We are again indebted to Halifax papers for
our latest intelligence from Europe,
brought by the Ship Kingston, in 27 days
from London. There appears, however,
to be very little communicated of im-
portance in addition to our former advices.
We have selected a variety of interesting
articles copied from London papers of the
27th July, to which we subjoin the follow-
ing SUMMARY.

The Irish Church Temporalities Bill passed
the Committee of the House of Lords on the
26th. The report would be received on the
29th.

The India Company's Charter Bill passed
its third reading on the 27th.

The Slavery Abolition Bill was still under
consideration in the Committee of the House
of Commons, though its principal clauses had
been passed.

The Bill for consolidating and simplifying
the Customs was in progress through the
Commons.

The arrangements with the Bank appear to
have been settled.

The Jewish Civil Disabilities Bill had passed
a third reading by a majority of 187.

The Cholera, appears still to be finding its
way into different parts of Europe: Its effects
have been experienced at Utrecht, Antwerp
and Rotterdam.

The intelligence from Portugal is of such a
nature as to lead to the expectation that our
next accounts will show that Don Pedro is in
possession of Lisbon.

Other parts of Europe are imitating the li-
beral policy which England has manifested to-
wards the Jews.

The last accounts from Constantinople men-
tion that the English squadron under Admiral
Malcolm had left their station near the Darda-
nelles, and joined the French squadron at the
entrance of the Gulf Smyrna.

The Herring fishing on the coast of Scotland
has been very successful.

The fortifications of Paris have been suspend-
ed in consequence of the Chambers having re-
fused to vote the requisite funds.

The Duke of Sutherland has recently died in
Scotland.—The Queen of Belgium has been
safely delivered of a son.

The salary of the Secretary to the Lord
Chamberlain has been abolished.

The cholera has re-appeared with consider-
able violence in both Flanders and Holland.

The statement in an article dated Constanti-
nople, 26th of June, which appears under the
head of Flanders mail, asserting that the Bri-
tish fleet under Sir P. Malcolm had been re-
fused by the Turkish authorities a passage
through the Dardanelles, we are informed is
incorrect.

JULY 26.
In the House of Commons Mr. Clay proposed
a resolution relative to the admission of foreign

sugar for refinement for exportation, which,
after some conversation, was withdrawn in ac-
cordance with the wishes of the house, who
appeared satisfied with Lord Althorp's decla-
ration that the subject was under the consid-
eration of Government, with the view of effecting
a just and satisfactory adjustment of the ques-
tion.

Capt. Back's Expedition.—The Mon-
treal papers of Wednesday furnish the fol-
lowing intelligence of the progress of this
traveller, on an errand of humanity:

On Monday last, two canoes, manned
by voyageurs of the Hon. Hudson's Bay
Company, arrived at Lachine from the
interior. By these, letters have been re-
ceived from Capt. Back, dated the 19th
June, from Jack River, a small depot and
trading post of the company at the north
west extremity of Lake Oumiquique, in
which Capt. Back reports himself and party
in excellent health. He also expres-
ses himself much satisfied with the ar-
rangements made, and zeal manifested in
the interior to facilitate the object of the
expedition. The following is verbatim:
"As the season is fast advancing, I
purpose proceeding immediately in a light
canoe to find out the Thieu chi cho, and
to select a wintering station, which may
be effected before or by the time my
heavy barges reach the Athabasca, and
by this means they will be enabled to
come on direct to the end of their jour-
ney."—*Journal of Commerce.*

Complaints are very general of the
manner in which the Canada Flour, which
has been shipped this season, to this port,
is packed. Instead of being pressed hard
into the barrel, as it must be to contain
the proper weight, it generally has the
appearance of having been thrown from
the original barrel, and thrown loosely
into another, consequently each barrel
is considerably short of its lawful weight.
We saw not long since some remarks in
the Montreal papers on the subject, and
trust they will have the effect of remedy-
ing the evil, otherwise much difficulty will
be experienced by the sellers of this arti-
cle, as buyers will have to adopt measures
to prevent imposition.—*Miramichi Gleaner.*

