purpose they do meet on the first Monday in every month, of which meetings the Secretary shall give notice in writing to every Member of the Sub-Committee; and that they do proceed to business when not less than four members are present.

8. That all applications on the Society's business be addressed to the Secretary, whose duty it shall be to acknowledge the receipt of them immediately, or by the first post; and that these Letters or applications be afterwards submitted to the consideration of the sub-committee, at their next succeeding meeting, and be determined upon by them (if on matters within their Province to determine.)—The expense of all Messages or Postage to be defrayed by the Committee.

9. That a general meeting of the Members of the Committee be held once in every year, on the 2d Saturday of February, of which notice shall be given both at Church, and in the Fredericton Royal Gazette, and at which all Members of the Parent Society wherever residing, shall have a right to attend, and also a right, if they have regularly paid their subscriptions to the Treasurer of this Committee, to give their vote upon all questions that may arise; but those who do not pay their subscriptions to the Treasurer of this Committee, or whose subscriptions are in arrear, shall have no vote on any question directly touching the funds of the committee.

10. That to the Meeting the accounts of the Treasurer and Secretary for the preceding year be submitted, after having passed the sub-committee; an abstract of these accounts to be afterwards printed for the information of the public; and that a report be made to this Meeting, by the sub-committee, of all the transactions of the Society during the same period.

11. That the Secretary be authorized to summon a Special General Meeting at any period, when such a meeting shall appear to the sub-committee to be necessary or desirable, by a notification in Church on the preceding Sunday, and an advertisement in the Royal Gazette.

12. That a local Depository of Books and Tracts published by the Society, and supplies for the use of schools, be opened as soon as possible in some convenient place, under the care and management of some person approved by the committee, who shall receive 5 per cent. upon all issues duly made by him, for his trouble; and that an account of the state of the Depository be regularly kept, and laid before the Committee and sub-committee at every Meeting;—and that all monies received by this Officer be accounted for and paid to the Treasurer once at least in every Month.

13. That all Members of the existing Committee be considered as members for the future, without a new election, who shall pay one year's subscription within 14 days after the day on which this meeting is held, in lieu of all or any arrears; and that all persons recommended by a member be eligible to be members of the committee on the same terms.

14. That all members of the Committee, and other Subscribers to its funds, be entitled to receive back one half of their subscriptions, in Books and Tracts, of their own selection, for their own use or for gratuitous distribution, at costs and charges.

15. That all contributors to the Funds of the Committee, (to whatever amount) besides the privilege allowed them by the foregoing Rule, be further entitled to purchase Books and Tracts, for their own use, or for gratuitous distribution, at 2 of their cost, (including charges) to an amount proportioned to that of their respective contributions, according to the following scale:—

And that the price of Books, &c. to non subscribers, be such as the sub-committee may from time to time determine.

16. That the Clergymen having charge of the Parishes surrounding Fredericton be invited to join this Committee, with such of their Parishioners as they may prevail upon to unite with them in so doing, and be requested to solicit subscriptions and contributions in aid of the funds of the Committee.—All such subscribers and contributors, belonging to other Parishes, to be entitled to the same privileges and advantages as those of the Town enjoy.

17. That it is an especial object with this Committee to encourage schools established for the benefit of the poorer classes, and facilitate the formation of lending Libraries, to the full extent of their means;—and that, for this purpose, they will import as large a stock as possible of the supplies necessary for such schools, and of Books proper for such Libraries, and be ready to furnish them, as soon as they can be procured, to the full amount of the contributions they shall receive from any Parish in the Province, at cost prices;—provided that the contributors shall remit to them any further privilege, to which, by the above Rules, they would otherwise be entitled; and if, at any future period, the state of their funds should admit of it, they will gladly entertain applications for further assistance, when good cause for it can be shown.

18. That this Committee do earnestly invite their fellow Christians to come forward promptly and liberally to the support of an Institution so well calculated to promote the best interests of the community; and to unite with them in imploring a blessing upon their endeavours, from Him, without whose blessing they are aware it cannot prosper.

Our European dates remain as last week.

We refer our readers to the interesting defence of M. de Kergorlay. The report that he had been acquitted by the Chamber of Peers caused a serious fall in the French funds.

MARKETS.—We have much pleasure in stating, that since the late snow has made the roads passable, our market has been abundantly supplied, with Beef, Pork, &c. of very superior quality. This morning the abundance is greater than we recollect ever to have seen in one day, and the size and quality of the pork is such as would appear with credit to the growers, were they exhibited in any market in the world. Among these we particularly notice one hog, raised by Mr. George Hayward of Sussex Vale, supposed to weigh about 600 pounds, and four others raised by a Mr. Smith of Little River, which together will weigh nearly a ton weight.—City Gazette.

On Sunday night last, Mr. Isaiah M'Leod of Sussex Vale, lost a valuable Mare, in foal, worth £30 in crossing Hammond River. Several sleds being in company, one of them stopped in the road, and Mr. M'Leod, not apprehending any danger drove a few feet on one side of the road, in order to pass by, the ice cracked, the mare fell in, and although she was got out in less than twenty minutes, she had expired. Had the bridge so long talked of been built over Hammond River, this loss would have been prevented. The want of a bridge over that river occasions serious inconvenience and actual loss, to a large section of country, as well as to this City. A short time since, the Mail was delayed upwards of 12 hours, on account of the uncertain and dangerous state of the ice.—lb.

