

PORTUGAL.

Lisbon.—All this capital is in commotion, the Government and its creatures in the greatest alarm, whilst the Constitutionalists can hardly contain their joy. Six ships of the Constitutional squadron made their appearance upon the 23d March, near the coast to the north of this capital, as far as the fort St. Suzanne, which is near Peniche. This time it turned out not to be the Russians, as a broadside against the fort very soon proved. Immediately the drums beat to arms, masses of troops hastened from all quarters upon this point, and the guns of the fort answered to the salute of the vessels. A very brisk cannonade the ships retired, taking a direction northwards, where other attacks of the same nature will no doubt be made.

GREECE.

The affairs of Greece have lately become the leading topic of discussion with the German papers. It would appear, by the latest arrivals of these journals, that the choice of Prince Otto of Bavaria, as the new sovereign of that country, has met not only with the concurrence of the father of the royal youth, but with his cordial approbation and that of his ministers. So earnest is the king in the cause, that he has already set out for the land of promise in person, in order to pave the way for the introduction of the future youthful monarch of that country. His Majesty, with Count Heydenger, left Munich at six o'clock in the morning of the 4th instant, for Italy, on his way to Rome.

HOLLAND & BELGIUM.

Austria and Prussia have at length ratified the Dutch treaty. These ratifications were exchanged at the Foreign Office, on Wednesday evening; and the treaty of the 15th of November, 1831, is, therefore, now considered as approved by the four great powers of Europe, England, France, Austria, and Prussia. No doubt is entertained that Russia will fulfil her engagements; indeed, her ratifications are confidently said to be in London, and the last advices from St. Petersburg announce that the next courier from thence will authorize the exchange of them. But it is said, that a clause has been inserted in the treaty which provides, that, if any modifications of particular parts of it should be settled between Holland and Belgium, and meet with the concurrence of the five powers, they shall be stated in a supplement, which will be considered as forming part of the original treaty. This seems to be intended as a sop to the obstinacy of the Dutch King, and may, perhaps, have the effect of concluding it, and inducing him to accept the definitive arrangement.

According to an official report just published at Brussels, the population of Belgium amounted, in January, 1832, to 4,032,527 inhabitants.

The April English Mail reached us on Sunday last, but we had previously received later dates than those it contained, through the medium of the Saint John papers, and by an arrival at Halifax, which brought intelligence from London to the 30th of April, and Liverpool to the 1st of May. We are happy to learn both from the public prints and private letters, that the Cholera is on the decline in London. In Paris, however, it has raged to a frightful extent—twenty thousand human beings having been swept out of existence since its appearance in that City. The pestilence has also broken out in several of the most populous places in Ireland. In Dublin and Cork the deaths are few since the commencement of the disease, compared with the numerous population of those cities.

We have copied the Duke of Wellington's protest against the second reading of the Reform Bill, which received the signature of 73 Peers.

The Common Council of the city of London, have resolved to petition the House of Lords to pass the Reform Bill, and to present the freedom of the city to Earl Grey and Lord Althorpe.

New sources of trouble respecting the Netherlands appear. M. Thiers the Belgian Governor of Luxembourg has been forcibly arrested by a band of men, has been carried into the Dutch territory, and there imprisoned.

Portugal.—Accounts from the tyrant-ridden land are frightful. Several military murders had occurred; and orders had been issued to arrest all persons who had not paid the forced loan. Madeira is blockaded by Don Pedro.

The British American Land Company has succeeded in disposing of the whole of the shares reserved for subscribers in Britain, without having satisfied the public demand, and it is now determined to increase the numbers to 10,000.

The terms on which the lands are to be obtained have not yet been finally arranged. Government now wishing to limit the Company to 100,000 acres in Lower Canada, and 100,000 in New Brunswick, in each year, a new valuation to be made out every second year; terms as to price to be arranged in the Colonies—one half of the money to be laid out in objects of general improvement.—St. John Courier.

The New Canada Land Company had a meeting in London on Friday. Mr. Galt read a report, stating that of the shares of the company, 8,051 had been already subscribed for; 2,000 were kept for subscribers in Canada. The whole number was intended to be 10,000, at £25 each. Government was willing to assign to the company 1,500,000 acres, at the rate of 250,000 acres every two years, but they would fix no price for future allotments.

