By the numerous arrivals at the Ports of this, and the adjoining Province during the past week, we are enabled to lay before our readers a variety of interesting matter, although not of much importance. In addition to the latest news contained in our Provincial files, we have selected several articles from English and Scotch papers which have been very politely handed us. The second reading of the Reform Bill was postponed to Monday the 9th April. The *Saint John Courier* furnishes us with the annexed particulars which are copied from Liverpool papers to the 7th April:

**The Belgium Treaty.**—We hear that a Conference of the Ministers of the five Powers will be held to-day, at which the Ministers of France and England will probably be asked to state the cause of the delay that has taken place as to the ratifications of the treaty by the other Powers. Information is, we believe, hourly expected from Prussia.

**China.**—Accounts from China, to the 11th December, state that there is every probability that the differences with the Chinese being amicably arranged.

It is said that the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland has, within the past week, been offered to the Marquis of Westminster, and its acceptance is now under his Lordship's consideration.

The Rev. Daniel Wilson, M. A. Vicar of St. Andrew's, has been appointed to the vacant Bishopric of Calcutta.

His Majesty has conferred the honour of Knighthood on General Martin Hunter, G. C. H.

Vessels are taking up at Plymouth for Don Pedro to proceed to Terceira and convey troops to Lisbon.

It seems to be decided that in case the French should land on the coast of the Mediterranean, the Austrians will occupy Rome and the Castle of St. Angelo. A considerable French force is assembled in Corsica.

Government have declined making free grants in future in Van Dieman's Land, in which it is proposed that no land shall be disposed of in future at a less price than five shillings an acre.

**Murder in Galway.**—Mr. Clarke, of the *Western Argus* newspaper, was murdered on Monday night last, and his body thrown into a lake. There are upwards of 300 persons confined there for trial at the present Assizes.

## THE CHOLERA.

LONDON, April 5.—Remaining at last report, 235; new cases, 47; dead 30; recovered, 27; remaining, 125.—Total cases since the commencement, 2,127; total deaths, 1,121.

GLASGOW, April 3.—Remaining at last report, 28; new cases, 18; deaths, 8; recoveries, 6; remaining, 42; total cases, 655; deaths, 334; recoveries, 289.—*Paisley*, April 3.—Remaining, 13; new cases, 5; died, 1; recovered, 1; remaining, 16.—Total cases, 321; died 185; recovered, 120.—*Greenock*, April 2.—Cases remaining, 12; total cases, 72; deaths, 38; recoveries 24.

EDINBURGH.—In Edinburgh and vicinity there have been 14 cases and 10 deaths since Saturday. Total cases in Edinburgh, 62; deaths, 38; recovered, 22.—*Water of Leith*—Cases, 61; deaths, 30; remaining, 5.—*Canonnills*—Cases, 18; deaths, 12; recovered, 6.—*Perth*—Cases, 41; deaths, 15; recovered, 22; remaining, 4.

CHOLERA IN DUBLIN.—It is still doubtful whether any cases of Cholera have occurred in Dublin. The Board of Health have met, and after a long examination of the cases reported as Cholera, are merely enabled to state "that the symptoms of these cases very much resembled those described as attending the epidemic cholera in England."—No definite case of cholera, however, appears yet to have exhibited itself.

Total cases in the United Kingdom, 9,498; deaths, 3,392.

ST. ANDREWS, May 10.—The Cholera. —We wish to guard our readers against being seized with a panic from the idea that the Cholera has found its way into this Province, although we must admit that something resembling it has reached these shores. We will state facts on which our readers may place the most implicit reliance.

The brig Susan, Captain Philip Johnson, of this port, arrived here on Tuesday last, from Dublin, after a passage of 31 days; she had on board when she sailed 123 passengers; several of whom died on the passage—some after a week's indisposition some at a shorter period. The chief affliction was pain in the bowels, looseness, &c. Upwards of fifty had purging, and recovered. Few of the crew escaped.—The passengers were nearly in absolute want of food, potatoes excepted, and their water had become bad and scarce.—Then who can wonder at disease appearing under such circumstances. The brig is only 180 tons, register measure. The Physician (Dr. Thompson) in closing his report of the state of the passengers and crew, says—

"I believe with proper measures being immediately taken eight or ten days will put all right." Every precautionary measure has been taken by the Magistrates that was in their power;—the vessel has been supplied with every thing necessary for the health and comfort of the unfortunate passengers; medical aid has also been furnished, and she has been ordered to Little Hardwood Island to perform Quarantine.

For our own part, we felt no uneasiness, provided all intercourse for a time, with the vessel, is prevented, and vigorous measures, for that purpose, have been adopted.—*Herald*.

