

The reports from the 4th and 5th districts continue to announce that every thing is quiet; in the 4th district a reinforcement of troops is asked for; the Belgians on that part of the frontiers at West Capello and Watervliet were much stronger.

Our correspondent at Mincogen informs us that there, too, an assemblage of the troops is spoken of; probably, in the entrenched camp near that city; the measures taken in this and other parts of our country, seem, therefore, to indicate that preparation is making for important events in the approaching spring, though without giving reason to imagine that a hostile attack upon Belgium is intended; on the contrary, these measures seem rather to be precautions against an attack.

Count Orloff, Envoy Extraordinary, and General Aid-de-Camp to the Emperor Nicholas, has been sent from London to the Hague, to negotiate with the King of the Netherlands an arrangement which no one entertains a hope he will be able to bring about. The determination of King William appears to be irrevocable, and we are firmly convinced that it is not with negotiation, nor with hostile words, that he will be induced to put a period to a system of obstinacy which has for so long a time endangered the peace of Europe.

If England had not placed so much stress upon the desire that our troops should stop at the Dutch frontiers—if, as the price of our return, we had required the surrender of Antwerp, and even that of Maestricht, the King of Holland would not have held menacing language. It is to be hoped that this fact will serve as a lesson to our Ally to ourselves.

LATEST NEWS.
[From the Saint John Courier.]
By the arrival of the Packet Brig Julia, and the Barque Jane, we have received New-York and Boston papers—the former to Friday and the latter to Tuesday last, inclusive. They contain advices from Liverpool to the 1st of March.

King Ferdinand had come forward to back Don Miguel in his lawless and blood thirsty course; but should the tree of liberty get once firmly rooted in Portugal, the imbecile King of Spain would soon be made to totter on his throne.

The Reform Bill was progressing at a more rapid pace through the House of Commons, and it was supposed it would finally pass that body about the 12th of March, and be immediately sent to the House of Lords; where, without new Peers, it must again founder.

From the last official report of the Cholera in London, it appears that there had been 104 cases and 69 deaths, in the metropolis. Until within a day or two of last dates, the apprehensions had much subsided; but on the 27th Feb. there were 20 new cases and 11 deaths; of the new cases 11 were in Southwark, 4 in Newington Butts, and 2 in Chelsea; 45 of all the cases were in Southwark.

QUARANTINE AT BOSTON.—The British barque *Dependent*, Capt. Gallie, 56 days from Liverpool, which arrived at Boston on Sunday last, has been placed under quarantine at that port. No particular cause is assigned.

The *Morning Post* of Monday states, that the Pilot wished to anchor her at the quarantine ground, but the captain insisted, and in fact ordered him to bring her up to the city. She has since been ordered back to the roads.

UNION FIRE CLUB.
At a Meeting of the Club, on Thursday the 16th Instant, it was resolved, that the Sixth and Seventh section of the bye Laws be inserted six weeks in the Royal Gazette, for Public Information:—

VI. That on an alarm of Fire, every Member shall, with all possible haste, proceed to the House in danger, and there use every exertion in his power to save the Property within from destruction, by expeditiously removing the same to such place of safety as the President, or those appointed to act in his absence, shall direct; and if any member neglect to repair to any Fire, with all his necessary utensils, or withdraw therefrom, without leave before the property removed be deposited in a place of safety, he shall, if the offence appear wilful, be excluded from the Club.

VII. That the Member who first arrives at any House on Fire shall, with the consent of the owner, or tenants thereof, take charge of the Door and allow no person to enter, save the Members of the Club, the Owner, the Servants, or the Firewards; if possession be denied no Member shall persist, but all shall use their utmost exertions, in co-operation with the Fire Company, to stop the progress of the Fire.
