We do not think they have done their duty in this affair. We are at all times disposed to exclaim with Aeschylus:—We know no dangerous or useless truth.—*Newfoundland Patriot.*

We are without later intelligence from Europe.

A curious and by no means uninteresting letter appears in the 16th number of the *Parliamentary Review and Family Magazine*, a weekly periodical, edited by J. Buckingham, Esq., one of the members for Sheffield, being as it is designated by the writer, "A Proposal for colonizing the Poles in Canada." The plan suggested is upon the Roman System of colonization, completed by the discoveries and improvements of modern science. The two sore plan for labourers is strongly recommended as a commencement, increasing gradually to larger tenures of five acres and upwards and bearing a strong resemblance to the Agrarian law without the evils of the Roman system, which subsequently brought this plan into great dispute. The writer proposes that a permanent provision might be formed for the Poles by subscription, as a fund for advances, &c. and suggests a plan of campaign of labourers, to be formed into regiments, as brigades of volunteers, or local militia, to be trained and exercised a few days in the year. The character of the Poles for military discipline and form, and the opportunity of perpetuating the principles of honor peculiar to that nation, may give a plausibility to the plan, and attract the attention of those interested in the state of that nation, but we are inclined to doubt whether the people of England will assume the sole charge of this benevolent undertaking.—*Monmouth Gazette.*

Another melancholy event.—Drowned, on Sunday evening, from a boat, in going on board the ship *John Beatty*, lying in the harbour, Mr. BENJAMIN LIGHTON STANTON, Chief Mate of that ship, in the 24th year of his age, eldest son of Benjamin Stanton, Esquire, of this City.—The body was found yesterday morning, when a Coroner's Inquest was held on it, and a verdict returned of "Accidental death by drowning."—The deceased was a young man much beloved and esteemed by those who had the pleasure of his acquaintance, and has died deeply regretted by an extensive circle of relatives and friends.—*Observer.*

On Monday last, an Inquest was held, in the Gaol, on view of the body of Thomas Heavyside, and a Verdict returned that his death was occasioned by "Typhus Fever."

The *Sarah Sheafe*.—It will be recollected that this ship arrived at quarantine a few days ago in distress. She was on a voyage from Mobile for Liverpool, and about a hundred and fifty miles out from Mobile was taken in with by the ship *Splendid*, Capt. Britton, of this port, on the same voyage. At the time the *Splendid* came up, the Captain, supercargo, and four men died. Under these circumstances it became a matter of serious consideration what should be done with the distressed ship. It was agreed to be most expedient, that she should steer for New York, but some one was wanted to take charge of her. This, under all the circumstances, was a most undesirable effort. Mr. John H. Smith, the second mate of the *Splendid*, offered to undertake the service, and Capt. Britton consenting, he took command of the *Sarah Sheafe* and brought her in safely. As an acknowledgement for the value of this service, the several Insurance Companies which had underwritten upon the ship, have presented Mr. S. with a beautiful Chronometer of the cost of \$325. We publish below the correspondence in the case. Mr. Smith is the son of a very wealthy farmer in Pennsylvania, and follows his present occupation from mere love of it. He is now to proceed in the *Sarah Sheafe* as mate on her voyage to Liverpool, and but for his youth, being only twenty one years of age, would have been put in command.
