

agency, that if the subject of the Waste Lands of the Province be referred to our consideration, we shall adopt such measures as may best tend to promote so desirable an object.

"Situating as we are, so far distant from the Parent State, we are fully aware of the necessity of a defensive force in this Province; and the communication which Your Excellency will make to us, shall receive our careful consideration.

"The diffusion of Education and Learning throughout the Province, has always been considered by us as a subject of vital importance, and such of the existing establishments, as tend to promote so desirable an object, shall continue to receive our fostering care and superintendence.

"Deeply sensible of the lively interest Your Excellency has taken in the welfare of this Province, we trust that nothing shall be wanting on the part of the Representatives of His Majesty's loyal subjects in New-Brunswick, to render it every year, under Your Excellency's Administration, a more important member of the Great Empire; and we hail the appointment of an Officer of Your Excellency's high standing and experience to preside over this Province, as an additional proof of the paternal care and solicitude of our Most Gracious Sovereign, for this portion of His widely extended dominions."

To which His Excellency was pleased to return the following answer:—

"Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly.

"I THANK you for this Address, which I receive with much satisfaction, affording me, as it does, the gratifying testimony, that you view as important the various subjects which I have submitted to you; and which, I have no doubt, will meet with your wise and deliberate consideration, and appear to be entitled to the benefit of your support.

"I fully appreciate your ready assurance to provide for the Ordinary Services; and I confidently anticipate that the resources at your disposal will be applied in a way worthy of the faithful Representatives of an intelligent and loyal people.

"I take pleasure in renewing the assurance I have already given you, that, aided by your wisdom and experience, I will ever, to the utmost of my power, endeavour gradually to bring forward the dormant resources of the Province, and to call into activity and usefulness its many great and evident capabilities.

"I beg, Gentlemen, that you will accept my best thanks for the very kind and favourable manner in which you are pleased to mention me in your Address."

"And the remainder to such Members of the House of Commons of Great Britain as the Speaker may direct.

Resolved, That copies of the Laws and Journals of the present and future Sessions of this House be transmitted, as early as practicable, to the Speakers or Clerks of the Assemblies of each of His Majesty's Provinces or Colonies in North America, and that Mr. Speaker be authorized to give the necessary directions therefor.

Tuesday, 24th January, 1832.

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor.

Mr. Speaker, Acting Secretary, by command of His Excellency, delivered the two following Messages:—

"NEW-BRUNSWICK.

"Message to the House of Assembly, 24th January, 1832.

"ARCHIBALD CAMPBELL.

"THE Lieutenant Governor directs to be laid before the House of Assembly a copy of a Despatch from Lord Viscount Goderich, in answer to the Resolutions of the House, requesting to be furnished with detailed information with regard to the amount and expenditure of the Casual Revenue. "A. C." (copy)

"Downing Street, 1st October, 1831.

"Sir,

"I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of Mr. President Black's Despatch of the 14th August last, enclosing Resolutions of the House of Assembly of New-Brunswick, requesting to be furnished with detailed information with regard to the amount and expenditure of the Casual Revenue, in consequence of His Majesty's surrender of that branch of His Revenue. I have to acquaint you in reply, that I have not received any commands from His Majesty on the subject, and as the Resolutions of the Assembly are grounded altogether on erroneous information, it is not in my power to authorize you to comply with their request.

#### "NEW-BRUNSWICK.

"Message to the House of Assembly, 24th January, 1832.

"ARCHIBALD CAMPBELL.

"THE Lieutenant Governor, in obedience to His Majesty's commands, directs to be laid before the House of Assembly, a copy of a Despatch received from Lord Viscount Goderich, on the subject of the Inspecting Officers of the Militia, and submits the same to the consideration of the House, in the fullest confidence that they will make the requisite provision for this important service. "A. C." (copy)

"Downing Street, 8th July, 1831.

"Sir,

"I have the honor to transmit to you the copy of a Letter from Major General Lord Fitzroy Somerset, with its enclosures, from Lieutenant Colonel Turner, representing the extreme inconvenience to which he is exposed, in consequence of the Legislature of New-Brunswick having omitted in their last Session, to make the usual provision for the Salary of the Inspecting Field Officer of Militia in that Province, to which he had recently proceeded under the full expectation of receiving the accustomed pay and allowances.

