

hour of St. Georges; two schooners, the Jane and Marie, owned by the Messrs. Davenport, were driven against the shore; the former having a large portion of the copper on one side of her bottom rubbed off, and the other broke her rudder; the vessels at this end of the island sustained little or no damage. There were many boats either driven from their moorings or sunk at them. Several houses were particularly, two entirely unroofed; fences prostrated; such, banana, orange, lemon, pride of India, and cedar trees suffered much—many of them torn up by the roots, the fruit trees generally were more than usually prolific, promising abundant crops.

JUNE 19.—H. M. S. Ariadne, Captain Philips, from Nassau, N. P. and bound to Jamaica, called here on Friday last, and sailed again on the following day for her destination. The Ariadne experienced a hurricane on the morning of the 8th inst. near Watland's Island; was thrown on her beam ends, and remained down for near 3 hours, and righted with the loss of mizen-mast, boats, &c. having three feet water in the hold. Saw after the gale, two disabled ships, their crews employed bailing jury masts.

The brig Pedlar, John Green, Master, from Porto Rico, laden with molasses, coffee, &c. bound to New York, put into Saint George's on Thursday last in distress, having been thrown on her beam ends on the morning of the 8th inst. about 300 miles on the S. W. of these islands. A great part of her cargo has been pumped out with the water which she made during the time she was down.

FROM MADEIRA.—Accounts from Madeira to the 4th May have been received at N. Y. The island was still blockaded by Don Pedro's squadron. There were 2000 men under arms on the island ostensibly in the interest of Don Miguel, but it was expected, if attacked, they would make but a feeble resistance.

CHOLERA AT QUEBEC.

The Malady has now been in existence here for eighteen days. During the first fortnight, it carried off a thousand souls, a proportion of at least 1 in 87 of the population. Of that thousand we estimate that nine hundred were adults, and estimating the adults as 1 to 4 of the population, the deaths among adults would have been 1 in 9, a ratio of deaths really extraordinary, and warranting the conclusion, that the malady, while it has borne all the characteristics of rapid destruction, has also borne the characteristics of a disease which may prove fatal. These observations refer to the first fortnight's operation of the disease. From that time to this, the 18th day, it has frequently been of a milder type, and the new cases have considerably diminished. Yet it cannot be concealed that, generally speaking, very many cases still occur, partaking of the severest description, where a total exhaustion of the system follows two or three hours after the commencement of the disease, and the commencement of spasms, and where the usual remedies fail to operate any beneficial change even in the most robust habits of body. We have every reason to hope that it will gradually diminish in malignancy, and disappear perhaps sooner than it has done in Europe. The difficulty at present must be about 1200, and it is remarkable that a large proportion of them are men. Thus, we believe, is the course it has followed in Europe; women and children suffering more in the latter stages of the malady.—*Neilsen's Gazette.*

We are happy to say that the disease does not spread in the country parts. By reference to yesterday's French Gazette, the reader will find the details of its effects in the parish of Saint Nicholas, a few miles above Quebec, on the south bank of the St. Lawrence, and also the numerous cures effected by Messrs. Dufresne, the Priest of that parish who details, under his own name, the treatment followed in upwards of 50 cases, four or five of which only proved fatal. That treatment appears extremely rational; it is merely infernal stimulants, and the substitute of the warm bath instead of friction. Two or three, at Lorette, at Lange Garden, on the north side of the river, at St. Michel, on the south; but there is at present no appearance that the contagion will spread. In Berthier (on Lake St. Peter) a number of persons have fallen victims to the cholera. At Sorel, we understand, several deaths have also occurred.—*Id.*

This dreadful disorder has so much abated in its violence, that we hope for its speedy disappearance from this city, unless some new cause should occur which may again subject us to its desolating reign. It had appeared as we have already stated in some parishes having a continued intercourse with Quebec and whose male population are employed in the public and private buildings carrying on here, and in the ship yards and coves, in their various capacities of masons, carpenters, shipwrights and labourers; so far as we are informed the mortality in the neighbouring parishes has principally been amongst these people and their families, the origin of this disease in Quebec has not, we believe, been distinctly ascertained, as cases were reported to have occurred before the arrival of any emigrants or indeed of any shipping, and if we are correctly informed, the first two cases, at the commencement of the disease, were not emigrants, but one a sailor from a vessel, not from home, and the other a man who had been some time in the country. Be this as it may, the idea that it is contagious subjects the emigrants to general and severe distress, even those who have money cannot find shelter, and travelling to Upper Canada is also interrupted, the crews of the Durham-boats having deserted their craft, from the dread of cholera.—As the disease abates, it is to be hoped this panic will wear off, and matters return to their usual channel.

In the Province the populous village of Berthier appears to have suffered more than any other place, except the cities, whilst Three Rivers, situated on a high sandy knoll, has escaped.