Attempt at Robbery.—On Saturday
evening, about 10 o'clock, three persons
feloniously entered the house of Mr.
THOMAS G. HATHWAY, north end of
Brussels-street, and after procuring a light
proceeded to the shop on the lower floor
of the building, from which they took some
bread, not being able to find any money.
Mr. H., who was asleep at the time, on
being awakened, immediately proceeded to
the room where the robbers were, who
hearing the advancing footsteps, began
their retreat; Mr. H. arriving just in time
to seize the hindmost by the foot, as he
was making his exit through a window.
The fellow, however, succeeded in rescuing
his foot from the unwelcome grasp and
made off, leaving the stocking in the hands
of the landlord.—The road was then
watched by Mr. H. and his neighbours till
midnight, when the rogues were discover-
ed returning to town. Two of them were
secured, and lodged in prison. A pair of
shoes and the stolen bread were afterwards
found near the premises.—*St. John Obser-
ver.*

The Company of the Royal Artillery
at present on service in this Province,
under command of Captain Evans, are
under orders to proceed to Halifax, and
will leave here the week after the arrival
of the Company coming to relieve them.—
The latter are expected by the steamer
Maid of the Mist from Windsor, either this
week or next. Captain Evans' Company
will take the same route to Halifax.—*ib.*

Baltic Timber.—We have the present
summer observed in the Halifax papers the
arrival at that place of about eight or nine
vessels from different parts in the Baltic,
with timber, which after being landed at
Halifax, is to be re-shipped and carried to
England, and entered as Colonial Timber.
Several vessels with similar cargoes have
also arrived at Pictou.—If these circuit-
ous voyages prove successful the plan
will doubtless be followed up more exten-
sive hereafter, unless Parliament should,
by some timely Act, prevent so glaring
an evasion of the Revenue Laws of the
country.—*ib.*

Extensive seizure of Teas at Halifax.—
The Halifax Royal Gazette of Wednes-
day last, says,—"The Officers of the
Customs were actively employed the last
week in searching for contraband Goods.
Among other articles seized by them were
large quantities of Teas of the value at least
of Two Thousand Pounds.—*ib.*"

Passengers in the ship Druid from Saint
John, to Bristol.—Lieut. Colonel KELLY,
34th Regt., and Mr. MURRAY, of Spring-
hill, near Fredericton.

(From the St. John Courier.)

We are indebted to the attention of a Gentle-
man who came passenger in the Water Witch,
for Boston papers of Saturday last. They con-
tain accounts from Portugal, brought by a ves-
sel which was off Oporto on the 17th July—but
we believe the intelligence is no later than has
already reached us through the English papers.
We subjoin a few extracts:

The Marquis of Palmella writes from Lagos,
under date of the 9th July, that he has entire-
ly completed the Judicial and Executive or-
ganization for all Algarves; that the 'Queen
and the Constitution' has been proclaimed every-
where, without a single town refusing to ac-
knowledge the Legitimate Government. The
'Expeditionary Division' was daily increasing
in force, and was prepared to make decided
movements against the enemy.

Don Pedro has conferred on Vice Admiral
Napier, the title of Viscount of St. Vincent and
Admiral of the Royal Navy, and has author-
ized him to name sixty of his officers as most
worthy of the ancient order of 'Knights of
the Tower and Sword of Valor and Loyalty.'

The papers announce the constant arrival of
deserters at Oporto in large numbers; on the
18th, two entire regiments arrived. Don Pe-
dro is represented to be very active. Affairs at
Oporto had assumed a most encouraging ap-
pect, and the papers contain minute details of
sundry skirmishes in the vicinity, in which the
troops of Donna Maria were victorious—com-
pelling, on one occasion, the Miguelites to re-
treat, with a reported loss of eight or nine hun-
dred men.