Much alarm and anxiety prevailed in this town and neighborhood on Tuesday in consequence of a rumour that disorder resembling the Cholera Morbus was on board the brig Susan arrived that day from Dublin; but confidence is again restored by the report of Dr. Thompson, the visiting physician, who informs us that although

the disease had been of a violent character and fatal in some cases, he found after his second visit that it was easily removed by cleanliness, as the three persons who were very ill on the arrival of the vessel were getting much better on Wednesday.—*Courant*, May 11.

## EXECUTION OF WILLIAM SMITH.

On Saturday the sentence of this unhappy man was put in execution. During the few days of his confinement in Jail, subsequently to his receiving sentence of Death, the Reverend Archdeacon Coster and the Reverend Mr. Busby were unremitting in their attention to the prisoner, and through whose frequent and pious endeavours to awaken the criminal to a clear discovery of his awful situation, good hopes are entertained, under the Divine Blessing, that their labours were not fruitless. He readily assented to the enormity of the crime he had committed, and acquiesced in the justice of his sentence. He made confession in prayer to God for pardon, and was apparently sincere in asking forgiveness through the merits of the Redeemer of the World. He trusted that God would pardon him and expressed himself more willing to die than to live. We witnessed his departure from the prison to "Eternity,"—he walked with a firm and somewhat hasty pace to the fearful array of death before him. He was accompanied throughout the awful solemnities of the scene by the Rev. Mr. Busby, who, in the most christian and feeling manner, performed the religious services at the place of execution. We have no doubt but he felt deeply; but we were astonished at the calmness and fortitude with which he yielded to his untimely fate. After invoking Divine Mercy and commending his spirit to God, he mounted the platform with unshrinking composure, and every thing being in readiness, he was taken by the High Sheriff (whose humane conduct in performing the painful duty which the law imposed on him was strikingly evinced on this melancholy occasion) if he had any thing to say; he replied, "nothing," and bidding the world "Farewell" the Drop fell, and he was launched into Eternity in an instant. The events of the day made a deep and powerful impression on the minds of the numerous spectators, which we sincerely hope may be lasting and beneficial, in reclaiming those who have in any degree yielded to the temptations of the destroyer of soul and body, and in allying many to a life of Religion and Virtue which are the only paths to happiness, comfort and peace in time and through eternity.

III. And be it further enacted, that this Act shall continue and be in force, so long as the hereinbefore in part recited Act, to which this is an amendment, and no longer.

## CAP. IV.

An Act to authorize and empower the Magistrates of the County of Charlotte to sell a certain piece of Land in the Town of Saint Andrews and to vest the proceeds in purchasing another piece of Land for the purpose of erecting a County Gaol thereon in said Town.

Passed 7th May 1832.

**WHEREAS** the Magistrates of Charlotte County have purchased a piece of land in the Town of Saint Andrews, known as Block letter M. Bulkeley's Division, for the purpose of erecting the County Gaol thereon; and whereas it is deemed inexpedient to build the Gaol thereon; and whereas another piece of land in the Town of Saint Andrews more convenient and suitable for that purpose can be purchased by said Magistrates:

Be it therefore enacted by the Lieutenant Governor, Council and Assembly, that the Magistrates of the County of Charlotte be and they are hereby authorized, and empowered in any General or Special Sessions to be held for that purpose, to sell that piece or parcel of land known (as by reference to the plan of the Town of Saint Andrews will more fully appear) as Block letter M. in Bulkeley's Division in the Town of Saint Andrews, and to appropriate the monies derived from such sale towards the purchase of another piece of land in the Town of Saint Andrews on which to erect said County Gaol and towards the expense of erecting the same.

## CAP. V.

An Act to prevent the spreading of Infectious or Pestilential Distempers.

Passed 7th May 1832.

**WHEREAS** it is considered necessary that additional powers should be given to the local authorities in the City of Saint John, and in the several Counties in this Province, in order to prevent the spreading of infectious or pestilential distempers:

1. Be it therefore enacted by the Lieutenant Governor, Council, and Assembly, That the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Saint John in Common Council convened, the Justices of the Peace in the said City and County of Saint John, and in the several Counties in this Province respectively, be and they are hereby authorized and empowered at any General or Special Sessions to be held in their respective Counties to order and direct any police Officer or Constable within their respective jurisdictions to cause the removal of any dirt, filth, rubbish or any other offensive matter or thing, which they may consider as tending to endanger the health of the inhabitants or any of them, from any building, yard, enclosure, or premises; and the authorities aforesaid in Common Council, and at any General or Special Sessions, are hereby respectively empowered to make such regulations for carrying such orders into effect, as they or a majority of them may deem necessary.

2. Provided always, and be it further enacted, That if any action or suit shall be brought in any Court whatsoever against any of the authorities aforesaid, against any police officer or constable for any thing done in execution of the powers given by this Act, such authority, police officer or constable may justify by this Act under the General Issue, without pleading the same specially.

3. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall continue and be in force until the first day of April, which will be in the Year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and thirty four.
