

celestial rockets, and more especially in their constantly uniform divergence from the point fifteen degrees south-easterly from our zenith.

The meteors are supposed to be gaseous, and when inflamed by some cause not explained, appear darting through the heavens, generally in various directions. It is certain that they are generated at a moderate distance from the earth—probably from two to five miles.

The exhibition I have partly described, was the most splendid pyrotechny I ever saw, and I do not recollect to have met with anything comparable to it in description.

THE METEORS.—About day-break this morning, our sky presented a remarkable exhibition of Fire Balls commonly called Shooting Stars. The attention of the writer was first called to the phenomenon about half-past five o'clock, from which time until near sunrise, the appearance of these meteors was striking and splendid, beyond any thing of the kind he has ever witnessed or heard of.

To form some idea of the phenomenon, the reader may imagine a constant succession of fire-balls, resembling sky-rockets, radiating in all directions from a point in the heavens near the zenith, and following the arch of the sky towards the horizon. They proceeded to various distances from the radiating point, leaving after them a vivid streak of light, and usually exploding before they disappeared. The balls were of various sizes, and degrees of splendour: some were mere points, but others were larger and brighter than Jupiter or Venus, and one, seen by a creditable witness, before the writer was called was judged to be nearly as large as the moon. The flashes of light, though less intense than lightning, were so bright as to awaken people in their beds. One ball that shot off in the northwest direction, and exploded near the star Capella, left, just behind the place of explosion, a phosphorescent train, of peculiar beauty. This line was at first nearly straight, but it shortly began to contract in length, and dilate in breadth, and assume the figure of a serpent folding itself up, until it appeared like a small luminous cloud of vapour. This cloud was borne eastward by the wind, opposite to the direction in which the meteor had proceeded, remaining in sight several minutes. The light was usually white, but was occasionally prismatic, with a predominance of blue.

A little before six o'clock, it appeared to the company, that the point of radiation was moving eastward from the zenith, when it occurred to the writer to mark its place, accurately, among the fixed stars. The point was then seen to be in the constellation Leo, within the head of the sickle, a little to the westward of Gamma Leonis, and not far from Regulus. During the hour following, the radiating point remained stationary in the same part of Leo, although the constellation in the mean time, by the diurnal revolution, moved westward to the meridian, nearly 15 degrees. By referring to a celestial globe, it will be seen that this point has a right ascension of 150 degrees, and a declination of about 20 degrees. Consequently, it was 20 degrees 13 minutes south of our zenith.

The weather had sustained a recent change. On the 11th, a very copious southerly rain fell, and on the 12th a high westerly wind prevailed, by gusts. Last evening the sky was very serene; a few falling stars were observed; but not so numerous as to excite particular attention.

We are without later dates from England.

Seventeen days later from Lisbon.—The Swedish barque Frithel, Capt. Moberg arrived at New York on the 15th instant from Lisbon, which port she left on the 12th October.

Capt. M. unfortunately brought no papers, and but two letters, which are destitute of political news.

We have had a long conversation with Capt. Moberg, through an interpreter, and learn, that on the morning of the day he left, (Oct. 12,) the Pedrites sailed out from Lisbon, in strong columns to attack the besiegers. A sharp engagement must have ensued, as Capt. M. heard a continual firing of cannon and musquetry from morning till late in the afternoon. The result Capt. M. of course, did not know. The Pedrite troops were in fine spirits, and the utmost confidence was felt at Lisbon, in the success of the sally.

Deserters continued to pour into the city—averaging from thirty to forty per day. The principal part of the fleet was in the river.—Two of the smaller vessels were cruising on the coast. A few days before Capt. M. sailed a Portuguese vessel, bound from some port in the hands of Don Miguel to Brazil, and loaded with salt and wine, was carried into Lisbon, with the flag of Donna Maria flying over that of Don Miguel. St. Ubes itself continued in the hands of the Pedrites.

The presence of the Queen at Lisbon had produced a fine effect upon the minds of the people, both in town and country.—New York Journal of Commerce.

WHALE FISHERY.—By a vessel arrived off Peterhead from the fishing ground, Davis' Strait, it appears that a very large proportion of the ships are full.

CAPTAIN ROSS AND THE ARCTIC EXPEDITION.—The Caledonia, whaler, from the Davis' Straits fishery, reports having fallen in with the Alfred, whaler of Hull, which had touched at a small island in Lancaster Sound, where the men found two or three portable soup canisters, and a quantity of tobacco pipes, on which was the word "DETROIT." It was conjectured that these articles had belonged to the unfortunate expedition of Captain Ross. There was not the slightest appearance that there had been any erections for shelter; but

the remains of a human hand were also picked up.

A Jamaica paper states that the Hon. Lord William Paget, Commander of His Majesty's ship North Star, was recently shot at Vera Cruz by a sentinel. The particulars of the case have not yet transpired.

We understand an Indian was discovered lying dead, on the marsh of J. A. Street, Esq. at Newcastle; and from the severe bruises on his body, it is supposed he was murdered. We have not yet learnt the particulars.—Miramichi Gleaner.

We notice by the London papers, that Miss Hughes, whose vocal talents, in conjunction with Mr. Horn, afforded so much delight to our citizens at their concert in July last, was married in London on the 4th September, by the Right Rev. Bishop of that diocese; to Joseph Fenwick, Esq. and that the newly-married pair left immediately in a carriage and four for Scotland.—Montreal Gazette.

At Newcastle, (Miramichi), on the 7th ult., Mr. John Burke, aged 42 years.

At his residence at Lund's Lane, (Upper Canada), on the 30th October, Colonel Richard Leonard, (son of the late Hon. George Leonard, of Sussex Vale, in this Province,) formerly of the 104th Regiment, and recently High Sheriff of the District of Niagara.

At Quebec, on the 17th ult., after a short and severe illness, Robert Morehead, Esq., H. P. late 104th Regiment, aged 42 years.

In New-York, recently, Mr. Joseph Harrell, aged 23 years. Mr. H. was one of those accomplished musicians from Bavaria, whose concerts have delighted so many parts of the country. His remarkable bass voice will be long remembered. The deceased, who, with his comrades, was exposed to such great peril by the conflagration of the Hotel in Montreal last winter, never recovered from the cold he took on that occasion; and after lingering with occasional temporary improvement, until now, has sunk at last in a strange land; and yet not among strangers, for he had made friends; and those, moreover, so long his companions, in his beautiful art, were faithful and assiduous around his death bed.