ANOTHER WHALER.—This day a splendid
copper Ship of 400 tons, called the Betsy
Baker, intended for a Whaler from this port,
was launched from the ship yard of Mr. Wm. Law-
ton, in Portland. She was greeted with a sa-
lute of artillery from the end of the North Mar-
ket wharf. The Betsy Baker is owned by
Messrs W. & T. LEAVITT, and JAMES KIRK,
Esq., of this City, and is to be fitted out im-
mediately for a whaling voyage.—We are glad to see
our merchants engaging so earnestly in this lu-
crative trade, and we trust the owners of this
vessel will be amply rewarded for their present
enterprise.

The frame of another vessel for the same
owners, and intended for the same trade, is
understand, to be put up immediately on
the spot from which the Betsy Baker has been
launched.

New VESSEL.—We have frequently noticed
the improvement that has of late years taken
place in ship-building in this neighbourhood;
but we cannot omit mentioning the Briggs Non-
pareil and Trio, as additional specimens of the
progress of the art. These vessels were built
at Quaco—the former by Mr. MARR, for Mr.
JAMES K. M'KEE, and the latter by Mr.
BRADSHAW, for Messrs. BLAKESLEE and ESTREY,
and Mr. JAMES HOLMAN, of this City—and are
pronounced to be superior vessels of their class,
and calculated, to enhance the reputation of
their builders.

THE ARMY.—The regimental yearly cloth-
ing, instead of being issued on New Year's
day, as heretofore, will not be delivered until
the 1st of April, commencing next year.—Bar-
rack Masters, on home or foreign stations, are
not to appear in the vicinity of their quarters,
without wearing the dress or undress uniform
of the department.

The Royal Hospital at Kilmainham is to be
broken up. Such of the inmates as are en-
titled to enter Chelsea, will be drafted to that
establishment. "The Old Man's House" is to
be converted into an Artillery Barrack, in-
stead of Isola Bridge. The number of veterans
now in hospital, are as follows:—privates,
207; sergeants, 12; commissioned officers, 12.

The Royal Hibernian School in the Phoenix
Park, Dublin, is also to be broken up im-
mediately—the officers having received a notifica-
tion to that effect from the Government.

Report says, that the army half-pay is to be
ultimately done away with, and that officers
retiring from regiments from old age or other
causes, are to sell their commissions.—*Hamp-
shire Tel.*

Orders have been issued for all unmarried
Chelsea pensioners under 45, to hold themselves
in readiness to serve in the coast guards revenue
establishment.

Sir HUSSEY VIVIAN.—A rumour was cur-
rent in the garrison that this distinguished of-
ficer is about to succeed Sir James Kempt as
Master General of the Ordnance. It is also
said that Lieutenant General Sir Colquhoun
Grant comes to Ireland as Commander-in-
Chief, an appointment which, if correct, would
give infinite satisfaction in Dublin, from the re-
collection of his former conduct during the
eight years he commanded the Leinster dis-
trict. Sir Colquhoun has recently succeeded to
a very large fortune.—*Dublin Times.*

Capt. Vivian, 7th Hussars, employed upon
the staff of the army in Ireland, as aide-de-
camp to Lieutenant-General Vivian, has been
appointed military secretary to the Lieutenant
General commanding, vice Lord Templemore,
resigned.

Extract of a Letter from River Phillip, dated
August 16.—Two persons that were lost
in the woods near this place, the particulars of
which appeared in the Novascotian of the 14th
inst., were found by a party of men from Eco-
nomy on the 12th instant, after being eleven
days and nights in the woods without food or
shelter except the few berries they occasionally
met with. The way they were discovered was
by sounding a shell, and the girl, although at a
considerable distance, succeeded in making the
men hear her voice. When they were disco-
vered, the old man was very feeble and emac-
iated, being unable to stand; the girl was in
apparent health, though quite weak. The
men constructed a sort of a litter, and placed
the old man upon it, and brought him to the
nearest house, a distance of 6 or 7 miles, where
he expired a few moments after his arrival;
the girl continues weak, but sanguine hopes
are entertained of her final recovery.—*Nov-
scotian.*
