

sequence of a prevailing belief, that the slaves who are said to be extremely dissatisfied with the plan of emancipation proposed by the British Government, will make an effort to emancipate themselves, the effect of which would be the destruction of every white inhabitant. He therefore recommends, that a vessel of war should be stationed in that neighbourhood, for the purpose of affording protection to individuals, and the large amount of American property which is at present in the island. Mr. Tolar expresses the hope, that efficient protection may be afforded to the important and growing commerce of the United States in the quarter in which he resides. This is essential, he thinks, to prevent attempts at piracy, and will tend to increase a respect for the national character. — *Boston Messenger.*

Major-General Sir James Carmichael Smyth, Bart. has received the appointment of Lieutenant Governor of British Guiana, comprehending the Colonies of Demerara, Essequibo, and Berbice.

We last week announced the arrival of the Right Reverend and Honorable Lord Bishop of Nova Scotia, in the Pocahontas, whose visit must have excited much interest amongst all those immediately connected with the Established Church, and indeed the community generally. His Lordship, during his stay of only eight days, confirmed at St. Paul's Church, on Tuesday last, upwards of sixty persons; visited Bay du Vin on Wednesday; started on Friday, and returned here on Saturday. We understand his Lordship preached twice on Sunday, in St. Paul's Church—marked the Hon. J. Cunard on Monday, and left early this morning for Shediac, accompanied by Sir Rupert de George, who arrived here on Wednesday from Picton, in his yacht, Charles Ingles, Esq., and other Gentlemen from this place. The Hon. Samuel Cunard left today for Richibucto, by land. — *Gleaner.*

A slave captured. — We learn from the Bermuda Royal Gazette, that H. B. M. schooner Nimble has captured a slave schooner with 190 miserable creatures on board. This slave appeared at Barbados on the 11th May, then on her way to Trinidad, in consequence of her not being allowed to stop at the Havana, from the existence there of the cholera.

We are happy to learn by an arrival from Sydney this morning, that the Cape-Breton Steamer has arrived at that place from England; she belongs to the Mining Association. We know not how it is intended to employ this vessel. — *Admiral Royal Gazette.*

We have noticed with much satisfaction, the presentation of a piece of plate to the venerable Dr. Strachan, Arch-Deacon of York, by a number of his former pupils at Cornwall. These gentlemen who were once assembled under the guardianship of Dr. Strachan, have never ceased to remember him as a friend, have never forgotten the impressions made on their youthful minds, at an institution where the lessons in learning and science were imparted, the principles of religion and loyalty encouraged; and now, after a lapse of twenty years, in which period they have been widely dispersed over the globe, they unite in an expression of gratitude to their old master, to whose instructions many, perhaps all of them may be indebted for the prosperity of their lives. We would that our columns recorded the address and its reply, but the space is denied to our wish, and we can only express our admiration of the sentiments contained in both, so excellently illustrative of the affection and esteem that should ever prevail between Tutor and Pupil. The gift, consisting of a beautiful Epergne, valued at about eleven hundred Dollars, was made in London, under the inspection of the Author of the "Pleasures of Hope," who aided the artist in the design of the classical figures and accompaniments:—long may Dr. Strachan live to gaze upon a token as honorable to the donors, as it must be gratifying to himself. (The Epergne bears the following inscription:—

1. Presented to the Hon. and Ven. John Strachan, D.D., Arch-Deacon of York, in Upper Canada, President of King's College, and Member of the Legislative and Executive Councils in that Province.

2. By more than forty of those who were his Pupils at Cornwall, and who, though now widely dispersed, have united, after the lapse of more than 20 years, in offering this tribute of affection and respect.

3. In grateful recollection of his warm and constant friendship, and of the instruction and advice, of which twenty years experience of life has taught them the value.

4. Presented on the 24th day of July, 1833. "Sunt hæc ælium æ præmia laudi."

The address to Dr. Strachan is headed by the name of the Hon. Chief Justice Robinson, and contains a list of some of the most distinguished members of society. — *N. Y. Advertiser.*

There has been for some days a rumour in circulation of the union of this Province with Upper Canada. We know not how it was received or on what ground it rests. For ourselves we are not inclined to put much faith, at the present time, in the report; though really we can assign no very good reason for doubting that such a measure may be ere long resorted to. The situation to which the British Colonies, particularly Canada, have been brought by various nostrums which have been tried for improvement, reminds us forcibly of a singular medical case which came under our immediate notice in this Province, when living in a village in which the only medical practitioner was an old German, who had formerly occupied the honorable post of Barber, &c. in a German Regiment. This venerable professor of the healing art attended a person who had long been ailing and who at length addressed the Doctor— "Ah! Sir, I have taken all, all the physic you have given me and I get no better." "No," said the Doctor, "I see that but not to do I see not, I have given you a lot of every thing I have in my shop, and compounded every drug in different ways, but it will not do, you will get no better. I think I shall try something more. I shall mix up a little of every thing I have given you and you take it all as von dose and see if that do not cure you."

Whilst speaking of reports respecting the Canadas, we may notice that the *Liverpool Chronicle* of the 15th June, states, that Mr. Dominick Brown, M. P. for

Mayo, was to have been appointed Governor of Canada. — *Quebec Mercury.*

Extract of a Letter from River Philip, dated August 8, 1833.

On the first inst. at a settlement about three miles from this place, an old man upwards of 70 years of age, by the name of Joseph Metcalf, and his grand daughter about 13, left home about 6 o'clock P. M. to look for cows, as they thought they heard the cow bell in the edge of the wood, a short distance from the house; when it began to grow dark the family became alarmed, and they, together with some of the neighbours, went in search of them but without effect. The next morning the alarm was made general, and the inhabitants turned out in every direction, and although every effort has been made for six successive days (some of these days there were more than sixty men in different parties, searching the woods between this place and Economy, a distance of about fifteen or sixteen miles, their tracks being discovered in that direction, together with a piece of the girl's garment torn off by the brush about seven or eight miles from where they started, but the search hitherto has proved in vain, and all hopes of finding them alive if they are found at all, are abandoned; there was a small dog with them but he has never come out. The feelings of the relatives may be imagined but cannot be described.

Extract of a Letter from Charlotte-Town, P. E. I.,

"We had a most violent gale here on Saturday, which commenced about midnight, and continued till yesterday morning, from the N. E. and N. W. People were apprehensive that the crops would be injured, but they are not beat down as in the case of rain, in this neighbourhood, and only the outer edges so far as I have seen, will suffer.

"The English Church that was building, was turned about three points, and then crashed with a crash which I took for heavy thunder. Trees are every where torn up, the wind came in violent gusts, and the prostrate trees seem to have been acted upon as by a succession of whirlwinds. One man who I went yesterday, had part of his house blown down, and a cow and three pigs killed by the falling ruins. The weather was extremely cold, and the day resembled that of a cold November."

S.) and for many years a Sergeant in the New-Brinswick Regiment, under the command of Colonel Robinson. At Kell House, Argyleshire, on the 29th of April last, Jane, the famous wife of Lieutenant Colonel James Fullerton, R. N. and C. B. of H. M. 90th Regt., and eldest daughter of Col. MacLarty, Esq. of Chesterville, in the Island of Jamaica.
