Those Persons who in compliance with this requisition, shall make their case known, may be assured that it is not the object of HIS MAJESTY'S GOVERNMENT, as insidiously circulated, to deal harshly with them; but those Persons who shall neglect or refuse to avail themselves of this Notice, will be considered as trespassers and prosecuted accordingly by the ATTORNEY-GENERAL.

ALL PUBLIC AUTHORITIES in the different Districts of the Province, are hereby requested to promulgate this Notice, as generally as they possibly can, that no person may plead the excuse of not having come to the knowledge of it, in averting the consequences that may hereafter ensue.

We have extracted from Lord Goderich's highly important Despatch to Sir John Colborne, so much as relates to general principles and the views and dispositions of His Majesty's Government. The parts which we have omitted, however interesting as specimens of admirable talent in political discussion, consist either of reflections on Mr. McKenzie's style of argument, or replies to his representations on matters strictly peculiar to Upper Canada. We commend the Despatch to the best consideration of our readers, assured that whatever opinion they may entertain on particular points, they must derive great satisfaction from so incontrovertible a proof of the vigilant attention which the Colonial Minister devotes to the objects of his trust.

The Halifax and St. John Mails, due on Saturday last, had not arrived when our paper went to press; in fact the condition of the roads are such as to preclude the possibility of travelling any distance, occasioned by the late frequent and violent storms of snow, which being accompanied with high winds has drifted to such a height in our neighbourhood, as literally to cover the fences, and rendered some of our cross streets and lanes impassable for any sort of vehicle; our intercourse with the upper and lower parts of the Country is at present cut off, and we are apprehensive from the scarcity of fuel and other winter necessities in town, that many families will soon be in a suffering condition unless relieved by a favourable change of weather.

We would call the attention of our readers to the notice of a meeting to be held in the Province Hall on Thursday next, for the purpose of affording temporary relief to the necessitous, which we hope will be numerously attended, and the appeals which will be made to their charitable munificence liberally evinced.

LEGISLATURE OF NEW-BRUNSWICK. (EXTRACTS FROM THE JOURNALS.)

MONDAY, 25th February, 1893.

Mr. Shore by command of His Excellency, laid before the House the following Documents:—

"William the Fourth, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, King Defender of the Faith.

"To Our Right, Trusty, and Well-beloved, MATTHEW LORD AYLMER, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Military Order of the Bath, Lieutenant-General of our Forces, GREETING:—

"Whereas, by Letters Patent, bearing date at Westminster, on the Sixth day of July, One thousand eight hundred and thirty-one, in the second year of our Reign, we did constitute and appoint you to be our Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief, in and over our said Province of New-Brunswick, and did, by our said Letters Patent, give, grant and commit to you, certain powers and authorities to be by you exercised in manner therein mentioned, with the advice and consent of our Council of our said Province, as by reference to the said Letters Patent, will more fully and at large appear;—And Whereas We have deemed it expedient that there should be henceforward two distinct Councils in our said Province for the purpose hereinafter mentioned:—Now, therefore, Know Ye, that We, of our special Grace, certain Knowledge, and mere Motion, have thought proper to grant, provide and declare, and do hereby grant, provide and declare, that there shall henceforward be within our said Province of New-Brunswick two distinct and separate Councils, to be respectively called the Legislative Council and the Executive Council of our said Province, and we do hereby further direct and declare our pleasure to be, that all and eve-

ry the powers and authorities in the Letters Patent aforesaid contained and therein conferred on and vested in our Council, therein mentioned, so far as respects the enactment of any Laws to be made within our said Province, shall henceforward be, and the same are hereby vested in the said Legislative Council; and that all other powers and authorities whatsoever in the Letters Patent aforesaid, contained and therein conferred on, and vested in our Council therein mentioned, shall henceforward be, and the same are hereby vested in the said Executive Council: And We do further direct and declare our pleasure to be, that all and every the provisions, clauses, matters and things, in the said Letters Patent contained or which are or shall be contained in the general or other Instructions therein referred to with reference to the Constitution of the Council therein mentioned, and to the number of the members thereof, and to the nomination, appointment, suspension, or removal of such members, shall be and the same are hereby made applicable to the said Legislative Council as fully as if the same and every of them were here repeated: And We do further declare that the said Executive Council shall consist of five members and no more, and that three of such members shall constitute and be a Quorum of our said Executive Council, and that such persons shall be the members of the said Executive Council, as are for that purpose nominated and appointed by the additional Instructions under our Signet and Seal, and bearing even date herewith, or as shall be so nominated and appointed by any further Instructions to be by us for that purpose addressed to you under our Signet and Seal Manual; or by order in our own Privy Council, or through one of our principal Secretaries of State: And We do further direct and require that every member of our said Executive Council of our said Province shall take and subscribe such and the same Oaths to be by you for that purpose administered, as by the said recited Letters Patent are required to be taken by the members of our Council therein mentioned: And We do hereby authorize you, subject nevertheless to the Rules and Regulations in that behalf contained in the Instructions aforesaid, to suspend any member of the said Executive Council from his place therein until our pleasure shall be known: And We do hereby declare that the respective members of the Executive Council shall respectively hold their places therein during our pleasure. In Witness whereof We have caused these our Letters to be made Patent. Witness ourself at Westminster the Third day of December, in the Third Year of our Reign.