"I have received His Majesty's commands to desire that you will at the next meeting of the Legislature, communicate by Message to the House of Assembly of New-Brunswick, the anxiety which His Majesty feels to see the Militia of that important Province rendered an efficient and respectable Force; and as the Inspecting Field Officers were established on the recommendation of the distinguished Officers who recently commanded in Nova Scotia and New-Brunswick, as essentially necessary to that desirable object, His Majesty trusts that the House of Assembly will be induced to reconsider the subject, and to make the usual provision for this service.

"His Majesty is the more convinced of the acquiescence of the House of Assembly in this respect, as he is confident it did not occur to the House, with what hardship their recent appropriation would act upon a meritorious Officer, appointed under the authority of the permanent Militia Law of the Province, in its principles as well as efficiency.

Thursday, 26th January, 1832.

Mr. Brown moved the Standing Order of the House.

When the Gallery and Lobby being cleared.—Mr. Wier, a Member for Charlotte County, stated that he had received a challenge from James M. Spearman, Esquire, for words spoken by him in debate in this House at the last Session, and that Thomas Jones, Esquire, was the bearer of said challenge.

Whereupon, Mr. Chandler moved the following, which was passed unanimously:—

"Whereas, a complaint having been made to this House that James M. Spearman, Esquire, had challenged Mr. Wier, a Member for the County of Charlotte, for words he had spoken in debate in this House, in breach of the privileges of this House, and that Thomas Jones, Esquire, was the bearer of such challenge—

"That the said James M. Spearman and Thomas Jones be taken into the custody of the Sergeant at Arms, attending this House, and forthwith brought to the Bar of the House, to answer the matters of the said complaint, and that Mr. Speaker issue his warrant accordingly.

"And further ordered, That Peter Stubbs, John Wilson, and Charles R. Hathaway, Esquires, be commanded, forthwith to attend this House, to give information touching the above complaint."

Friday, 27th January, 1832.

Mr. Partelow, Chairman of the Committee to whom was referred the consideration of that part of His Excellency's Speech relating to Roads, reported, that they had taken the same into consideration, and he was directed to present the following, which he read, viz:—

"That your Committee are of opinion that the sum of twelve thousand three hundred pounds should be applied towards the improvement of the Roads throughout the Province, and recommend the same to be appropriated as follows:—

been enabled, however, to select several interesting articles from a file of London papers, politely handed us, which will in some degree supply the deficiency of later intelligence.

Mr. Hurd and Dr. Turner, from New Brunswick, arrived in town a few days ago, on their way to Upper Canada. The former gentleman is appointed Surveyor General of the latter province.—Admon.

Mr. Bradley's Stage between this City and Fredericton, which runs weekly on the Nerepis Road, while crossing a narrow bridge over a deep gully between Mr. Bradley's and Mr. Bradley's last, was forced into the stream on account of the horses being unable to keep upon the bridge which, being without railings, was covered with drift ice; the stage immediately filled with water, and three passengers, who were inside were in imminent danger of drowning; fortunately, however, the horses swam across, and succeeded in dragging the stage up to the opposite bank. One of the persons has not yet recovered from the effects of the accident.—Courier.

Coroner's Inquest.—An inquest was held on the 18th inst. before H. Nasse, Esq. Coroner for King's County, on view of the body of John Gorman, who came to his death the day previous. Mr. G. was driving his ox-team on descending ground—his feet slipped and he fell, and before he could recover himself, the sled, heavily loaded with wood, went over his body, which caused instantaneous death. At the same place, on the 28th inst. attended with much suffering, which was endured with great patience, WILLIAM DURANT, Esquire, aged 52 years. Mr. D. was for many years Editor and Proprietor of the City Gazette, and only retired from that situation, when severe bodily affliction would no longer permit him to attend personally to the arduous duties of the establishment. He was repeatedly returned by a majority of his fellow citizens to represent them in the Common Council of this City, both as Assistant Alderman and Alderman; and in all the duties to which he had been called, whether of a public or private nature, he has always maintained the character of an independent, zealous, and honest man. He has left a widow and a large family of children, besides a numerous circle of relatives and friends, who will long have cause to deplore his death.—St. John Courier.