There is a considerable demand for those kinds of woollen goods that are suited to the climate of North America, although, in a general point of view, the trade is very dull. It has been recently increased by the preparations that are making for emigration to Canada, which are this season on a gigantic scale, compared with former years.

A good deal of anxiety has been manifested during the week, on account of the various reports in circulation of the nature of the disease on board the Terry, now performing quarantine. The following report of the Health Officers is highly satisfactory, and will tend to remove all apprehension of contagion. Much credit is due to the Magistrates for the rigorous manner in which they have enforced the quarantine Regulations.—Gleaner.

This is to certify, that we examined the Passengers on board the brig Terry. That shortly after leaving Dublin, a disease broke out similar to Cholera, of which ten died; that several are now labouring under slight affections of the bowels, which might be attributed in a great degree (if not altogether) to crowding, filth and want of nourishment; in which opinion we are the more confirmed by observing the rapid improvement that has taken place in a few days (without medicine) since their diet has been increased, and cleanliness more attended to.

On Thursday last a Special Sessions of the Admiralty Court was held, the Hon. Judges Halliburton and Unwin, and the Hon. T. N. Jeffrey, Samuel Cunard, H. H. Cogswell and James Tobin presiding as Commissioners, for the trial of PATRICK CRANE charged with the murder of LUKAS RICHARD, master of a vessel in which CRANE was a passenger. The Court adjourned over till Thursday, when a further adjournment was proposed by Mr. Unwin, Counsel for the prisoner, under the plea, that a witness named Walsh, who was absent from the Province could testify as to his insanity. The Court was about to adjourn for a month, when they learnt from Mr. KAVANAGH, who had just come into court, that WALSH came up for the purpose of giving his evidence; and upon enquiry it being ascertained that he had been seen within the preceding three days, the trial proceeded on Friday, and the Jury found the prisoner guilty. After which his Honor Mr. Justice HALLIBURTON proceeded to pronounce the awful sentence of the law, and the unfortunate man remains awaiting his execution. The transaction altogether is most unaccountable, no dispute or anger had been manifested by either party; and CRANE states that he cannot account for his conduct. Halifax Free Press.

DECEASED.

Suddenly, on Thursday the 24th ulto, after a severe illness of twenty-four hours, at his residence in Wilmot, Nova Scotia, Lieutenant-Colonel SAMUEL VETCH BAYARD, in the 75th year of his age. Col. B. served his King with fidelity and zeal during the American Revolutionary war, distinguished by the example of his loyal father, whose inflexible attachment to the standard of his sovereign was followed by the consecration of an ample and extensive property. In the life of Col. B. was exemplified every christian and social virtue, and he was in the proper sense of the terms, a Gentleman, a Scholar, and a Christian. He was one of the most humane, meek, devoted, faithful, and holy men of God of the present age. His time, talents, influence, and property, were all uniformly and constantly consecrated to the service of the Lord. It was "his meat and drink to do the will of his Heavenly Father." The spirit of deep piety by which he was animated, and the union of a divine love which emanated from him in every circle in which he moved, made his company and conversation to be greatly desired, not only by the pious of every denomination, but also by people of every description. He was a zealous member of the Wesleyan Methodist Society for upwards of thirty years, of which Society he not long since said, that "her doctrines and discipline are the most pure of any Church upon earth." Viewing Ministers of the Gospel as servants of the Most High, and Messengers of Salvation, he esteemed them highly in love for their works' sake, inasmuch, that the very best accommodation which his liberal means could afford, was at their service, and it was with difficulty he could be restrained from performing the humblest offices to promote their comfort. As a Magistrate upon whom devolved the principal part of the business of the Township in which he resided, he was a terror to evil doers, and a praise and support to those who did well. By his removal his family have sustained an irreparable loss, the cause of religion also has been deprived of an illustrious ornament and an able advocate, the Bible Society and the Temperance Society of a warm and zealous promoter, and the poor of a sympathising friend and a liberal benefactor. But God said, it is enough, "he has been called from the labours and sufferings of the Church militant, to the glories and joys of the Church triumphant."
