A Meeting of the Firewards of the Town of Fredericton, is fixed day of Sept. 1831.

PRESENT: William F. Odell, George Shore, Jedediah Slason, George Minchin, George E. Street, Charles J. Peters, Mark Needham.

The former Regulations repealed, and the following Regulations are made for the government of the Firemen:

1st RULE.—That every Fireman shall forthwith provide himself with a Leather Cap, the crown of it to be painted white, agreeable to a patron, to be deposited by the Firewards with the Captains of the Engine; the number of the Engine to which such Fireman belongs, to be painted in black letters in front.

2d RULE.—Upon every alarm of Fire, every Fireman shall immediately repair to the Engine to which he belongs, with his Cap on, and put himself under the directions of the Captain of that Engine, and that every Fireman knowing of an alarm of Fire and not complying with this rule, shall be subject to the penalty of Twenty Shillings, to be recovered as the Law directs.

3d RULE.—That the Captains of the Engines respectively, do immediately upon any alarm of Fire, proceed to the Engine house with their Keys, and as soon as they can collect sufficient assistance, proceed without delay, with the Engine, Buckets, Ladders, Hooks, &c., to the place where the Fire is, and there put themselves under the direction of a Fireward, if any there present, and if none present then to proceed to use the Engine in extinguishing the Fire, according to the best of their own judgment, until a Fireward arrives, and for any neglect of duty shall be subject to the penalty of Twenty Shillings.

4th RULE.—That the Captains of the Engines shall severally provide themselves with a Key of the Engine house, and there shall also be an extra key deposited near to the Engine-house, where it can be immediately had.

5th RULE.—And that after any Fire may be extinguished, no Fireman shall leave the Engine without permission of a Fireward, until the same (with Ladders, Buckets, and all the Furniture thereto belonging) shall be regularly deposited, and secured in the place appointed for that purpose, under the penalty of Five Shillings for each offence, to be recovered as the Act directs.

6th RULE.—That the Captains of the Engines, when required so to do by any of the Firewards, shall summon the rest of the Firemen to meet at the Engine-house, at such times as may be appointed by the Firewards, not exceeding twelve times in each year, for the purpose of examining the Engines and exercising themselves in the use thereof, under the penalty of Five Shillings for every neglect thereof, to be recovered as aforesaid; that every Fireman being so summoned, neglecting to appear at the time appointed, shall be subject to the penalty of Two Shillings and Six pence for each offence, to be recovered and applied as aforesaid.

7th RULE.—That the Captain or Captains of the Engines respectively, do on every occasion that the Engines or either of them shall be taken out, either for Fire or for exercise, make a return to the Secretary of the Firewards of all Firemen not present, or who shall quit the Engine to which they belong without leave, contrary to the foregoing rules, and that it shall be the duty of the Secretary, on receiving such return, to give the names of the Defaulters to some Magistrate to proceed against them as the Law directs, to recover the penalties therein mentioned, and the return be filed, and the same with the proceedings thereon be reported to the Firewards at their next meeting; and that every Captain neglecting to make such return, shall be subject to the penalty of Twenty Shillings.

"And be it further enacted, by the authority aforesaid, That no person or persons whatsoever, or body politic or corporate, in any part of these Kingdoms of Great Britain and Ireland, or other Her Majesty's Plantation or Colonies in the West Indies and America, other than such Postmaster General as shall, from time to time, be nominated and appointed by Her Majesty, Her Heirs and Successors, and constituted by Letters Patent under the Great Seal of Great Britain as aforesaid; and Her Deputy and Deputies, or Assigns, shall presume to receive, take up, order, despatch, convey, carry, rearry, or deliver any Letter or Letters, Packet or Packets of Letters, or make any collection of Letters, or set up or employ any foot Post, horse Post, or Packet Boat, or other vessel or boat, or other person or persons, conveyance or conveyances whatsoever, for the receiving, taking up, ordering, dispatching, conveying, carrying, rearrying, or delivering any letters, packet or packets of letters, by sea or land, or on any river within Her Majesty's dominions, or by means whereof any letter or letters, packet or packets of letters, shall be collected, received, taken up, ordered, dispatched, conveyed, carried, rearry, or delivered, by sea or by land, or on any river within Her Majesty's dominions, or shall presume to keep, provide and maintain, horses or furniture, for the horsing of any person or persons riding post; That is to say, riding several stages upon a Post road, and changing horses; or shall let to hire, or furnish any person or persons whatsoever with horses or furniture for riding Post, as aforesaid, any of the Post roads or stages now on hereafter to be appointed, with or without a guide or horse, for hire or reward, or on any agreement or promise of reward, or whereby he or they may have any profit or advantage, on pain of forfeiting the sum of five pounds of British money for every several offence against the tenor of the present act; and also, of the sum of one hundred pounds of like British money for every week that any offender against this act shall collect, receive, take up, order, despatch, convey, carry, rearry, or deliver, any letter or letters, packet or packets of letters, by sea or land, or on any river within Her Majesty's dominions, or that shall presume to set up, continue, or employ, any foot post, horse post, or packet boat, or other vessel or boat, or any other person or persons, conveyance, or conveyances whatsoever, for the receiving, taking up, ordering, dispatching, conveying, carrying, rearrying, or delivering, of any letter or letters, packet or packets of letters, by sea or land, or on any river within Her Majesty's dominions as aforesaid."
