

them, and closely investigated, every point that might tend to the discovery of so diabolical a crime. Esman has confessed his guilt.

Johnston and Charlotte Flavin asserted their innocence, but such was the strong circumstantial and other evidence against the prisoners, that their Worship ordered them to be committed to stand trial for the alleged crime.

Esman and Johnston are Americans; the former has for some time past been resident in this and the neighbouring Provinces. Johnston was formerly second mate of the ship "Horizon" which vessel was cast away on Low Point a few weeks ago.

It is hoped that a Special Commission will be sent from Halifax to try the Prisoners, whose guilt or innocence can thus be ascertained without the long confinement of ten months to await the Supreme Court.—*Nova Scotian*.

**COLONIAL LEGISLATURE.**—The time of the year is approaching, in which the several little transatlantic senates assemble, to regulate matters of small moment to the great world, but much importance to themselves.

Glancing from the Mother Islands over the wide Atlantic, the exhibition which her hardy children in this hemisphere presents, is exhilarating and noble; all are free, and what is better, all have that stamina of their parent which renders it impossible that they shall ever lose their freedom. First, standing out in the great deep, crowned, if not crushed by commerce, is Newfoundland. This island has been lately added to the number for those colonies of freemen, which are thought worthy and capable of being consulted on their own concerns. It is of incontestable exterior and climate, yet possessed of most enterprising, ardent and generous spirits. A beautiful example of what perseverance can accomplish, and of the energy which impels men to scatter themselves, in chase of independence, over every habitable portion of the globe. This Island has but just gained the boon of internal government, she is therefore a novice in the art, but will no doubt follow the track of her elder sisters. Next, Nova Scotia appears, in the van of the continent, possessing all the advantages of an Island by its bold peninsular shape. Commerce and Agriculture here, go hand in hand. The population is decidedly British, with but few, if any, of the childish causes of division, which annoy some of the other provinces. Consequently her legislature, perhaps, approximates more nearly to her great prototype, than any of the others. There is a portion of that directness, manliness and ability, about her Assembly room, which has made St. Stephen's so noted, and so important in the eyes of the world. Under her lee, is the garden of the gulph, P. E. Island; with its little Senate, which evinces a very praiseworthy desire to be as brave and as bold as the best. Farther in, with her stately forests, fruitful valleys, and noble rivers acknowledging rather slowly the hand of the cultivator, is New-Brunswick. Her Senate is a synonyme of that of Nova Scotia. A kind of friendly rivalry exists between the sisters, which should be encouraged, as it is well calculated to excite to good works, and to advances on the path of civilization and national happiness. The provinces at the other side of the lake-fed St. Lawrence, have different characteristics, and their legislatures accordingly, exhibit features rather foreign to the rest. The Lower Canada senate seems to verge on mere demagoguism, while that of the other Province appears to approach the lick-spittle, and divine-light extreme. Both positions, doubtless, have their defects; the former is injurious to that peace and unanimity of action, without which a new country cannot be expected to be eminently prosperous, and would, for the sake of destroying a few reptiles, cover good land with rocks, and fritter away valuable exertion and time; the other extreme would purchase peace and ease by infantile subservience and dependance, if not snake-like grovelling and fortuitousness, which are very derogatory to manhood. Thus we see those various free dependencies, have won themselves a name and a state from the wilderness of this quarter of the world; while beyond all, the immense tracts, unknown, unpeopled, but which may one day sustain nations, of which the now existing Provinces will be but outworks. Certain it is, at least, that these countries are surely not rapidly advancing to a state, which will as much eclipse their present condition, as it does that of a past century; and which will make them of commanding importance to the Kingdoms of the old, and the Republics of the new world. Such reflections, ought to have some weight in the deliberations of their respective governments, and ought to further that self respect and sense of responsibility, which are as far from narrow policy as from recklessness.—*Hal. Recorder*.

**EMIGRATION OF A WHOLE STATE.**—The following curious plan of emigration is stated by the Stuttgart Universal Gazette of the 2d of September, to be in agitation in the Southwest of Germany. A number of liberal persons, disappointed in their hopes of enjoying liberty at home, are organizing an association for the purpose of removing to this country. On the supposition that 60,000 free inhabitants are required in order to entitle a territory to admission into the Union as a State, it was determined to collect the number of emigrants, before their design of emigration should be carried into effect. The same paper adds that the plan was so popular in Germany, that no doubt was entertained of its final success.—*Am. Pap.*

It is well known that the people of this Province, in the early part of the last year, made a subscription for the purpose of purchasing a Piece of Plate, to be presented to our late highly esteemed Governor, Sir HOWARD DOUGLAS, as a tribute of gratitude for his prompt, disinterested, and powerful interferences in behalf of our commercial interests, at the time when they were in danger of being sacrificed by the great influence and specious arguments of interested parties, who were making the greatest exertions to carry, in the Imperial Parliament, commercial measures, which, if they had been adopted, would have proved most injurious to the Trade of the British North American Colonies in general, and especially to that of New Brunswick.