MELANCHOLY ACCIDENT.—On Monday night, about 10 o'clock, Charles King, Jr. aged 26, son of Mr. Charles King, of this City, was unfortunately drowned, by falling between the wharf of N. Merritt, Esq. and the brig George. The manner in which the accident happened we learn to be, that in attempting to go on board the pilot boat Teaser, to which he belonged, and which lay outside of the George, he had first to get on board the brig, and then, having some distance from the wharf, he grasped the warp or spring, intending to throw his feet from the wharf to the side of the brig, which, however he failed in doing; and after holding on to the warp but a short time, lost his hold, fell into the water, and sunk almost immediately.—Two other young men in company, had got on board the boat, who were prompt in rendering assistance as soon as the danger was known, but to no purpose.—The body was found yesterday morning, and a Coroner's inquest held thereon.—Verdict.—Accidentally drowned, in attempting to get on board the brig George.—lb.

CONTINUED MARCH OF IMPROVEMENT.—"The Iron Foundry and Smelting Furnace," says a writer in a late *Novellist*, "are always considered the first steps, in a new country, to the permanent and profitable establishment of mechanism and sciences generally." Of such steps to improvement we may now boast in no ordinary degree, for besides the Foundry which for some time past has been in vigorous and successful operation, in our immediate vicinity, another similar establishment is to be set on foot, in the very heart of our city; the ensuing season, by Messrs. Ross, Foulis, and Hogg, whose acquaintance with those arts and branches of Mechanism is necessary for such an undertaking, furnishes a guarantee for their advantageous prosecution of the same. The establishment, we understand, is to be located on the ground belonging to T. Hanford, Esq. at the foot of Duke Street; such portion

which as will be requisite for the erection of suitable buildings having been leased for a term of years, at the rate of £50 per annum.—St. John Observer.

CIRCUIT COURT.
The Court of Oyer and Terminer, and General Gaol Delivery, for this City and County, and the Court of Nisi Prius, commenced their sittings on Tuesday, the 11th instant;—the Honorable Judge Chipman presiding.

In charging the Grand Jury, the learned Judge, in a luminous manner, and at considerable length, called their attention to a general consideration of the laws by which we are governed, the constitution of the Courts under which they were assembled, and to the nature and duties of their office as Grand Jurors.—City Gazette.

We shall copy in our next number His Honor's address to the Grand Jury, as reported in the above paper, which will be found to contain most important, useful and necessary information.

The new barque, *Joanna*, burthen 557 tons, cleared at this Port, last week, for Liverpool, with a cargo consisting of 1027 tons White Pine Timber, 6813 superficial feet of Deals, 1158 do. Deal Ends, 96. 60 ash hhd. Staves, 12 spruce Spars, 24 oar rafters and 1 cord Lathwood. She took no deck load, and instead of Birch Timber, has on board a considerable quantity of Ballast. The *Joanna* was built by John Dow, Esq. of Oromocto, for Mr. John Wishart, of this City, and is the largest vessel ever launched on the Main River.—Her model and workmanship are pronounced by good judges to be inferior to no vessel ever built in the Province.—St. John Courier.

AFFLICTING CIRCUMSTANCE.—On Wednesday morning last, William R. son of Mr. R. Harris, of this City, a promising child, aged 4 years, came to a sudden and painful death by burning. He was, it is thought, in the act of reaching across the fire place, when his cloths (although of woollen) caught the flame, and in a moment he was enveloped in a blaze. There was in the room at the time, besides the unfortunate sufferer, only a younger child, and before the parents were alarmed, the whole of his clothing was entirely consumed, and it was then too late to render any assistance that could preserve life.—After lingering about five hours in great bodily pain, death relieved him from further suffering.—lb.

The great increase of population and business not only in the town of St. Andrews, but throughout the County of Charlotte, renders the publication of another Newspaper both desirable and expedient. When there is a fair field for competition, whether professional, mercantile, or mechanical, the public must always be benefited thereby, and is no case can the maxim apply more strongly than the present. Without entering minutely into the reasons which might be adduced to prove the utility and convenience of this additional paper, the following will exhibit a brief sketch of the general outline of the proposed work:—

The Editor will use the utmost diligence in collecting and publishing the latest and most interesting intelligence; for this purpose an arrangement will be made for procuring the most approved papers from England, Ireland, and Scotland, the United States, the West Indies, and those of our own and the Sister Provinces, which will enable him also to furnish such regular prices current, and shipping advices as may be applicable to our local situation.—The State of our own market, and prices of our staples will be particularly attended to, and the causes of surplus, or deficiency (as the case may be) satisfactorily accounted for. An accurate account will also be given of all arrivals, departures, cargoes, &c. and in short, no pains will be spared to obtain and diffuse commercial information of every description.

A due portion of the paper will be appropriated to the all important subject of Agriculture, and a correspondence maintained with individuals possessing ability as well as inclination to communicate useful instruction in that branch of rural economy, so desirable to practical Farmers.

Army and Navy Lists will be regularly received, and such extracts taken from them as may be interesting to the town or the neighbouring Colonies.

The favorites of the muses will find a place in the poets' corner for their effusions, and as several Gentlemen of Science and Talents have kindly offered to furnish occasionally literary and miscellaneous articles, the Editor can confidently promise a fund of amusement and instruction in that department.
