

The Steamer *Woodstock* which left this place on Tuesday enroute for Woodstock, County of Carleton, with a pleasant and agreeable party on board, returned early on the following day, having only ascended the river about 27 miles. As we were among the number who ventured to say that she must reach the place of her destination, we made no mention of her departure last week, as we were in expectation of having the particulars of this novel excursion for to-day's paper. The *Woodstock* had to contend with greater difficulties for the power of her steam than we anticipated, but although she has been baffled in her first adventure, the thanks of the public are due to the proprietors, who have on this and on many other occasions evinced a ready disposition to comply with their wishes; and we congratulate our friends in the upper part of the country, in the spirited attempts which are about being made to render the travelling more safe and expeditious, and the intercourse more frequent and less expensive to and from that interesting section of the Province. We would also call the attention of the Public to the splendid Boat *Henry Bliss*, now sitting up in the most convenient and expensive manner at Mr. Ketchum's landing; she is intended for passengers only, and with another of the same description, both owned by Messrs. G. E. Ketchum and Phillips, are to form a line of conveyance between this place and Woodstock, and will commence running as soon as the freshet in the river will admit. The Ladies and Gentlemen's cabins are light, airy and commodious; they are apart from each other, but occasionally may be thrown into one spacious room; she draws but a few inches of water and in every respect promises to afford a speedy and comfortable passage. No horses will be taken on board; when necessary another boat will be in readiness for this purpose. We wish the proprietors ample remuneration in their spirited undertaking. In addition to all these new things we are informed that a Team Boat, on a new construction, will also ply between this place and Woodstock—she is built for the purpose of carrying freight, and will be propelled by horses affixed to her machinery on deck; a Boat of this kind was once in operation but was not long in existence, we hope the owners of the present concern have studied the subject to better effect, and that they will be more successfully engaged in their undertaking.

The barque *Lady Campbell*, White, 20th March, from Greenock, for this port, with a full cargo of Merchandise, consigned to Mr. John Robertson and others, came to anchor off Mispeck, a short distance to the Eastward of this Harbour, at 5 o'clock on Sunday afternoon, in a thick fog; rode all night, and at 5 o'clock yesterday morning, the wind fresh from the S. W. with a heavy sea, the barque drove from her anchors and went ashore at Thomas's Cove, above Mispeck, it being high water at the time. A party of men, with anchors, cables &c. were sent to the vessel yesterday forenoon, and this morning the steamer John Ward, was despatched to her assistance. An effort will be made to get her off. She has now at high water 7 feet water in her hold.—The cargo will be much damaged.—*St. John Courier*.

HIS MAJESTY'S PORTRAIT has been, for several days past, hung up in the Council Chamber, to which his grateful and admiring lieges have been freely admitted. The picture is a full length—beautifully executed, and handsomely framed; and is really a present worthy of a king. His Majesty is dressed in a naval uniform, over which are thrown his robes of state, the crown resting within his reach.—The face and brow are uncommonly fine, the figure well proportioned and athletic. His Majesty may be assured of this, that in no part of his widely extended dominions, would his likeness be gazed upon with more of rational and steady loyalty than by the people of Nova Scotia.—*Nova Scotia*.

We yesterday received our Canada Papers, Quebec to the 13th and Montreal to the 11th from which we make the following extracts:—

The Upper Canada papers leave very little doubt that a complete change is taking place in the Executive Government of Upper Canada. The present Executive Council is to be suppressed altogether, and one composed of the heads of the principal Executive departments and Crown Lawyers substituted. The Chief Justice, it is said, will be no longer Speaker of the Legislative Council. Dr. Strachan will be allowed more time to attend to spiritual concerns. In case of the refusal of Mr. Rolph to accept as Solicitor General, Mr. Bidwell, late Speaker, will probably have the offer of the situation.

This Change of Ministry in Upper Canada, having taken place while the ousted party had a large majority in both houses, if the parliamentary majorities pride themselves in their consistency, a dissolution of Parliament may become necessary; but we think not. Loyal addresses from the opponents of the dominant party in the Assembly, are preparing to be sent to England; and some very loyal paragon appear in the papers of the majority.

The port of Quebec has now assumed its right appearance; ships arriving or lying at anchor, flags flying, boats and small craft moving in every direction, all bespeaking the revival of that industry which gives animation and comfort to a whole people.