But wherever it may spread, or however great its devastations may be, we are firmly convinced, from what has passed here, that the attempt to prevent the introduction of cholera, into whatever place it is the will of Providence it shall enter, must prove ineffectual, and that our utmost efforts should be directed to relieve or mitigate its violence, and remove as far as is practicable, every cause which may predispose to its existence.—*Quebec Mercury.*

Among the deaths this morning was Mrs. Duchesnay, widow of the late Hon. Mr. Duchesnay, Legislative Council, and Seigneur of Beauport. In Dorchester ward the warrier reported six deaths since Saturday at two p. m. In Champlain-street there were, we understand, three deaths yesterday. The disease shows itself in much more varied forms than it did, and if early attention is given to all the ailments which in ordinary times are generally considered dangerous, though the movement, the fatal stages of the disease may be averted. Colds, indigestions, bowel complaints, pains in the stomach, frequent perspirations, and indeed any kind of indisposition, ought to be attended to, for they are likely to be followed by the spasmodic stage and the collapse, from which, if recovery ensues, slow fever may supervene, and the patient remain long enfeebled.

Since the date of our last publication we are enabled to communicate to our readers much important information relative to the vast changes which have recently taken place in the political administration of affairs in Great Britain: Earl Grey's administration having been recalled, are now invested with such powers as may be found necessary to carry the Reform Bill; it has been read a second time in the House of Lords, and the third reading was to take place on the 4th June. It is the intention of His Lordship to push the Bill forward with all possible expedition, and we may expect by the next accounts from England, that it has become the law of the land. We were yesterday very politely favored with the perusal of Greenock Papers to the 5th ult. from which we have extracted several articles, but we regret, from the quantity of matter then in type, the omission of many interesting particulars which we may probably notice in our next number.

His Excellency Sir Archibald Campbell and Miss Campbell arrived here on Saturday last in the Steamer Saint George from St. John, on their return from Saint Andrews. Capt. Campbell, who also accompanied His Excellency, returned by way of the Nerepis Road.

We yesterday received our regular files of Canadian Papers—Quebec to the 23 inst. and Montreal to the 30 ult. By the last report we learn that although both in hospital and private practice there is a diminution of deaths, yet there is no considerable decrease in the new cases of Cholera in regard to private practice:—The accounts however from the different infected districts are of the most pleasing description, and encourage us to hope that the disease is fast subsiding.

From Montreal we learn that the physicians have but few to visit in the circle of private practice. Cases of typhus fever, diarrhoea, and common bowel complaints are at present very prevalent in that city. They are the result of the present diseased state of the atmosphere; but few of them can be regarded as at all dangerous.

The Board of Health on the 23d state that only a very few deaths have occurred, and that no deaths has occurred, where medical and other attention has been early and promptly applied; and that it possesses the fullest evidence that the town is at this moment, in other respects, unusually healthy.

The Plattsburgh Republican of the 23d instant furnishes us with the report of the Board of Health of Plattsburgh to the 22d, June A. M. No new cases—seven had occurred in all, of whom six had died, the remaining one convalescent.

BOARD OF HEALTH, WHITEHALL, June 23d, 1832.
Our village continues in a healthy state. We are at present entirely free from disease and from emigrants.

No new cases at Whitehall, Burlington, Plattsburgh, or any of the towns bordering in Canada, in the United States. Efforts to prevent the introduction of the disease were continued with unabated vigilance.

Albany was never more healthy at this season of the year. For the forty-eight hours ending yesterday morning, we have the remarkable fact, that not a case of death of any kind occurred in the city; nor is there the appearance of malignant disease of any kind.

HURRICANE.—Captain Lawrence, of the brig Thetis, of Middletown, from St. Croix, has called on us and given the following report.
June 7th, in lat. 28 deg. 40 min., long. 70 deg. experienced a severe hurricane, which came on suddenly, and lasted about 7 hours. He had time to get the brig under bare poles before it struck him, but it blew so violently, that they lost both masts, all the sails except the light ones, jibboom, deck load, and small boat. The passengers, Messrs. I. Hos. Armstrong and John Beattie of St. Croix, thought they never had witnessed so severe a hurricane. Of 101 puncheons of rum, molasses and sugar on deck, only 12 were saved.

After the storm, Capt. L. made jury masts of four awning poles and came into port with them, about 900 miles. The gale varied from S. W. to W. and blew hardest from S. S. W. to W. 2nd June, spoke Majestic, Capt. Robinson, from N. Orleans, with the loss of top gallant masts and yards—sails and rigging much injured. Same day off Cape Henry, spoke schr. Gleaner, from Havannah, for Newport, which took off the passengers, and supplied the Thetis with water.—*Hal. Royal Gazette.*

Hurricane at Havanna.—The Gleaner reported that on the 27th there was a hurricane at Havanna, which drove almost every vessel in port ashore, and sunk two droghers.—*Id.*