"An additional Instruction to our Right Trusty and Well-beloved Matthew Lord Aylmer, Knight, Commander of the Most Honourable Military Order of the Bath, Lieutenant-General of our Forces, Our Captain-General and Governor in Chief in and over our Province of New Brunswick, in America, or in his absence, to our Lieutenant-Governor or Officer Administering the Government of our said Province for the time being.

"Given at our Court at Saint James's, this 31 day of December, 1892, in the third year of our Reign.

"Whereas by our Commission under the Great Seal of our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, bearing even date herewith, we did grant, provide and declare, there should henceforward be within our said Province of New-Brunswick, two distinct and separate Councils, to be respectively called the Legislative Council, and the Executive Council of our said Province, and we did further declare that the said Executive Council should consist of five Members and no more, and that such Persons should be the Members of our said Executive Council, as should be for that purpose nominated and appointed by the additional Instructions under our Signet and Seal Manual accompanying our said Commission:—Now Know Ye, that we republish special trust and confidence in the Loyalty, Integrity, and Ability of our trusty and Well-beloved Thomas Bailie, Frederick P. Robinson, William Franklin Odell, George F. Street, and John Simcoe Saunders, Esquires, do hereby constitute and appoint them the said Thomas Bailie, Frederick P. Robinson, William Franklin Odell, George F. Street and John Simcoe Saunders, to be the Members of our said Executive Council, and do hereby empower you to summon them to our said Council accordingly: And we do further declare our will and pleasure, that in your absence or in the absence of our Lieutenant Governor of our said Province, or of the Officer Administering the Government for the time being, the Member of our said Council, whose name shall be first placed on the list, shall preside in our said Council."

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor.

Mr. Shore, acting Secretary, by command of His Excellency, delivered the following Message:—

"NEW-BRUNSWICK.

"Message to the House of Assembly,

15th February, 1893.

"ARCHIBALD CAMPBELL.

"The Lieutenant Governor directs to be laid before the House of Assembly, the Copy of a Despatch received by yesterday's mail, from the Right Honourable Viscount Goderich, and it affords the Lieutenant Governor much satisfaction thus to convey to the House His Majesty's thanks as therein commanded.

The following is the Despatch communicated by His Excellency's Message:—

Downing Street, 2d January, 1893.

No. 66.

"SIR,

"In my Despatch No. 45, of the 7th June last, I had the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your Despatch No. 21, of the 10th March, enclosing an Address to His Majesty from the House of Assembly of New-Brunswick, in which they propose to take upon themselves all the necessary expenses of the Civil Government of the Province, on the relinquishment by the Crown of the Territorial Revenue; and I acquainted you that I should not fail to furnish you with an answer to the address of the Assembly, previous to the next meeting of the Legislature.

"I have accordingly to instruct you to communicate to the House of Assembly, that their Address has been duly laid at the foot of the Throne, and that His Majesty has commanded you to convey to them his thanks for the liberal spirit in which their offer is made, but His Majesty does not consider it necessary at present to call upon them for a grant of the nature they propose, as he does not anticipate such a falling off of the Revenue at his own disposal as the House appear to have apprehended; and he expects that it will continue to

afford the means of meeting those expenses for which the House has offered to provide, but which His Majesty conceives may be defrayed in a manner more advantageous to the Province from the Funds on which they are now charged.

"His Majesty regrets that there should have appeared to the Assembly any want of due economy in the management of the Crown Revenues, and will give his best endeavors to have them so administered as to conduce to the benefit of the Province. He will be happy to receive from the House any suggestion which may tend to that object, and, in order that they may be enabled to point out any improvements which they may think desirable, he will direct the accounts relating to the receipt and expenditure of this Revenue, to be laid before them.
