The English Mail brought us dates to the 11th March, subsequently, however, the Western Mail brings us intelligence from London by the arrival of the *Albion* (from Falmouth to Saint John), up to the 26th of March. We have copied largely from our City files, and from London papers by the Packet, which contain subjects of the most interesting nature.

The Reform Bill passed the House of Commons on the 23d of March by a majority of 116. We regret to learn that the cholera is extending its ravages in the City of London. It is stated that on the 21st March 47 new cases were reported and 33 deaths. Total of cases from the commencement 1258, deaths 680, and it was reported that it had made its appearance in Ireland. We shall be happy to hear the above statement modified, and to encourage us in our expectations, we find the following paragraph from the Editor of the *Saint John Courier* who must possess the latest and best information on the subject.

"Says accounts state the Cholera Morbus to be rapidly spreading itself in London, while on the other hand it is asserted that the number of deaths in some of the Parishes affected, do not exceed those in the corresponding period of last year, when no such disease existed in the metropolis."

Lord Brough, Governor of Jamaica, has been elected. He is to be succeeded by Earl Mulgrave.

REFORM BILL.—It is generally understood that on the second reading of the Reform Bill in the House of Lords a certain number of Peers will propose an amendment to the original plan of Reform, embracing the disfranchisement of the decayed boroughs, the representation of the great manufacturing towns, and the extension of the franchise to the middle classes. This rational plan, by the adoption of which, hopes may be entertained of the permanency of the constitution, is all that is essential to the support of the Duke of Wellington, and all the other real friends of the state.—*London Morning Post.*

Where the crown prosecutions are now going forward, resembles a garriotte city. It is surrounded for six miles round by cavalry, and a closer circle of mounted police draws round at night. The citizens are in a state of alarm, but extremely peaceable under circumstances of unusual agitation.

A severe force now in the city is the 70th and two companies of the 52d foot, two troops of the 11th Light Cavalry, one troop of Dragoons, and a company of Artillery, besides 200 of police from the 4th, 5th, 6th, and 7th Regiments; the 11th and 12th Regiments of Foot are entirely removed, least any collision should take place between them and the police.

A vessel from Bahia, state that the *Ensay* settlers in Malacca had been driven out by the Malays, in consequence of the Company's inability to have attempted to enforce the payment of their tax. The British settlements on the Malacca coast, Tavoy, and Mergui, were in a state of insurrection. H. M. ships *Walrus* and *Crocodile* had proceeded to that coast.

Don Pedro reached Terceira on the 31st inst. He landed amidst the thunder of artillery and shouts of his followers. The event was celebrated with the most enthusiastic demonstrations of joy by the troops and the inhabitants. Several of the transports which accompanied Don Pedro from Belleisle had previously arrived at Terceira, and had landed the volunteers they had brought from Europe. The total force collected at that place was estimated from 10,000 to 15,000 men.

The Weather. The farmer has seldom had more occasion for the exercise of patience and judgment than in the past month, and few of the oldest inhabitants in this part of the Province have ever seen a more gloomy commencement of the harvest season. From Monday night till this morning it snowed steadily with little intermission and our neighbourhood is still clothed in her wintry garb. The ice in the river remains stationary for a considerable distance above and below this place, and yesterday we beheld the novel sight of the May-pole exhibited on its frozen surface, a circumstance unknown here for 15 years.
