CAPE BRETON.—Mr. Secretary Stanley, in answer to the Petition sent to England some time since, in which a restoration of the ancient constitution of Cape Breton was prayed for, has forwarded a dispatch to the Executive here in which he says:—“That with a view to bringing forward the claim which they have advanced in the most effectual and correct mode, their petition should be drawn up and addressed to his Majesty in Council, and that they should be apprised that the case will be heard in Council in that Tribunal whenever the subject will be regularly brought forward.”

The Herald of the 8th September says:—“We regret to hear from almost every quarter that the late frosts have most seriously injured the crops in this Island, particularly the potatoes. It is reported that in several places the latter have been rendered nearly useless, and that individuals in some parts are even this early subsisting altogether upon milk, not having any other description of food whatever; and this not arising from an inclination not to touch their potatoes until they come to maturity, but because owing to the lateness of the season these had advanced so little in their growth, when the frost blighted them, that they were not fit for use.”

THE SUBALTERN'S FURLOUGH.—We have been favored with the perusal of this work.—The author is one E. T. Coke, lieutenant of the 45th Regiment of the British Army. The author professes to give an unbiased and impartial account of what came under his observation in his travels through various parts of the United States, Upper and Lower Canada, New-Brunswick and Nova Scotia, in the summer and autumn of 1832. His residence in this country was too short to afford his prejudices an opportunity to ripen. We have no room for extracts. The following is his account of our neighbours across the border.

Many of the old inhabitants who settled in New-Brunswick after the forfeiture of their property in the States, and several of them still hold high official situations. But, as in the Canadas, the same blunt manner and independent spirit which an Englishman is so apt to censure in the United States is here very perceptible. The lower class of people assume similar airs. A shopkeeper is mighty indignant if so addressed: forsooth he is a storekeeper; a blacksmith is a lieutenant of militia grenadiers, and sports his full-dress uniform, with gold wings, as proudly as a nobleman; a mail-servant, who has emigrated from England only three years before with scarcely a shoe to her foot, walks in to be hired, and in the presence of the lady of the house, seats herself in the best chair in the parlour and then enters upon business with the ease of one who is reciprocating a favor; in short, no one confesses a superior. They certainly possess the leveling system in full vigour, inhaled, I should imagine, from the opposite side of the frontier. “No sutor ultra crepidam” is not the motto here; the majority of the House of Assembly is composed of ignorant farmers and shopkeepers, the representatives of the eleven counties into which the province is divided. One thing, however, I will acquit them of: they neither chew tobacco nor do they annoy you in hotels with the essence of egg-nog and mist julaps.

Several Ladies have given it very kind encouragement; and materials have been contributed for the work which is carried on—of all which an account will be accurately kept at the School, for the inspection of any who may desire to see it. For the expenses which those means will not cover, the Rector is at present responsible; he has abstained from making any call upon the benevolence of the public for assistance, until the School should be in successful operation. But that is now the case: and those who would wish to inform themselves respecting it's plan, and satisfy themselves, by actual observation, how far it really deserves assistance, are respectfully invited to visit it.

PERSONS desirous of contracting to supply His Majesty's Troops with Forage, at the undermentioned places, for One Year, commencing on the first day of January next, are hereby notified; that sealed Tenders for the same will be received at this Office, on or before Tuesday the fifth of November next, at twelve o'clock.

The number of Rations required daily, will be as follows:—
Saint John about Seven, } more or less.
Fredericton about Nine, }
The Ration of Forage, per diem, to consist as follows:—
HAY, 14lbs. (Fourteen Pounds.)
OATS, 10lbs. (Ten Pounds.)
STRAW, 6lbs. (Six Pounds.)

The following substitutions will be allowed in case of sick Horses:—
One Pound of BARLEY, or } in lieu
3lbs of a Pound of MALT, or } of one
1/2 of a Pound of OATMEAL, or } pound
One 1/2 Pounds of BRAN, } of Oats.

It being expressly understood that such substitution shall be limited to One and a Half Pounds of OATS daily for each sick Horse.
The HAY to be upland, intervale, or dyked marsh, sweet and good, either Timothy or Clover, or a mixture of both, and to have been cut at least three months previous to delivery to the Troops.
The OATS to be sweet, clean, and wholesome quality, and not to weigh less than Thirty-four pounds per Bushel, and to have been reaped at least three months previous to delivery.
The STRAW to be either Oates or Barley, and of dry, unbroken, proper quality, and to be delivered in bundles.
The Contractor will deliver the Forage to the Troops, from his Depot, (which is to be near the Barracks,) on orders received from the Commissariat, to the Staff Departments, and Regiments, three days in the week to such Officers as may require it to be issued at those periods.
It will be required from the Contractor to have in his Depot, at all times, at least two months' supply of Forage of each description; and that his Depot shall be open to the inspection of the Commissariat, whenever it may be thought proper to visit it.
The Tenders to express the rate in Sterling Money per Ration, and to be made separately for each place stated above, accompanied by a Letter from two persons of known property, engaging to become bound with the party tendering, in the sum which will be made known on application at this Office, as well as other particulars which may be considered necessary to the persons tendering for this supply.
Payment will be made every two months, on regular vouchers—forms of which can be obtained at this Office—in British Silver.