The committee appointed at St. John to carry into effect the wishes of the people, at the request of the committees at Fredericton, Miramichi, and St. Andrews, remitted the amount subscribed, to the Agents for this Province in London, who, accordingly, presented to Sir HOWARD the Piece of Plate, and an Address, of which the following is a copy:

To Major-General Sir Howard Douglas, Baronet, K. S. C., C. B., F. R. S., &c. &c.  
The undersigned, on behalf of the people of the Province of New Brunswick, requests your acceptance of a PIECE OF PLATE, in testimony of the sense they entertain of your disinterested, timely and efficient exertions in protecting the trade of the North American Colonies, against attempts recently made to alter Commercial regulations, on the stability of which, their present and future interests so greatly depend.

Desirous to record their opinion of the measure, your prompt and reasonable opposition to which, has called forth the indignation of the feelings and sentiments of the Inhabitants of this Colony; and equally desirous to avoid any thing that would detract from the importance they attach to that particular act, they have not, in the Inscription, made any allusion to your public and private virtues, of which, however, they would now briefly assure you the people of this Province are by no means insensible.

That you may reap the reward due to those virtues, is doubtless the wish of all to whom you are best known, and of none more sincerely, than of those who now address you in behalf of the loyal Inhabitants of the Province of New-Brunswick.

To this Address, Sir Howard made the following reply:

To Charles Simonds, Esquire, Chairman, and the other Gentlemen of the Committee acting on behalf of the people of New-Brunswick.

Gentlemen,  
I Receive with great satisfaction, this memorial, and these assurances of the sense entertained by the People of New Brunswick, of my general attention to the Commercial affairs of the Province, and especially of the exertions used by me on a recent occasion, in which the interests of the British North American Provinces, and of New Brunswick, in particular, were deeply concerned.

On my departure from the Province, I assured the Commercial Body of Saint John, in reply to their address, that I would not fail to make use of the knowledge I had acquired of the interests and trade of New Brunswick, and the other North American Provinces, to do all in my power to represent and protect those interests, in the event of any thing occurring during my residence in London, which might appear to require any such explanation or representation. Neither consulted upon, nor aware of the proposed alteration in the

Duties on Timber and Deals, I had no alternative consistent with my well known opinion, and the assurance which I had pledged, but to take a course which should effectually prove my adherence to those opinions, my faithful observance of the promise I had made, and which might, moreover, protect me from any suspicion of having given an equivocal opinion upon a matter so vital to your interests, and upon which, therefore, it was very generally surmised, that, being in London, I must have been consulted.

I assure you, Gentlemen, that it was with much regret I found myself under the necessity of making sacrifice of my official connection with the people of New-Brunswick, and I shall ever feel a deep interest in their welfare, and sincerely wish them all manner of prosperity.

As a memorial of the grateful sense they entertain of the disinterested and persevering zeal and distinguished ability, with which he often advocated the Commercial Interests of the Province, and especially on the late occasion of an attempt to alter the existing scale of Duties on Colonial and Foreign Timber and Deals,—an attempt, which had it proved successful, must have produced serious injury to His Majesty's subjects in British North America, and to the Maritime Prosperity of Great-Britain.

We are happy to have it in our power to give publicity to the foregoing documents, creditable as they are to the feelings of the people of this Province, and to the distinguished individual whose great talents were an opportunity exerted in protecting our Commerce from ruin. We shall not dwell upon the sacrifice which Sir Howard so nobly made, of his own interests to those of the North American Colonies; but we cannot forbear remarking that no person ever within the boundaries of New-Brunswick, could be more devoted to the interests of the Province than was our late excellent Governor, Sir HOWARD DOUGLAS, who whilst assiduously attending to all the internal affairs of the Province, watched with constant and deep solicitude, the progress of measures from time to time agitated in the Parent State, by which the prosperity of this colony might be affected; and, with the eye of a statesman, he was as quick to perceive the tendency of those measures, as he was prompt to oppose such of them as were ill-judged and inexpedient.

Some estimate may be formed of the value of Sir HOWARD'S able and convincing Pamphlet, from the circumstance of its having been most eagerly sought for by Members of Parliament at the time the subject of the Duties on Timber and Deals was under discussion; and from the fact, that the best informed friends of the Colonies, in Great Britain, are most desirous that a new edition of it should be published, as the most effectual expedient to defeat the designs of those, who, it is apprehended, will endeavour, at the next session of Parliament, to effect such alteration in the Duties on Timber and Deals, as would almost, if not entirely, annihilate our trade in those articles.