The country is also favoured; vegetation is a fortnight in advance of the same period last year; the first snow wheat up, three inches long, healthy and thriving; the fields in good condition for the other crops, and the pastures recovering their verdure.

FIRE.—On the morning of the 1st instant, the valuable and extensive tannery of Mr. George Bridgman, situated at St. Pie, on the Yamaska river, was destroyed by fire. Our correspondent informs us, that the destruction of this establishment will be seriously felt by the whole vicinity in which it was situated. It was one of the largest Tanneries in the Country, being 220 feet long by 40 in breadth, with water power for moving bark mill and other requisite machinery. It was only built last year and was capable of finishing from 25,000 to 30,000 sides of sole leather, per annum. It was the means of circulating about £5000 per annum, among the poorer classes in the vicinity,

for purchase of bark, wages, &c.; and will be a serious loss to the Country. At the time of the accident between 8500 and 9000 sides of sole leather were in the building, which are not totally destroyed. Insurance on the establishment was effected at the Alliance Office for £2000. The actual loss will probably not exceed £3000.—*Canadian Courier*.

A Mr. JAMIESON, of the English Bar, is said to be the person appointed Attorney General of Upper Canada.—16.

The Royal William steamer proceeded Friday on a pleasure trip to Grosse Isle, with a large party of ladies and gentlemen on board. She left the King's Wharf at 12 o'clock, with a strong head wind, and proceeded in fine style to the Island, making the passage in 2 hours and 40 minutes. Some of the party landed and remained some time on shore. The Quarantine establishment is stated to be in the highest order. The boat returned to Quebec at about 1 past 9 at night, the party much gratified with their excursion; the day was remarkably fine, though rather cold, and the ample accommodations of this noble vessel made every one on board comfortable after the night closed in.—*Mercury*.

THE FALKLAND ISLANDS.—The possession of these Islands by the British, will, it is said greatly benefit American commerce, as vessels of all nations will, it is supposed, be admitted for supplies and repairs, our present extensive and increasing trade and whale fishery in the Pacific rendering a port for supplies and repairs near Cape Horn indispensable. The fine harbours of Falkland Islands are said to be easy of access at all seasons, and are only from four to five hundred miles from the promontory of Cape Horn, while Rio Janeiro, where formerly vessels on that route were compelled to stop for supplies or repairs, is distant twenty five hundred miles. The necessity of having so important a settlement under the protection of a strong naval power, instead of a power so weak and unstable as Buenos Ayres, is sufficiently evident.—*Southern Patriot*.

MUNICIPAL DONATION.—We observe by the Boston Papers that the Hon. T. H. Perkins of Boston, has offered his splendid mansion in Pearl street, Boston, as an Asylum for the instruction of the blind. The House is a magnificent edifice fifty feet square, and situated on a lot of eleven thousand superficial feet, with extensive brick stables capable of being used as work-shops or dormitories. It is valued at \$30,000. It will be recollected that the brother of the Hon. T. H. Perkins gave a splendid mansion for the benefit of the Boston Athenaeum. Such liberality reflects honour on humanity and credit on the nation, whose proud boast it is to have been the birth place of such distinguished individuals.

TERMINATION OF LOTTERIES IN NEW YORK.—The answer of Yates & McIntire to the call of the Senate, for a statement, under oath, of the number and amount of schemes which have been drawn in this State since the 30th of August 1826, and the number and amount of tickets sold by them during the same period, has been promptly furnished, and seems to have left a favourable impression upon the minds of that body, since they proceeded on the same day, to accept the proposition of Messrs Yates & McIntire, to close the lottery business on 31st December next. Had they credited the charges of gross deception and management brought against those gentlemen in a petition recently presented, they would not have permitted another Scheme to be drawn. The Assembly if we mistake not, have already accepted the proposition of the Managers. We may therefore safely conclude, that after the close of the present year, all lotteries will be extinct in this State; and what is still better, the new Constitution declares that "No lottery shall hereafter be in this State; and the Legislature shall pass laws to prevent the sale of all lottery tickets within this State, except in lotteries already provided by law"—i. e. Lotteries which will have become extinct by virtue of the present arrangement, before the commencement of another year.—*J. of Commerce*.
